## Governor Signs Bills Affecting Veterans

In July and into August, Governor Kulongoski continued to sign bills that had passed through both the House and Senate during the recent legislative session. In the July-August issue of *VETS NEWS* a legislative update was provided. That information was current through the date the issue went to print.

Below are a few bills of interest to veterans that were signed by the Governor since the last issue.

**Senate Bill 590** – Governor signed June 20.

Expands crime of criminal impersonation to include impersonation of active member or veteran of the Armed Forces.

Senate Bill 822 – Governor signed June 20.

Requires public employer to provide preference to veteran or disabled veteran if veteran's score on evaluation or civil test is equal to, or higher than, the score or evaluation of person who is not a veteran or disabled veteran. It also allows a veteran to use preference more than once, and brings Oregon's veteran preference policy for public employment in line with the federal policy.

**Senate Bill 859** – Governor signed July 17.

Expands the number of entities that must be printed on Oregon income tax return forms for charitable donations by refund check-off. It requires that all Charitable Check-off entities rotate between the form and the roster or instruction booklet. The Oregon Veterans' Home is a Charitable Checkoff participant that stands to benefit as a result.

House Bill 2155 – Governor signed July 16.

Increases the maximum loan amortization period for home loans made to veterans from 30 years to 40 years.

House Bill 2208 – Governor signed July 31.

Makes veterans enrolled part-time in course

of study or professional training eligible for state financial aid.

**House Bill 2023** – Governor signed June 27.

Modifies active duty military service requirements needed to qualify for military homestead property tax exemption.

**House Bill 2237** – Governor signed June 27.

Eliminates annual claim filing requirement for veteran homestead property tax exemption, if exemption has been allowed in previous year and the ownership, use and other qualifying conditions remain unchanged. Continues annual filing requirement if basis for exemption includes satisfying maximum total gross income ceiling.

**House Bill 3009** – Governor signed June 27.

Permits a second state Oregon Veterans' Home to admit spouses of war veterans. Eliminates certificate of need requirement for second Oregon Veterans' Home.

**House Bill 3161** – Governor signed June 25.

Consolidates numerous veterans plates into one, more attractive, veterans' plate. Provides a Gold Star family recognition plate.

**House Bill 3201** – Governor signed July 31.

Creates a federal tax credit for the first year of a physicians' participation in TRICARE. Also creates a credit for physicians who provide medical care on a regular basis to residents of the Oregon Veterans' Home.

#### U.S. BLIND GOLF ASSOCIATION SEEKS OREGON MEMBERS

For people who are legally blind or are losing their sight and are interested in golf, there is good news. The U.S. Blind Golf Association (USBGA) is recruiting golfers to become part of a growing organization for the sightless.

Korean War veteran, and former U.S. Marine, Chuck Ponder is one of two members of Oregon's new chapter. He says he has lost about three-quarters of his sight and is



encouraging veterans or anyone who is vision impaired and would like to golf or assist blind golfers to become involved in their group.

"Just because one is blind or losing their sight doesn't mean they can't enjoy playing golf," Ponder said. "Former USGBA President Bob Andrews lost his sight in combat while serving in Vietnam. Golfing is great exercise plus, you don't have to be a veteran to join."

Oregon is already on the USGBA's map. In 2005, Oregon City hosted a national tour event and Woodburn played host to a USGBA international golf tournament in 2006. This year's USBGA National Championship will be held September 23-27, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

#### National Suicide Prevention Hotline

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has ramped up mental health outreach by providing round-the-clock access to trained professionals. This includes a national suicide prevention hotline for veterans. The toll-free hotline number is 1-800-273-TALK (8255).

