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- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Let me call to order a
- 3 meeting of the board of directors of the Legal Services
- 4 Corporation for Tuesday, November 27, 2007, pursuant to
- 5 a notice published in the Federal Register.
- This is the open session of that meeting. And
- 7 I would like to note for the record all those who are
- 8 present on the call. I'll ask each person to speak up,
- 9 please, so the reporter can confirm your attendance.
- 10 And this is Frank Strickland. So somebody else speak
- 11 up and let's go down the list.
- 12 MS. BeVIER: Lillian BeVier.
- MS. CHILES: Jonann Chiles.
- MS. SINGLETON: Sarah Singleton.
- MR. GARTEN: Am I still with you?
- 16 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes. Herb Garten?
- 17 MR. GARTEN: Yes. I'm in the comfortable
- 18 chair at the West Palm Beach airport, so I'm with you
- 19 for the rest of the duration.
- 20 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Great.
- 21 Other board members?
- MR. McKAY: Mike McKay.

- 1 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Tom Fuentes, are you
- 2 still with us?
- 3 MR. FUENTES: Yes, sir.
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: And Sarah Singleton?
- 5 MS. SINGLETON: Yes.
- 6 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Any other board members?
- 7 (No response.)
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Let's --
- 9 MS. BARNETT: Mr. Chairman, may I tell you
- 10 who's in the conference room?
- 11 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Please.
- 12 MS. BARNETT: In the conference room is Pat
- 13 Batie; Katherine Ward, Vic Fortuno's new executive
- 14 assistant; John Constance; Laurie Tarantowicz; Dutch
- 15 Merryman; Vic Fortuno; Charles Jeffress; John Meyer,
- and Karen Sarjeant is on the telephone. And this is
- 17 Helaine.
- 18 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. Welcome,
- 19 everybody, to our conference call meeting.
- The first item of business is approval of the
- 21 agenda. Is there any objection to approval of the
- agenda as published?

- 1 (No response.)
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Hearing none, I'll
- declare the agenda approved. And I trust that everyone
- 4 has a copy of the agenda.
- 5 The primary purpose of the open session of the
- 6 call, of the meeting, is to consider and act on the
- 7 board of directors' response to the Inspector General's
- 8 Semiannual Report to Congress for the period of April
- 9 1, 2007 through September 30, 2007.
- 10 And all of you should have received
- 11 electronically a draft of that document. Has everyone,
- 12 that is, board members, had a chance to receive and
- 13 review the electronic version of that document?
- MS. SINGLETON: Yes.
- MS. BeVIER: Yes.
- MR. GARTEN: Yes.
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. I have made
- 18 a couple of minor suggested edits, which I will call to
- 19 your attention.
- A cover letter, that is, a preface, where in
- 21 the last paragraph it says, "I am pleased to transmit,"
- I've suggested we change that to read, "We are pleased

- 1 to transmit." It's the text that we've used in
- 2 previous transmittals. That why I was taking out the
- 3 "I" and substituting "we."
- 4 And then I'm just paging down here to another
- 5 minor change. Charles, do you remember exactly where
- 6 that is?
- 7 MR. JEFFRESS: Well, page 20, I think --
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Which changed my middle
- 9 initial.
- MR. JEFFRESS: Yes.
- 11 MS. BeVIER: These are important.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: A minor point.
- MR. JEFFRESS: On page 23 is the middle
- initial, Frank, first paragraph on page 23.
- 15 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: And another page -- I
- don't know the page number -- but it said "October
- first, "f-i-r-s-t. I suggested changing that to
- "October 1," the number 1.
- MS. BARNETT: Page 25.
- 20 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. Page 25. And
- 21 then there was another. A couple of pages later, we
- refer to 138 programs. I raised the question whether

