Widespread freezing rain coated surfaces with around one-tenth inch of ice. Locally higher amounts up to one-quarter inch were reported in the Ozark Foothills of Carter County. Due to very cold antecedent conditions, pavement temperatures were low enough that the initial drops of precipitation immediately created hazardous conditions. A southerly flow of warmer air around high pressure over the Carolina coast overspread a shallow layer of cold air near the surface. The result was widespread icing.
