Flood waters entered at least six homes. Several people had to be evacuated from their homes. One bridge sustained damage from flood waters **Adams County** 03 0700CST Flash Flood Countywide Flooding occurred on several streets in the county, mainly in the Natchez area. **Lawrence County** 5K Countywide 03 0830CST Flash Flood Several roads were closed due to flooding including portions of Highway 84 between Silver Creek and the Jefferson Davis County **Lincoln County** Countywide 03 0830CST 1030CST 12K Flash Flood Rainfall of up to six to seven inches accumulated in portions of the county causing many streams and ditches to overflow onto roads. One bridge was washed out, and a number of roads had to be closed for many hours. **Simpson County** 8K Flash Flood Countywide 03 0830CST 0 1000CST Flood waters covered several roads in the county, and flood waters produced 4 inches of water in the hallways of a nursing home. **Rankin County** Richland 03 1215CST 1400CST 20K Flash Flood Significant street flooding occurred in portions of the town of Richland. Flood waters entered up to five homes. Jefferson Davis County Countywide 03 1630CST Flash Flood Additional heavy rainfall fell on saturated ground. Flood waters rapidly rose in creeks and ditches, causing flooding of a number of roads and streets in the county. **Forrest County** Hattiesburg 04 1630CST 1905CST 100K Flash Flood Numerous streets were flooded in Hattiesburg, especially in southern portions of the city where up to six inches of rain fell in several hours. Water seeped into several buildings on the University of Southern Mississippi Campus, and at least 15 cars were flooded in the vicinity of the University. **Lamar County** Countywide 0 100K Flash Flood Numerous roads across the county were flooded. In the West Hattiesburg area of northeast Lamar County, flood waters entered about 12 homes. **Rankin County** 3 W Fannin 08 Flash Flood Locally very heavy rainfall fell for several hours in a small portion of Rankin county just east of the Reservoir. Minor flash flooding

occurred on a number of streets as ditches and small streams overflowed.

The man was initially in critical, but stable condition. He recovered quickly and was discharged from the hospital several days later.
