GENERAL INFORMATION

<u>Background</u>.--On December 30, 1992, the Department of Commerce issued antidumping duty orders on imports of certain welded stainless steel pipes from Korea and Taiwan (57 F.R. 62300 and 57 F.R. 62301). On September 1, 2005, the Commission instituted a second review pursuant to section 751(c) of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C. § 1675(c)) (the Act) to determine whether revocation of the orders would be likely to lead to continuation or recurrence of material injury to the domestic industry within a reasonably foreseeable time (70 F.R. 52124). If the Commission makes an affirmative determination, the orders will remain in place. If the Commission makes a negative determination, the Department of Commerce will revoke the orders.

Additional questionnaires will be supplied promptly upon request, or photocopies of the enclosed questionnaire(s) may be used. <u>Due date of questionnaire(s)</u>.--Return the completed questionnaire(s) to the United States International Trade Commission by no later than April 19, 2006. Although the enclosed postpaid envelope may be used to return the completed questionnaire, use of an overnight mail service may be necessary to ensure that your response actually reaches the Commission by April 19, 2006. If you do not use the enclosed envelope, please make sure the completed questionnaire is sent to the attention of Eric Land. Return <u>only one</u> copy of the completed questionnaire(s), but please keep a copy for your records so that you can refer to it if the Commission staff contacts you with any questions during the course of the reviews.

<u>Service of questionnaire response(s)</u>.--In the event that your firm is a party to these reviews, you are required to serve a copy of the questionnaire(s), once completed, on parties to the proceeding that are subject to administrative protective order (see 19 CFR § 207.7). A list of such parties is maintained by the Commission's Secretary and may be obtained by calling 202-205-1803. A certificate of service must accompany the copy of the completed questionnaire(s) you submit (see 19 CFR § 207.7).

<u>Confidentiality</u>.--The commercial and financial data furnished in response to the enclosed questionnaire(s) that reveal the individual operations of your firm will be treated as confidential by the Commission to the extent that such data are not otherwise available to the public and will not be disclosed except as may be required by law (see 19 U.S.C. § 1677f). Such confidential information will not be published in a manner that will reveal the individual operations of your firm; however, nonnumerical characterizations of numerical business proprietary information (such as discussion of trends) will be treated as confidential business information only at the request of the submitter for good cause shown.

<u>Verification</u>.--The information submitted in the enclosed questionnaire(s) is subject to audit and verification by the Commission. To facilitate possible verification of data, please keep all your workpapers and supporting documents used in the preparation of the questionnaire response(s).

Release of information.--The information provided by your firm in response to the questionnaire(s), as well as any other business proprietary information submitted by your firm to the Commission in connection with the reviews, may become subject to, and released under, the administrative protective order provisions of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C. § 1677f) and section 207.7 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure (19 CFR § 207.7). This means that certain lawyers and other authorized individuals may temporarily be given access to the information for use in connection with these reviews or other import-injury investigations or reviews conducted by the Commission on the same or similar merchandise; those individuals would be subject to severe penalties if the information were divulged to unauthorized individuals.

INSTRUCTIONS

<u>Answer all questions</u>.--Do not leave any question or section blank unless a questionnaire expressly directs you to skip over certain questions or sections. If the answer to any question is "none," write "none." If information is not readily available from your records in exactly the form requested, furnish carefully prepared estimates--designated as such by the letter "E"--and explain the basis of your estimates. Answers to questions and any necessary comments or explanations should be supplied in the space provided or on separate sheets attached to the appropriate page of the questionnaire(s). If your firm is completing more than one questionnaire in connection with these reviews (i.e., a producer, importer, purchaser, and/or foreign producer questionnaire), you need not respond to duplicated questions in the questionnaires.

<u>Consolidate all establishments in the country for which you are reporting</u>.--Report the requested data for your establishment(s) located in Korea and/or Taiwan. Firms operating more than one establishment in Korea should combine the data for all establishments in Korea into a single report; likewise, firms operating more than one establishment in Taiwan should combine the data for all establishments in Taiwan into a single report.

