Statement of Goal

The goal of SPAN is to link the various SBRP programs, students, postdocs and alumni as another mechanism to promote interdisciplinary research to address health and environmental concerns due to hazardous waste sites. The SPAN committee is a representative group of current and past trainees to help lead SBRP in this networking effort.

- **Annual Meeting** will be December 7-10 in Asilomar, CA.

 - Ride-sharing from airports (San Jose or Monterey) will be a potentially important coordinating activity for SPAN (via webpages / listserv / message board...but also open for suggestions).
 - Early draft of meeting indicates a poster session will begin the Sunday evening that the meeting starts. This is just a draft this may change.
 - o Icebreaker for trainees suggested to have activities to stimulate mingling and ways to identify trainees by their school (suggest wearing school garb) or their discipline (something with nametags, maybe?)
 - o Heather has been in touch with Dr. Dooley, who is organizing the meeting, hosted by UC-Davis.
- Networking Tools SBRP is investigating ways to use existing networking
 tools to connect trainees. We are also looking into building a database that
 would accomplish the same, only would be hosted on the SBRP website. We
 are asking SPAN Committee for suggestions and beta-testing of these webaccessible networking tools.

 - The new group features allow sending out emails, search group rosters, discussion forum.

Or, we'll build our own database and draw from the pros/cons of features/information identified by committee.

- Web Seminar SBRP will offer the "What is Superfund?" seminar in November so trainees have a better understanding of what the program is in advance of the meeting. In the Spring, these web seminars could feature student/postdoc/alumni research.
- o Besides just networking, SPAN committee should think about something to work towards, perhaps on a topical basis.
- Collaboration: it was mentioned that SPAN could really take a meaningful step forward if there was a way to augment research collaboration or access to funding for cross-program collaborations.
