## Effective Thursday, August 28, 2008:

## What's **OPEN** in the Egley Complex vicinity:

- All roads and areas outside of the Egley Complex fire perimeter
- Delintment Lake, Emigrant, Falls, Tiptop and Yellowjacket Recreation Sites as well as Allison Guard Station

## What remains **CLOSED** in the Egley Complex vicinity:

Motorized access remains closed on public lands within the Egley Complex fire perimeter. Access
in this area is permitted by foot, horseback, or bicycle only.

If you're planning to visit the Egley wildfire complex area, traveling with a current closure map is essential. Maps can be obtained free of charge at the Burns District BLM office, the Emigrant Creek Ranger District office, the Malheur National Forest offices in Prairie City and John Day, B & B Sporting Goods in Hines and beginning on Thursday, August 28, 2008 at <a href="https://www.fs.fed.us/r6/malheur">www.fs.fed.us/r6/malheur</a>.
