This strenuous 4-mile hike will take us to the Continental Divide, crossed by Meriwether Lewis on July 7,

July 9, 2005, Saturday 8:30am-4:30pm Instructors: Local Lewis and Clark historians Meet in Fort Benton at the canoe launch by the

fairgrounds at 8:30 am (sharp!). Paddle where the Corps of Discovery poled, pulled and explored. Enjoy a deli-style lunch at the Grog Spring, a normally inaccessible Lewis and Clark site on private land. Contemplate the river's history as our experienced



outfitter and an interpreter from the Lewis and Clark Center share the challenges the expedition and later fur trade faced during the 22 scenic miles between Fort Benton and Loma. "mystic warriors of the plains." Bring sunscreen, water and weather-appropriate clothing. Meet in Browning at the *Museum of the Plains Indians* at 10:30 am (sharp!), car pool to sites. Participants wishing to stay over night in Browning are invited to contact Darrell Norman's Bed and Breakfast to experience a night or two in an authentic Blackfoot lodge. Travelers on the Old North Trail

Learn from our instructor about his Metis culture, a unique blend of Cree, Chippewa, French, English and Scottish heritage. Once numbering over 30,000 people, many settled in the area west of Choteau. Bring water, weather – appropriate clothing and sunscreen. This will include a moderate amount of walking. Foods of the Lewis & Clark Expedition

August 13, 2005, Saturday. 12pm-7pm Instructors: Lewis and Clark Honor Guard, Fay E. Schaller

Here is a day where we eat as we learn! Several living history presenters explain the foods that were commonly eaten by the Corps of Discovery as they made their way to the Pacific Ocean and how these foods might have been prepared. Walk with us to Sacagawea Springs and learn different methods of journaling, including nature printing and leaf rubbing. Along the way, we will pause to journal the moment of a



bird's flight overhead, the grandeur of the river or whatever "surprises" await us. Remember, you don't have to be a great artist or writer to enjoy this activity.