- 1 it's supposed to be 137. But for the period in
- 2 question, it may well be 138.
- 3 MR. JEFFRESS: Yes. For that particular
- 4 paragraph on page 27, at the top of page 27, we started
- out the year with 138 programs. So we used 138 there,
- 6 even though with the termination of American Samoa,
- 7 we're now down to 137.
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Later on
- 9 that page -- I don't seem to have page numbers. But
- 10 later on that same page, in the paragraph beginning
- 11 with -- it's under a caption called Review of 2008
- 12 Grant Proposals Underway.
- 13 And I had suggested in the second paragraph
- under there, after the words "the revised assurances"
- to insert "for 2008." And then put a period at the end
- 16 of -- after the word "process," leave the rest of the
- 17 sentence off. After you insert the words "for 2008," I
- 18 think it's redundant to have the rest of the sentence
- in there.
- 20 So I think those are all of my suggested
- 21 edits. Is that right, Charles?
- MR. JEFFRESS: Yes. I believe that's all of

- 1 yours. And we have one more. On page 29, since this
- draft went out, four more local boards have adopted
- 3 resolutions. So we now have 56 grantees adopting pro
- 4 bono resolutions on page 29 instead of 52.
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay.
- 6 MS. SARJEANT: Frank, this is Karen Sarjeant.
- 7 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Hey, Karen.
- 8 MS. SARJEANT: How are you?
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Good.
- 10 MS. SARJEANT: On page 27, in the paragraph
- 11 that begins, "In March" --
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes.
- 13 MS. SARJEANT: -- I think the correct language
- there should be "LSC terminated funding."
- 15 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Instead of "suspended"?
- MS. SARJEANT: Instead of "suspended." I'm
- 17 sorry I missed that earlier.
- 18 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: That's fine. I say it's
- okay. If I don't hear any objection, I'm going to
- 20 assume that other board members concur that that change
- is acceptable.
- 22 Any other proposed changes in the draft?

- 1 (No response.)
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. I raised at
- 3 the very beginning on the caption page, where we say
- 4 "Semiannual Reports," plural, have we previously used
- 5 reports or singular, report?
- 6 MR. JEFFRESS: We have previously reports
- 7 since the publication has included the OIG report and
- 8 the board of directors report.
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: So the plural reference
- is correct, then?
- MR. JEFFRESS: Yes.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. Fine with me.
- 13 All right. Is there any other discussion
- about the board of directors response?
- MS. SINGLETON: Could you go back to that last
- 16 point?
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: My point?
- 18 MS. SINGLETON: No. The point about reports.
- 19 Who are the two reports from, then?
- 20 MR. JEFFRESS: One is from the --
- 21 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: As I understand it, it's
- 22 from Legal Services Corporation Office of the Inspector

- 1 General and the board of directors.
- 2 MR. JEFFRESS: But they are separate reports.
- 3 The inspector general report has already been issued,
- 4 and this report, what you're looking at now, is the
- 5 board's response. This particular cover would have
- 6 both reports behind this cover.
- 7 MR. GARTEN: Didn't you bind the inspector
- 8 general report to this in the past?
- 9 MR. JEFFRESS: Yes. Yes.
- 10 MS. BARNETT: It's one document that includes
- 11 both when we transmit it on Friday.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: It's all in one binder.
- 13 Is that right?
- MS. BARNETT: That's correct.
- 15 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Both the board's report
- and the OIG's report?
- MS. BARNETT: That's correct.
- 18 MS. BeVIER: That's why the numbering on ours
- 19 doesn't start till 19.
- 20 MR. JEFFRESS: That's correct. The first 18
- 21 pages are the OIG report.
- 22 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: And this is

- 1 consistent -- I must admit I was a little confused by
- 2 the use of the term reports. But maybe I just forgot
- 3 how we had referred to it before. But I take it this
- 4 is consistent with prior presentations of the same
- 5 information to the Congress. Is that right?
- 6 MS. BARNETT: Yes. That's correct.
- 7 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right.
- 8 MR. GARTEN: There's a table of contents that
- 9 clearly shows that.
- 10 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Right. Any further
- 11 question, comment, or discussion about the draft
- 12 report?
- 13 MR. McKAY: Mike McKay. Turning to page 24,
- the section in the middle of the page where we have our
- 15 "Response to OIG Investigation of the Potential False
- 16 Statements to Congress," what we have there is
- 17 certainly fine with me.
- 18 I'm wondering if we have taken any steps to
- make sure this doesn't happen again, or reduce the
- 20 possibility of this happening again, or probability,
- such as having one last read-through by the general
- 22 counsel or by counsel.