DEFINITIONS

A-312 welded austenitic stainless steel pipes ("welded A-312 pipes").--Welded austenitic (chromium-nickel) stainless steel pipes of circular cross section that meet the standards and specifications set forth by the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) product designation ASTM A-312; or meet the standards of other nations which are comparable to ASTM A-312; imports of such pipes covered by subheadings 7306.40.10 and 7306.40.50 of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTS). Although the designation ASTM A-312 covers both seamless and welded austenitic stainless steel pipes, only the welded form is subject to these reviews. Major applications for welded austenitic stainless steel pipes are digester lines, blow lines, pharmaceutical lines, petrochemical stock lines, brewery process and transport lines, general food processing lines, automotive paint lines, and paper processing machines.*

<u>Other welded stainless steel pipes ("other welded pipes")</u>.—These pipes include <u>any</u> welded pipe that is made from stainless steel, whether austenitic, ferritic, or martensitic, except for ASTM A-312 pipe described above. This category includes, but is not limited to, ASTM A-358, A-409, and A-778 pipes. This category does not include pressure tubes.*

<u>Welded austenitic stainless steel pressure tubes ("welded pressure tubes")</u>.--These tubes include, but are not limited to, ASTM A-249, A-269, A-270, and A-688 pressure tubes. Uses for these tubes include, but are not limited to, boiler, super-heater, condenser, and heat exchanger tubes, general corrosion-resistant service, dairy and food applications, where cleanliness and corrosion-resistance is important, and feed water heater units in power stations.*

<u>Welded stainless steel pipes and pressure tubes</u>.--Welded A-312 pipes, other welded pipes, and welded pressure tubes, as described above.*

* <u>NOTE</u>,--<u>ALL</u> DEFINITIONS ABOVE <u>EXCLUDE</u> GRADE 409 PIPES (AISI type 409 (UNS S40900) stainless steel, non-austenitic, used primarily for automotive-exhaust systems and other exhaust applications, such as in high-efficiency home-heating furnaces) AND MECHANICAL TUBES.

DEFINITIONS--Continued

<u>Firm</u>.--An individual proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, association, corporation (including any subsidiary corporation), business trust, cooperative, trustee in bankruptcy, or receiver under decree of any court.

Related firm.--A firm that your firm solely or jointly owned, managed, or otherwise controlled; a firm that solely or jointly owned, managed, or otherwise controlled your firm; and/or a firm that was solely or jointly owned, managed, or otherwise controlled by a firm that also solely or jointly owned, managed, or otherwise controlled your firm.

Establishment.--Each facility of a firm in Korea and/or Taiwan involved in the production, importation, and/or purchase of welded A-312 pipes (as defined above), including auxiliary facilities operated in conjunction with (whether or not physically separate from) such facilities.

<u>United States</u>.--For purposes of these reviews, the 50 States, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and the District of Columbia.

<u>Importer</u>.--Any person or firm engaged, either directly or through a parent company or subsidiary, in importing welded A-312 pipes (as defined above) into the United States from a foreign manufacturer or through its selling agent.

<u>Average production capacity</u>.--The level of production that your establishment(s) could reasonably have expected to attain during the specified periods. Assume normal operating conditions (i.e., using equipment and machinery in place and ready to operate; normal operating levels (hours per week/weeks per year) and time for downtime, maintenance, repair, and cleanup; and a typical or representative product mix).

<u>Production</u>.--All production in your establishment(s) in Korea and/or Taiwan, including production consumed internally within your firm.

Shipments.--Shipments of products produced in your establishment(s) in Korea and/or Taiwan.

Shipment quantities.--Quantities reported should be net of returns.

<u>Shipment values</u>.--Values reported should be net values (i.e., gross sales values less all discounts, allowances, rebates, prepaid freight, and the value of returned goods) in <u>U.S. dollars</u>, f.o.b. your point of shipment in Korea and/or Taiwan.

Home market commercial shipments.--Shipments, other than internal consumption and transfers to related firms, within Korea and/or Taiwan.

<u>DEFINITIONS</u>--Continued

Home market internal consumption/transfers to related firms.--Shipments made to related firms in Korea and/or Taiwan, including product consumed internally by your firm.

Export shipments.--Shipments to destinations outside Korea and/or Taiwan, including shipments to related firms.

Inventories.--Finished goods inventory, not raw materials or work-in-progress.