"All service members who experience the stresses of combat can have wounds on their minds as well as their bodies. Veterans should see mental health services as another benefit they have earned, which the men and women of VA are honored to provide," Secretary Jim Nicholson said. #### Wounded Warriors Report Delivered

The President's Commission on Care for America's Returning Wounded Warriors report is complete and was delivered to the White House the morning of July 25. The Commission conducted a comprehensive review of services America is providing to our wounded warriors. Bob Dole, a disabled World War II veteran, along with University of Miami President Donna Shalala were appointed by the Commander-in-Chief to investigate problems at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. In the afternoon, the President jogged with two wounded warriors on the South Lawn of the White House.

In a post-jog interview President Bush said, "First of all, the spirit of that report is, any time we have somebody hurt, they deserve the best possible care, and their family needs strong support. We've provided that in many cases, but to the extent we haven't, we're going to adjust. In that recommendation, there are things the United States Congress should do, and I call upon them to do it."

### Oregon Agencies Funded to Help Homeless Veterans

Homeless veterans in 37 states, including Oregon will get more assistance thanks to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) selection of 92 community organizations to receive funds for transitional housing this year. On July 11, the VA announced that homeless veterans in Medford and Portland will have more resources.

Interfaith Care Community of Medford is being funded with \$182,792 that allows for 16 beds. In Portland, Transition Projects, Inc. is being funded with \$148,519 to provide 13 beds. Today, it is estimated that in the U.S. approximately 200,000 veterans may be homeless on an average night, which represents a 20 percent reduction during the past six years.

#### Nicholson to Resign

Secretary of Veterans Affairs Jim Nicholson announced he has tendered his resignation to President George W. Bush, effective no later than October 1. Nicholson, a Vietnam Veteran, was sworn in as Secretary of Veterans Affairs on February 1, 2005.

Nicholson said he wants to return to the private sector. "This coming February, I turn 70 years old, and I feel it is time for me to get back into business, while I still can." He stated he has no definite plans at this time.

He also addressed an assembled group of Washington VA employees and those watching around the country on VA's closed-circuit television. In his message to employees, Nicholson told them how privileged he felt to have worked with them in fulfilling our nation's promises and obligations to its veterans.

### - Correction - Aid and Attendance Benefit Information

In the July-August issue of *VETS NEWS* an article titled "Aid and Attendance Benefits" appeared on page 9. The article contained some false information and we offer our apologies for any inconvenience this may have caused.

In clarification, the article stated in the sixth paragraph that Aid and Attendance benefit amounts were in addition to regular compensation or pension that the VA might already be paying a recipient. That is not so. The amounts given included the total benefit available, combining Aid and Attendance and either compensation or pension benefits.

# A Message from the Veterans' Affairs Advisory Committee Chair

I must say, being elected the new Chair of the Governor's Advisory Committee to the Director of the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs (ODVA) is quite an honor. As I assume command in September. I will do my best to uphold the duties of the Chair, and to move our committee forward.

First, I would like to thank outgoing Committee Chair, David Fairclo, for his great leadership and service to the Committee and to the Department.

My family's military history is as follows: My maternal uncle was a Marine at Guadalcanal and Iwo Jima. My father served in Europe with the U.S. Army and was in the Battle of the Bulge. Another uncle, also in the Army, was in the Korean War. As for myself, I served four years in the U.S. Navy, which included one year in Vietnam.

My message today is two-fold, and I begin with a pair of issues:

#### **VETERANS' HOME**

The first item on any Oregon veteran's list is to help all other Oregon veterans. At the top of this list is our Oregon Veterans' Home. We need more veteran's homes, like our Home in The Dalles. If you want to see success up close, please visit the Home or at least visit the ODVA website. You will be amazed at the efficiency and care all veterans and spouses are afforded. Indeed, we need about four new homes, situated throughout the state, to assist all of Oregon's veterans. I urge you to contact your state legislators and ensure their support of veteran causes. We must have a steadfast presence with our duly-elected officials, or we pay the consequences of being ignored or worse, forgotten. This is an area of great need that takes untold hours of planning and political maneuvering, which cannot be fully explained in this paragraph. You will be hearing more from me about this in future issues of the VETS NEWS.

