Section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973

- 508 requires all Federal Electronic and Information Technology (E&IT) developed, maintained, procured, and used to be accessible to:
 - All Employees with disabilities
 - All Citizens with disabilities



When 508 Applies

- 508 applies to all E&IT even if there are no employees with disabilities in the office, branch, or even an entire Agency
- 508 only applies to the Federal Government





What is E&IT?

Includes information technology and any equipment or interconnected system or subsystem of equipment, that is used by a Federal agency/employee in the creation, conversion, or duplication of data or information.

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What EIT is Not*

The term does not include any equipment that contains embedded information technology that is used as an integral part of the product, but the principal function of which is not the acquisition, storage, manipulation, management, movement, control, display, switching, interchange, transmission, or reception of data or information. For example, HVAC (heating, ventilation, and air conditioning) equipment such as thermostats or temperature control devices, and medical equipment where information technology is integral to its operation, are not information technology.

*For Section 508 purposes.



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E&IT Examples

- E&IT includes:
 - Telephones
 - Multimedia and Video (videos, CD, web)
 - Web sites(Internet and Intranet)
 - Computers
 - Information Kiosks
 - Transaction Machines

- Software
- Office Equipment (i.e., copiers and fax machines)
- Information
 Documentation and
 Support (user guides, technical support)

508 Standards (36 CFR § 1194)

- Standards were written by US Access Board and they have the final word on interpretation
- Broad Categories such as Software, Computers, Web, etc. and E&IT may fall in more than one category

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Exemptions

- E&IT that:
 - Is incidental to a contract
 - Is used for National Security
 - Is "Back Office" E&IT
 - Is Commercially non-available
 - Imposes an undue burden on the Agency
 - Requires a fundamental alteration of the product
- If the E&IT is exempt, it is considered compliant with the Section 508 law.



Commercially Non-Available

Applies **only** to COTS – commercial-off-the-shelf products. If there is no COTS product that meets the applicable standards, then the Agency can claim <u>commercial non-availability</u> – since an accessible product does not exist at that time.

It is important to note that technology advances very quickly and this exception may only apply to a product for a limited time until newer technologies that are accessible are developed.













Fundamental Alteration

This means that making the product accessible would requires a change in the fundamental characteristic or purpose of the product or service, not merely a cosmetic or aesthetic change. EPA is not required to fundamentally change or alter a product of service in order to meet EPA's technical requirements.





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Undue Burden

- Imposes an undue burden on the Agency
- Defined as "significant difficulty or expense."
 However, the Agency must explain why meeting the standards would pose an undue burden for a given procurement action, and must still provide people with disabilities access to the information or data that is affected.
- Because the Agency's resources are looked at as a whole for justifying an undue burden request, it is not used as an exception very often and cannot be delegated below the SIO.





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What are these responsibilities?

It is everyone's responsibility at EPA to provide accessible E&IT whenever they

procure, create, maintain, and use

E&IT in accordance with Federal law, Access Board standards, and EPA policy.

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Specific Responsibilities for PRs

All purchase requests (PRs) for EIT must be:

- Approved by the requesting office's Senior Information Official (SIO), or Information Management Officer (IMO), Division Director or Branch Chief
- Undue burden and undue burden class determination cannot be approved below the SIO level

When should I think about 508?

At the beginning (and throughout the life of) a project, a procurement, development of a statement of work, etc.

- Ask yourself is "it" EIT? Does Section 508 apply?
- Are there other considerations such as technical requirements?
- What standards may be applicable?
- Are there any 508 exceptions that apply?





Why should I think about 508 early on?

- The earlier you identify that you need to meet 508 standards, the easier it will be for you to comply.
- Cost less to build accessibility into the overall cost at the beginning than it does to pay retrofitting costs.
- You will be using time, resources, and your FTEs allotted to a project more efficiently.
- If you are using contractors for your project, you can specify that the product needs to be 508 compliant. (You still have the responsibility to verify that the end product is 508 compliant.)