- 1 Helaine, have we done anything? I mean,
- 2 obviously this was not intentional. We know it was
- 3 going on. We were hit with a ton of requests with a
- 4 tight timeline, and some information went to Congress
- 5 that was not completely accurate. Have you put into
- 6 place any procedures to maybe build in some more
- 7 safeguards?
- 8 MS. BARNETT: We do not have any written
- 9 procedures. But the procedures that we are following
- 10 going forward are requiring to see the backup
- 11 documentation at the time that we made any submissions.
- 12 MR. McKAY: And that's something you put into
- 13 place -- again, it doesn't have to be in writing, and I
- don't mean to suggest otherwise. But is that something
- that you put into place after this incident?
- MS. BARNETT: This incident caused us to do
- 17 that, yes.
- 18 MR. McKAY: Right. Well, I'm wondering if
- 19 might be appropriate to just simply say -- add one more
- 20 sentence that would say that, you know, management have
- 21 taken certain steps to make sure this doesn't happen
- again or reduce the probability of this happening

- 1 again, something to that effect.
- I just don't feel comfortable with our
- 3 response saying, as soon as we found the mistake, we
- 4 responded to Congress, as that being our closing
- 5 comment. I'd like us to tell Congress that we did what
- 6 we did, and that is we've taken certain steps to reduce
- 7 the probability of this happening again, without going
- 8 into detail.
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Do we want
- 10 to compose that sentence with some particularity right
- 11 now so we can be satisfied with it?
- 12 MR. McKAY: Why don't you give me a second, if
- 13 we can move on to something else, and I'll come back
- 14 with something shortly.
- 15 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right.
- MS. BeVIER: This is Lillian. I'm sort of
- 17 inclined on that particular sentence as well. I don't
- 18 know how to do this, and I realize that LSC
- 19 management -- there's no evidence that LSC management
- 20 knowingly provided false statements to Congress.
- I actually think that it's much stronger than
- 22 that. What was discovered was that it was obviously a

- 1 mistake, and solely unintentional. And I for one would
- 2 be content to have that aspect of that finding
- 3 emphasized.
- 4 And I do understand Mike's point about making
- 5 sure it's clear that we're not going to let it happen
- 6 again. But I also think the extent of the -- whatever
- 7 problem there was ought to be made very clear. It was
- 8 a mistake. It was a completely innocent mistake. And
- 9 to the extent that it resulted in any financial
- detriment to LSC, that was recompensed immediately upon
- 11 the discovery of the mistake.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Are you suggesting that
- 13 we say all that?
- 14 MS. BeVIER: No. Of course not. But I guess
- 15 what I'm first interested in is whether anybody else on
- 16 the board shares that view, or whether we just should
- 17 have it be least said, soonest mended, which is another
- 18 way to handle it.
- 19 But I'd sort of like it to be -- my own sense
- 20 would be I'd be happy if other members of the board
- 21 thought that, at the very least, maybe you could put in
- 22 a sentence: There's no evidence that LSC management

