# **Greater Yellowstone Area Completes Green House Gas Inventory**

- Collectively the six National Forests in the Greater Yellowstone Area have completed the first anthropogenic greenhouse gas (GHG) emission inventory under our agency-wide EPA Climate Leader's agreement.
- This pilot has identified numerous opportunities for improvement in our data collection systems.
- This work connects directly with several of the goals under the Agency's Climate Change Framework.

#### What are Greenhouse Gases?

 Gases that trap heat in the atmosphere, occur naturally and are emitted to the atmosphere through natural processes and human activities

### What is a Green House Gas Inventory?

 Record of the amount of green house gases emitted to or removed from the atmosphere over a specific period of time
