DON GONYEA TO DISCUSSES THE WHITE HOUSE AND PRESIDENT-ELECT BARACK OBAMA

Michigan Radio and the Gerald R. Ford Presidential Museum are honored to welcome NPR White House correspondent Don Gonyea to Grand Rapids, on Monday, November 17th, at 7:00 pm. Gonyea will speak about his experiences covering the White House as well as his time on the campaign trail with President-Elect Barack Obama.

Don Gonyea has been reporting for NPR for over twenty years. A Michigan native, he was NPR's Detroit correspondent until 2001, when he took over the White House beat. Since then, he has reported on all aspects of the George W. Bush presidency, including the events of September 11th, and the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. Gonyea has also spent expensive time traveling with President Bush, and has filed stories from around the globe, including Moscow, Beijing, London, Islamabad, Budapest, Seoul, San Salvador, and Hanoi. He has also covered the presidential campaigns of John Kerry, John McCain, and most recently Barack Obama, while chronicling the 2000, 2004, and 2008 elections.

In addition to his reporting for NPR, Gonyea has been a contributor to PBS's *NewsHour with Jim Lehrer*, the BBC, CBC, AP Radio and the *Columbia Journalism Review*. In 2000, he was part of a team that earned NPR a George Foster Peabody Award—broadcasting's highest honor—for "Lost & Found Sound," a series on *All Things Considered*. A native of Monroe, Michigan, Gonyea is a graduate of Michigan State University, and a lifelong Detroit Tigers fan.

Gonyea will speak at the Gerald R. Ford Museum, at 303 Pearl Street NW, Grand Rapids, MI on Monday, November 17th, at 7:00 pm.