- 1 knowingly provided false statements to Congress;
- 2 indeed, the evidence is that whatever false statements
- 3 were made were completely innocent and the product of
- 4 an innocent mistake.
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Are you suggesting that
- 6 we include that wording, Lillian?
- 7 MS. BeVIER: Yes, I am.
- 8 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right.
- 9 MS. SINGLETON: I think we need to make it
- 10 clear that that is the board's opinion.
- MS. BeVIER: Yes.
- 12 MS. SINGLETON: Because I wouldn't read the
- 13 OIG's report as going that far.
- MS. BeVIER: Okay. Well, I would say that
- that is the board's opinion, then, because this is the
- 16 board's report. The board is convinced that.
- Do you want me to do some lang?
- 18 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes.
- 19 MR. FUENTES: Mr. Chairman, I think that it's
- 20 set in 24. Let's read what that sentence is. "During
- 21 this reporting period, the board received the OIG's
- 22 report on the investigation of potential false

- 1 statements to Congress with the OIG's conclusion that
- there is no evidence that LSC's management knowingly
- 3 provided false statements to Congress." I think that
- 4 goes about as far as I want to go.
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Does anybody
- 6 else have any comment on that?
- 7 MR. GARTEN: The next sentence sort of
- 8 indicates that we did provide information that was
- 9 inaccurate.
- 10 MS. BeVIER: We did. But they were -- but it
- 11 was completely -- it was a mistake.
- 12 MR. GARTEN: Well, then, why don't we say
- "mistakenly inaccurate"?
- MS. BeVIER: Oh, okay.
- MR. GARTEN: The word "mistakenly" in front of
- 16 "inaccurate." Is that --
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: That's fine with me.
- 18 MS. BeVIER: I just dropped my phone, so what
- 19 did others say after Herb said, why don't we just say
- "mistakenly inaccurate"?
- 21 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: No one said anything.
- He just suggested inserting the word "mistakenly"

- because the words "was" and "inaccurate."
- 2 MR. GARTEN: You seem to be in favor of that.
- 3 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes. That's fine with
- 4 me. Is that acceptable to the board?
- 5 MS. CHILES: Yes.
- 6 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: To insert that
- 7 additional word?
- 8 MS. CHILES: Yes.
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: As opposed to drafting
- 10 some additional -- and Mike McKay is working on some
- 11 additional wording about -- which he'll give us in a
- moment that I presume would be the follow-on sentence
- to the paragraph we're examining at the moment.
- MR. McKAY: Correct.
- MR. GARTEN: It may not be necessary.
- 16 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: We'll see when he comes
- 17 back to us.
- 18 MR. MEITES: Hello?
- 19 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Is that Tom Meites?
- MR. MEITES: Yes. I'm here. Late, but here.
- 21 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: We will mark you
- 22 present. Thank you for joining us.

- 1 MR. MEITES: Thank you.
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: We are just -- we've
- 3 made a few edits to the draft response.
- 4 MR. MEITES: Yes.
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: We're still in the
- 6 discourse of the open meeting. And we are now working
- on a paragraph on page 24 with the bold caption,
- 8 "Response to OIG Investigation of Potential False
- 9 Statement to Congress."
- 10 MR. MEITES: Got it. Go ahead. Go ahead.
- 11 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: That's where we are.
- 12 MS. SINGLETON: Frank?
- 13 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes? Go ahead, Sarah.
- 14 MS. SINGLETON: In terms of the discussion we
- were having about whether or not to include a sentence
- 16 such as Lillian suggested about the board believes that
- the mistakes were innocent, I personally would be
- 18 willing to subscribe to such a statement. But I am not
- 19 sure I want to put it into a report to Congress because
- 20 I think it might serve as a red flag, and rather than
- 21 putting an end to this particular problem or incident,
- 22 it might just fuel fire.