#### **VETERAN ASSISTANCE**

I am not talking about the homeless or those veterans who do not help themselves. For those, there are numerous government sources that are in place and ready to help. This statement may prove to be very controversial, and I am sure I will receive numerous letters and calls. However, as with any society, we must direct assistance and mentorship to those who are expanding their horizons, who are upstanding citizens and who will contribute to the good of all.

We, the veterans from World War II through Vietnam, are already established and contributing. But, we have many new and younger veterans who need us, as we can mentor and help alleviate the blockades and bumps they will encounter. They are our future. They have immediate needs, such as housing, schooling and benefits. Perhaps above all else, they could use guidance in starting or entering the business world.

When I came home from Vietnam, I was completely on my own, as all of us were. I had to hide my military background in order to get a job. In fact, I was instructed to remove any reference to being in the U.S. Navy from my resume. We cannot let this happen to our veterans ever again.

Jim Willis, the Director of the ODVA, is well aware of these problems and is initiating processes to open new avenues for veterans.

The end of this message is directed to all Oregon Hispanic or Latino veterans (I prefer the word Latino). I realize there are veterans of all ethnicities and we all are bonded by our contributions, by honor, duty, and country. Yet, it is important that Latino veterans become more involved in our community and our state. Together, we can accomplish many things, assist others less fortunate, and share our knowledge and heritage. I am asking all Latino veterans to contact me. I need your help in organizing an effective community group that will be heard and recognized in Oregon from end to end

Understand that I tried this once before and failed miserably. It seems the Latino veteran is not interested in what happens to all veterans across Oregon. Prove me wrong.

In closing, please remember, the Advisory Committee is in place to assist the Director of the ODVA and to help make a difference for all veterans in our wonderful state.

## DoD Institutes "Wearable Power" Competition

In an attempt to equip America's fighting forces with portable electricity to power their electronic equipment, the Department of Defense is instituting a "Wearable Power" competition in which prize money will be paid to the ones who come up with the most efficient means of giving our troops in the field the electrical power they need for their high-tech equipment.

John Young, Director of DoD's Defense Research and Engineering, announced a public prize competition on July 5, to develop a wearable electric power system for the military. The competition will take place in the fall of 2008 and will pay prizes of \$1 million for first place, \$500,000 for second and \$250,000 for third place.

Today's military personnel carry essential electronic equipment such as radios, night vision devices and global positioning systems, all of which run on batteries. The batteries for these devices can be heavy, and this competition is, in part, to devise a way of lessening the weight of such batteries.

The objective of the competition is to design a wearable prototype system that can power a standard servicemember's equipment for 96 hours, which weighs less than half of current batteries. All components, including power generator, electrical storage, control electronics, connectors and fuel must weigh four kilograms or less, including any attachments.

A public forum will be held in Washington D.C. to brief potential competitors on the technical details, rules and requirements. Details on the forum, as well as contest registration and rules are posted on the Defense Research and Engineering website at <a href="https://www.dod.mil/ddre/prize">www.dod.mil/ddre/prize</a>.



### "FLYING TIGER" JERNSTEDT TURNS 90, GOVERNOR HONORS HIS SERVICE

Oregon's first air war ace and one of the original members of the American Volunteer Group (AVG), the Flying Tigers, Ken Jernstedt, celebrated his 90th birthday on July 20. Governor Ted Kulongoski paid tribute to the milestone and honored the former state legislator with a personal letter and a commemorative plaque.

During a family reunion on July 21 in Wilsonville, Jernstedt's long-time friend and fellow-World War II veteran, Staryl Austin, presented mementos and best wishes from the governor. A member of the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs Governor's Advisory Committee, Austin said "It is a real privilege for me to represent Governor Kulongoski and to present this recognition on such a great occasion to a good friend and fellow P-47 pilot."

The Governor's plaque recognized Jernstedt for his faithful and honorable contributions to the nation, state and his community. His letter congratulated Hood River's elder statesman and former mayor.

