WORKFORCE INVESTMENT ACT PERFORMANCE HIGHLIGHTS PY 2005 - 2007

The Office of Performance and Technology has developed a series of "WIA Snapshots" highlighting three years of data (Program Years 2005-2007) on the WIA Adult, Dislocated Worker, and Youth programs.¹ These snapshots provide an overview of recent trends in demographic characteristics, program information, services received, and performance outcomes for individuals who have exited (generally, these are program completers). A snapshot for each program is attached and a synopsis is provided below.

Demographic Characteristics

- The number of WIA Adults more than tripled between PY 2005 and PY 2007, largely due to a few states co-enrolling Wagner-Peyser Employment Service exiters.
- The share of WIA Adult exiters who are male increased from 42.2 percent in PY 2005 to 52.5 percent in PY 2007. For WIA Dislocated Worker exiters, the male share increased from 45.5 percent to 48.2 percent in the same time period. For the WIA Youth program, the male share declined slightly from 45.2 percent to 43.8 percent.
- The share of WIA Adult exiters who are Hispanic declined from 17.7 percent in PY 2005 to 12.0 percent in PY 2007. The Hispanic share was more stable among Dislocated Workers, remaining at 11.5 percent in PY 2005 and 2006, and rising slightly to 11.8 percent in PY 2007. For Youth exiters, the Hispanic share declined from 29.1 percent to 28.3 percent between PY 2005 and PY 2006, and then rose to 29.4 percent in PY 2007.
- The share of non-Hispanic African-Americans among Adult exiters declined from 33.7 percent in PY 2005 to 29.4 percent in PY 2007. Among Dislocated Workers the share fell from 36.0 percent in PY 2005 to 29.8 percent in PY 2007. Similarly, the African-American share among Youth exiters fell from 37.1 percent in PY 2005 to 34.3 percent in PY 2007.
- The share of non-Hispanic Whites among WIA Adult exiters rose from 41.8 percent in PY 2005 to 53.1 percent in PY 2007. Among WIA Dislocated Workers, it rose from 47.4 percent in PY 2005 to 53.3 percent in PY 2007. The share of Whites rose 28.8 percent in PY 2005 to 31.4 percent in PY 2007.
- While Hispanics, African-Americans, and White all experienced a numeric increase among WIA Adult exiters, only Whites showed an increase in percentage share because their increase was much greater (100 percent, 174 percent and 300 percent, respectively).
- The number of WIA Adult and Youth **Temporary Assistance for Needy Families** (TANF) recipients declined slightly in each of the last three years.
- The number of offenders served doubled from 10,501 to 22,756 in the WIA Adult population between PY 2005 and PY 2007.

Program Information

- The share of WIA Adults co-enrolled in the Wagner-Peyser Employment Service almost doubled between PY 2005 and PY 2007; New York's outcomes reported contributed to roughly half of the PY 2007 total.
- The share of Dislocated Workers co-enrolled in the Wagner-Peyser Employment Service almost doubled from PY 2005 to PY 2007; New York's outcomes contributed to roughly half of the PY 2007 total.
- Preliminary analysis indicates that co-enrollment of Wagner-Peyser Employment Service exiters may have caused the average length of participation for WIA Adults and Dislocated Workers to fall between PY 2005 and PY 2007: for WIA Adults, it dropped by 64 percent, from 42 weeks down to 15 weeks and for WIA Dislocated Workers, it dropped from 42 weeks to 31 weeks.

Services Received

- Roughly 110,000 WIA Adults continued to receive training but the share of training services as compared to other services (e.g., core and intensive) fell sharply from 45 percent to 14 percent because the number of WIA Adult exiters more than doubled as discussed above, and typically co-enrolled Wagner-Peyser Employment Service exiters do not receive training.
- The number of WIA Dislocated Workers who received training fell from roughly 82,000 in PY 2005 to 67,000 in PY 2007.
- Well below one-fifth of WIA Adults and Dislocated Workers program exiters received supportive services, such as assistance with transportation, assistance with uniforms or other appropriate work attire, or linkages to community services. In contrast, over one third of Youth program exiters received such services.

Performance Outcomes

- The Entered Employment Rate fell between PY 2005 and PY 2007 for WIA Adults and Dislocated Workers program exiters, mostly attributable to New York's reported outcomes, which were an increasing share of the denominator for these two measures due to their co-enrollment policy.
- Retention remains high, above 80 percent, for all three programs over all three years. This result is significant because in PY 2005 the definition for retention was changed to add another measurement point for retention (2nd and 3rd quarters after exit).
- Average Earnings rose significantly by 26 percent for WIA Adults program exiters, and increased 6.1 percent among WIA Dislocated Workers program exiters between PY 2005 and PY 2007.
