

### **CORNERSTONE IN FOCUS: Expanded Hospital Compare Web Site Provides Access to Medicare Information on Quality, Price**

New survey information available on the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services' (CMS) Hospital Compare Web site offers consumers more insight about the hospitals in their communities. The enhancements give consumers access to quality, patient satisfaction, and pricing information to make more informed decisions about the quality and value of the health care available to them through local hospitals.

HHS Secretary Mike Leavitt announced the newly updated Web site and praised the enhanced resource, noting "Medicare is strengthening its commitment to use the transparency of quality information to help give consumers more choice about the quality of their health care and how they may be able to lower their health care costs."

The Hospital Compare Web site currently provides information on 26 quality measures, which include process of care and outcome measures. The 10 new patient experience measures add to the existing information that gives consumers a picture of the quality of care delivered at their local hospitals. ### **Medicare Trustees Again Sound the Alarm on Program's Fiscal Health**

The Medicare Trustees announced last week that expenditures for the government health care program are still growing faster than the rest of the economy.

In releasing their report, Trustees noted that, "These projections demonstrate the need for timely and effective action to address Medicare's financial challenges. Consideration of such reforms should occur in the relatively near future. The sooner the solutions are enacted, the more flexible and gradual they can be."

President Bush submitted legislation in February that would modernize and transform Medicare, as required following the 2007 funding warning. The legislation would reduce Medicare spending through the application of value-based principles and give HHS the authority to use and release Medicare claims data for quality improvement, performance measurement, public reporting, and treatment purposes. The Minnesota Healthcare Value Exchange is dedicated to improving care and supporting the quality initiatives of providers, reducing reporting-related expenses for medical groups and health plans, and communicating its findings in a usable way to consumers. It is a partnership of four organizations: Minnesota Community Measurement (MNCM), the Buyers Health Care Action Group, the Institute for Clinical Systems Improvement, and Stratis Health.