"Part of your legacy will be that your personal and professional successes have never overshadowed your love of country or your desire to be a good neighbor – and a giving friend," Kulongoski wrote.

With more than 50 family members watching, Jernstedt stood and remarked that he felt honored. "This is a wonderful surprise. I've had a very interesting life. I've known Ted since we served in the senate together and have always liked him."

Jernstedt served 22 years in the Oregon legislature as a State Representative (1967-69) and State Senator (1969-89). He also served

as the mayor of Hood River where he still resides with his wife, Gen.

He prides himself on having the shortest floor speech in the history of the state legislature. In the 1970s, a fellow lawmaker's arguments were essentially the same ones Jernstedt planned to make. When called upon to speak, he rose and said, "Ditto."

While an AVG Flight Leader between September 1941 and July 1942, Jernstedt is credited with destroying more than 10 Japanese aircraft, including five aerial kills. He later served as a P-47 experimental test pilot at Republic Aviation.

In another example of personal information being exposed to hackers and ID thieves, data for nearly 600,000 households enrolled in TRICARE stored on a government-contractor's unprotected computer server could have been exposed to hackers.

TRICARE has announced plans to head off any possible threats beneficiaries may experience.

The Department of Defense and the Science Applications International Corp. (SAIC) are mailing letters to beneficiaries whose data was put at risk. An incident response center has been set up and can be reached toll free within the United States at 1-888-862-2680, or collect at 1-515-365-3550 from outside the United States.

#### SEABEES: We Build, We Fight!

The Navy Seabees are known widely as the Construction Force of the United States Armed Forces. During a time of war, the majority of the work being accomplished by Seabees takes place in combat zones filled

with intense conflict. The intensity of combat situations, along with unique field training exercises make Seabees mentally and physically able to accomplish arduous duties. Simply stated, they build, they fight and they train.

Seabees also save lives. It was just a few days before Christmas in 1964 when Steel Worker (E) Second Class Leeman A. White attempted to save the lives of a Vietnamese mother and her three children. Forty-two years later, recognition for White's war efforts were made public at the Albany American Legion Post #10 with a gathering of family,

friends, military servicemembers and war veterans. For all of those days, weeks and years, White had yet to be awarded the Navy Commendation Medal (NCM), with Combat Valor "V" device.

White was born in Lebanon, Oregon and attended Union High School in Albany. Like many war veterans, White left high school early to serve his country. Shipping off with the Navy, White served two honorable enlistments with the Seabees that included service in the Vietnam war.

Admiral Roy L. Johnson, who at the time was Commander-in-Chief of the U.S. Pacific Fleet (CINCPACFLT), signed the NCM. CINCPACFLT is the world's largest fleet command and currently encompasses 100 million square miles and more than 170 ships and submarines, 1,300 aircraft, and 122,000 Sailors, Reservists and civilians.

Once White returned from the war, he went about his life. Some 42 years later, White's

brother Louie could wait no longer to see his brother get his due. Although the citations and medals had been awarded, White was never formally presented the medal, and never adorned the medal over all those years.

Unique to the event was the common bond with presentation of the medal and citation. Navy recruiter, 1<sup>st</sup> Class Petty Officer Gene Murphy read the citation. Murphy also a Seabee, holds the same steel worker rating Murphy held, along with Seabee Combat Warfare (SCW). The bond strengthened when a Navy Vietnam veteran pinned on the medal and welcomed White home. That Vietnam brother was retired Master Chief Petty Officer Dave Teem, who served in Korea, Vietnam and Desert Storm.

Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs Director Jim Willis, also a Vietnam war veteran, served as Master of Ceremonies for the event. Directly after the ceremony, Willis explained the importance of the medal. More importantly, Willis noted that with or without having the medals, White had known for all these years that he saved the lives of those family members.

## OREGON HONORABLE SERVICE MEDALS TO BE PRESENTED

Dallas High School, located at 1250 Holman Avenue, will be the venue for a presentation ceremony to be held on October 27, hosted by American Legion Post 20 and VFW Post 3203. The ceremony will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the auditorium and will feature the presentation of the Oregon Honorable Service Medal to veterans of all eras who were discharged under honorable conditions.

