Spring Garden Tours Showcase White House Grounds

Spring Garden Tours provide a special opportunity to visit the grounds around the White House. Over the years the eighteen acres that comprise the White House grounds have been subject to constant change. As the first president to occupy the White House, President John Adams ordered the first planting of a garden. President Thomas Jefferson undertook a complete redesign of the grounds. He started the tradition of planting trees and it was his idea to plant groves.

President John Quincy Adams was an experienced gardener and found pleasure in working in the gardens of the White House. President Rutherford B. Hayes began the tradition of planting commemorative trees. Today, there are more than three dozen such commemorative trees.

In 1913, First Lady Ellen Wilson replaced the colonial style garden with a rose garden on the west side of the White House. Today, the Rose Garden hosts many official functions. The White House grounds are cared for by the National Park Service.

We Honor Our Military

The Second Division Memorial, located on the Ellipse near Constitution Avenue, honors the dead who served in the Second Division of the United States Army during World War I, World War II, and the Korean War. It was originally built to commemorate the Division's casualties in World War I and was dedicated on July 18, 1936. Later, two wings were dedicated on June 20, 1962. Significant battles for World War I are inscribed on the center panels. World War II battles are inscribed on the west panels and the Korean War battles on the east panels.

The granite shaft, built in the form of a great open gateway, has two wreaths carved in relief flanking the entrance. Guarding the gateway is an 18-foot-tall flaming sword, symbolizing blocking the German advance to Paris. The Second Division's insignia, an Indian head within a star upon a shield, is embossed on the sword's handle (or hilt).

The Boy Scout Memorial Rehabilitation

Did you notice the work being done at the Boy Scout Memorial? It is located on the site of the First National Jamboree held in Washington, D.C. in 1937, on the Ellipse, near 15th Street, NW. This four month project will restore the monument and the fountain to its original luster.

The bronze statue was unveiled on November 7, 1964 with an estimated 5,000 Boy Scouts and their leaders, top government dignitaries, business executives, and Scout officials in attendance.

The three-figure statue consists of a Boy Scout – symbolic of all Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorers striding into the future. The two classic figures represent the sum of the great ideals of past civilizations. The male symbolizes love of country, patriotism, loyalty, honor and courage. The female figure symbolizes the spiritual qualities of good citizenship, faith, high ideals, liberty, and love of humanity.

The project was financed by individual contributions of boys and leaders from every state. It was hoped that every unit throughout the United States would contribute at least ten cents a boy. Each donor was asked to sign his name on a scroll. These scrolls have been placed in the pedestal of the statues.

Lafayette Park: Spirits from the Past

On Saturday, May 16 at 7:00 p.m., we'd like to introduce you and your family to our family of historical characters who contributed to the 19th and 20th century social scene around Lafayette Park. Our free one hour presentation will begin on the north side of the White House, just follow the "Spirits" sign to the Park Rangers near the White House. Park rangers and volunteers will guide visitors through the 200 year history of Lafayette Park. Stephen Decatur will discuss his plans for the first house on Lafayette Square in 1817. A spy will be trying to stay ahead of the law during the Civil War. Women will be protesting for the right to vote during the early days of the Wilson administration. Also joining our party will be Dolley Madison, Andrew Jackson, Henry Adams, Bernard Baruch, the Marquis de Lafayette, and others as you learn about the historic area across the street from the White House. Memorial Day Crafts

Flag Day Activities

President Harry S Truman signed an Act of Congress on August 3, 1949 designating June 14th of each year as National Flag Day. Years before, Betsy Ross received the following directions for making the first flag:

RESOLVED: That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes alternate red and white; that the Union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

With these guidelines, she was free to design the flag as she wished. You too will be able to design a flag.
