Records Management - an Important Responsibility

You may have heard that VA must comply with new Federal Records Management laws. Actually, these laws are not new and VA has been very diligent about maintaining its federal records. We need everyone's help in reviving these responsibilities and managing records in accordance with the laws created by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA).

NARA regulations stipulate that all government agencies must meet certain standards on how they create, use, maintain, save, or destroy the records used for normal government business. This requirement applies to all federal records regardless of the form they take, including electronic, paper, film, and other record types used by VA to do business. The regulations make it possible for government agencies to find records when needed and appropriately dispose of records no longer needed, thus reducing the risk of information loss.

How can you help VA comply with this important responsibility?

All facilities should have a Records Manager assigned with their name reported to Kenya Van Doren (kenya.vandoren@va.gov), Veterans Health Administration's new Records Manager. The next step is assigning a Records Liaison for each office within your facility. These liaisons are tasked with making sure NARA requirements are followed in their respective office. NARA specifies a number of responsibilities a facility should meet, including keeping an inventory of the records created, and managing and destroying those records in accordance with VHA's Record Control Schedule -- the officially approved schedule for how and when VHA may destroy Federal Records. VHA Records Control Schedule 10-1, last published in March 2008, is the authoritative source of information on records retention and disposition in VHA. - 1. Identifying operational needs, including basic facility infrastructure needs and maintenance support, as well as operational needs generated by new developments or modernization
- 2. Prioritizing these needs, including defining the role of the IDMC in the Operational Prioritization Process
- 3. Creating a method for escalating issues; possibly a formal tracking and reporting structure
- 4. Ensuring customers know the appropriate points of contact for specific issues
- 5. Adding OI&T Human Resources Issues as an agenda item

All participants found the meeting beneficial and plans are underway for future, regularly-scheduled joint meetings.

Class III to Class I Announcement -Shift Change Handoff Tool

Congratulations to the Shift Change Handoff Tool pilot project team! Following its release to Enterprise Product Support on June 18, the project became the second successfully deployed Class III to Class I conversion project. Many individuals' hard work aided in the release of the Shift Change Handoff Tool project software, including developer Charlet Lynn Cottee and project manager Kenny Condie. National release of the software is currently in progress. The Office of Enterprise Development and VHA Office of Information would like to congratulate this team on this great accomplishment!

The Shift Change Handoff Tool software will be used by VA Medical Center (VAMC) physicians to standardize communication across shift handoffs. The tool provides concise and standard written reports for staff changing shifts. Physicians can quickly review patient reports and immediately follow up with colleagues going off duty to ensure continuity of veteran care. The tool was developed in response to the National Center for Patient Safety's assessment that communication issues are the largest contributing factor to adverse events reported by the VAMCs.

The Class III to Class I Conversion initiative is a standardized assessment process designed to deploy local innovative solutions on a national level. All VHA software developed outside of the Office of Enterprise Development (OED) development is considered Class III. Field development has long contributed to VistA's success, customer focus, and sustained evolution. It complements and extends development done by OED. The Class III to Class I conversion initiative works actively to bring the best in field innovation to a Class I level for national deployment.