Veterans who are interested in being presented with the Oregon Honorable Service Medal at this ceremony must pre-register. For information regarding the ceremony or requirements for registration, you can contact Veterans of Oregon at 503-622-6084 or contact Jack Magnuson at 503-623-5246. Registration must be completed no later than October 20th.

Veterans must be present to receive the medal as it cannot be mailed and are only presented with the authority of the Veterans of Oregon. The family of a deceased veteran may apply to accept the medal on the veteran's behalf.

### SALUTING THE U.S. FLAG

The United States Senate has passed by unanimous consent a bill clarifying U.S. law to ensure that veterans and servicemembers not in uniform can salute the flag.


**S.1877**, sponsored by Oklahoma Senator Jim Inhofe, addresses the ambiguity of current law, which states that veterans and servicemembers not in uniform should place their hand over their hearts and does not specify whether they can salute the flag.

This bill would amend title 4, United States Code, to prescribe that members of the Armed Forces and veterans out of uniform may render the military salute during hoisting, lowering, or passing of the U.S. flag. The bill now moves to the House of Representatives to be voted on before President Bush can sign it into law.

#### Oregon Survivor Returns to Midway Island

It had been 65 years since John Besson of Lake
Oswego had been to Midway Atoll in the south
Pacific. On June 6, Rear Admiral (Ret.) John
Besson, 94, was one of three Midway survivors to
return to the site of what historians call the most
decisive victory and the most important American
naval engagement of World War II.

When the Battle of Midway took place, from June 4-7, 1942, Beeson was a 29-year-old assistant engineer assigned in the aft engine room on *USS Pensacola*—a heavy cruiser that was escorting *USS Enterprise* and *USS Yorktown*. "You didn't know what to think. You went to your battle station and



wondered what was going to happen," said Beeson, a 1935 U.S. Naval Academy graduate. "My only worry was if a torpedo slammed into the ship, I was in trouble."

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and U.S. Navy co-hosted more than 1,600 visitors and senior government officials, many of whom had arrived aboard a cruise ship to take part in 65<sup>th</sup> anniversary ceremonies and celebrations.

Located nearly 1,300 miles northwest of Honolulu, Midway Atoll is now a wildlife refuge.



#### AIR FORCE TO CELEBRATE 60 YEARS

During World War I they were known as the United States Signal Corps. By 1926, the Air Corps became the branch for U.S. Army aviation. In June 1941, the Army Air Forces (AAF) came into being six months before Pearl Harbor.

For years, even before World War II, airminded leaders planned to create an independent Air Force. During the post-war years, it finally became a reality when the U.S. Air Force was formed on Sept. 18, 1947.

The Air Force will be commemorating 60 years of Air and Space power on September 18, a celebration that began in October 2006 with the dedication of the new Air Force Memorial in Washington D.C.

With its achievements in air superiority, the stated mission of today's Air Force is to "Deliver sovereign options for the defense of the United States of America and its global interests – to fly and fight in Air, Space, and Cyberspace."

#### Tribal Member Walks Trail of Tears

To honor veterans, his Native American ancestors and three family members who died during within the last year, Grande Ronde tribal member Steve Rife walked more than 300 miles along

Oregon's Trail of Tears from June 23 to July 7.

A member of the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde, Rife began his journey along the Applegate Trail east of Medford at Upper Table Rock. He then walked along Interstate 5 to Eugene before heading north along Highway 99W. After turning onto Highway

22, Rife continued west to Grand Ronde. Friends drove his motorhome so Rife had a place to sleep and rest during his long trek.

"It was my first time walking the Oregon part of the Trail. There were many hot days,


but I had my late-wife Margi's picture on my Eagle Staff. She kept me going," Rife said.

The Trail of Tears refers to the forced relocation of several Native American tribes

> beginning in 1831 caused by the "Indian Removal Act of 1830." Although many Americans were against the Act, President Andrew Jackson quickly signed the bill into law. Despite challenges to the Bill by several tribes, tens of thousands of tribal members were forced to relocate by Federal troops assigned to enforce the treaty.

The actual Trail encompasses about 2,200 miles of land and water routes and traverses portions of nine states between South Carolina and Oklahoma. Rife said in the 1840s, tribal bands in Northern California and Southern Oregon were moved by Federal troops and relocated


#### Massing of the Colors in Portland

#### POW-MIA RECOGNITION DAY Proclaimed

Governor Ted Kulongoski has proclaimed September 21, to be "POW-MIA Recognition Day" in the state. The proclamation honors the service and sacrifice of American military personnel who have either been captured, held as prisoners of war, or who remain missing in action.

In his official proclamation, the Governor stressed that America must remain determined to gain a full accounting of POWs and MIAs, so they may be brought home with the honor and dignity they deserve.

"When we raise the black-and-white POW-MIA flag as a symbol to these missing Americans," said Jim Wills, Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs Director, "We honor the sacrifices and remarkable determination of those captured as prisoners of war and remember those who remain unaccounted for."

Oregon's observance will again coincide with the National POW-MIA Recognition Day that is celebrated annually on the third Friday in September.

#### WARNING TO MILITARY FAMILIES FROM THE AMERICAN RED **Cross**

The American Red Cross is warning military spouses about a new identity theft scam that targets family members of deployed

The scam involves people calling a military spouse, or family member and identifying themselves as a Red Cross representative and telling the individual or spouse that their loved one has been injured in Iraq and medically evacuated to Germany. The caller then explains that doctors cannot start treatment until they verify the servicemember's social security number and date of birth.

American Red Cross representatives do not typically contact military members or dependants directly, and almost always work through a Commander or First Sergeant.

The Department of Defense contacts families directly if their family member has been injured.

#### Daughter's Dedication To Father Helps Servicemembers, Survivors

It was one of the first questions asked of Kaye Hansen, former Office Manager and Administrative Assistant for the Tillamook Home Loan Office of ODVA. Little did I know that her answer would be so poignant, and have such far-reaching implications. I wanted to know why she got involved in the Home of the Brave Quilt Project, dedicated to making civil war replica quilts for families of fallen servicemembers.

"Dad is the guiding force behind my dedication to support our troops." Hansen spoke of how he was a great father and a proud, well-respected man who served in both Korea and Vietnam. "He never talked of the wars, I don't believe he ever felt respect or supported by the general public. I was just a teenager then, and although I didn't protest, I didn't thank and honor them either."

This reverence and

dedication to her father has led Kaye Hansen stands with a guilt handcrafted for the family to the support work that of a fallen servicemember. Hansen does today. In addition to helping recreate the civil war-era quilts to honor fallen servicemember and comfort their families, Hansen also participates in the "HUGS Project," an endeavor that brings instant relief, and arguably life-saving support, to troops serving in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The HUGS Project is a program in which volunteers create water-filled neck coolers that troops can tie around their necks to try and stave off the overwhelming heat of the Middle Eastern sun. The unique ties are comprised of a simple cotton bandana with

water absorbing material sewn into them. Once soaked in water for 30 minutes and "mushed up," the material creates a cool tube of relief that can make the scorching heat tolerable.

Letters of appreciation for the coolers have poured in. Some websites pertaining to the cool ties even claim the ties have been life saving when used on those suffering from heat stroke.

The neck coolers are Hansen's gift to those

sisters, wives and sweethearts of our brave soldiers, working scarcely less earnestly and efficiently for the same great end."

This army in the home, then set forth to produce more than 250,000 quilts over a two year period for the soldiers leaving for the battlefield. Only five of those original quilts are known to have survived and still exist today.

That's why I think of them now, every chance I get, and I have no doubt Dad is smiling down on me now every step of the way."