- 1 So I'm somewhat reluctant to include the
- 2 sentence, although I do support the sentiment.
- 3 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: I support the sentiment
- 4 as well. And I think maybe we can deal with it with
- 5 insertion of the word -- or do you agree with the idea
- of inserting the word "mistakenly"?
- 7 MS. SINGLETON: Yes. And I personally would
- 8 be willing to go even farther. But I'm not sure it's
- 9 good to put in this report to Congress.
- 10 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: You may be right.
- 11 MS. BeVIER: Even the word "mistakenly,"
- 12 Sarah?
- MS. SINGLETON: No. I like "mistakenly" I
- 14 think that's fine.
- MS. BeVIER: Okay. No, I'm as content to
- leave the other out myself, too.
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Then the
- 18 only thing, Tom Meites, unless we have some suggestions
- 19 from you -- do we?
- 20 MR. MEITES: No. I agree with the changes
- 21 proposed, and let's proceed.
- 22 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. We made some

- 1 very minor changes to the text that -- we'd be glad to
- 2 go over those for you if you'd like.
- 3 MR. MEITES: No. That's okay. Just pick up
- 4 where you're at.
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Did someone else join
- 6 us?
- 7 MS. STRANDLIE: Yes. It's Julie Strandlie.
- 8 Hi, Frank.
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Hey, Julie. How are
- 10 you?
- MS. STRANDLIE: Good. How are you?
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Julie, we're just
- discussing on page 24 -- under "Response to OIG
- 14 Investigation," et cetera, we're considering the
- 15 addition of a sentence that Mike McKay is working on as
- we speak.
- 17 MS. STRANDLIE: Okay.
- 18 MR. McKAY: And I'm ready to go when you want
- 19 to.
- 20 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. We're ready
- 21 for your sentence.
- MR. McKAY: This would be the last sentence to

- 1 that paragraph. "Steps have been taken to
- 2 significantly reduce the chance of this occurring
- 3 again."
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: That's it?
- 5 MR. McKAY: Yes.
- 6 MS. SINGLETON: Would you consider
- 7 putting -- substituting the word "safeguards" for the
- 8 word "steps"?
- 9 MR. McKAY: Sure.
- 10 MS. BeVIER: "Have been implemented."
- MR. McKAY: Right.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: "Have been implemented."
- 13 Okay. That's fine with me.
- MS. BeVIER: And instead of "this," just
- "this," could you say "for a mistake of this kind
- 16 happening again"?
- 17 MR. McKAY: All right.
- MS. BeVIER: Or is that too much?
- 19 MR. McKAY: Yes. That's fine with me.
- 20 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. If you don't
- 21 mind, Mike, if you would reread it as amended.
- 22 "Safequards have been" --

- 1 MR. McKAY: "Safeguards have been implemented
- 2 to significantly reduce the chance of a mistake of this
- 3 kind occurring again."
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. Is that
- 5 additional sentence acceptable to everyone?
- 6 MR. FUENTES: Yes.
- 7 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Hearing no
- 8 objection, then, is there any other discussion on the
- 9 draft as it has been amended?
- 10 (No response.)
- 11 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Hearing
- 12 none, let's -- I would entertain a motion to approve
- 13 the revised draft response, and move it from a draft to
- 14 the board's response. Is there such a motion?
- 15 MOTION
- 16 MS. SINGLETON: So moved, by Sarah Singleton.
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Is there a second?
- MR. GARTEN: Second, by Herb Garten.
- 19 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Any further
- 20 discussion on the motion?
- 21 (No response.)
- 22 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Hearing none, all those

- in favor of the motion, please say aye.
- 2 (A chorus of ayes.)
- 3 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Opposed, nay.
- 4 (No response.)
- 5 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: It's unanimous, and the
- 6 board's response is approved. Next is --
- 7 MS. BARNETT: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman.
- 8 Mr. Chairman?
- 9 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: -- consider and act on
- 10 other business. Is there any other business?
- 11 MS. BARNETT: Mr. Chairman, I'd just like to
- note for the record that David Richardson joined us.
- 13 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Thank you. And welcome,
- 14 David.
- MR. FUENTES: Mr. Chairman, just for the
- 16 record --
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes, sir?
- 18 MR. FUENTES: -- the agenda had one telephone
- 19 number for call-in instructions, and then we received
- an e-mail with another call-in number. Is there any
- 21 chance that any board member or public was excluded by
- virtue of this two postings of numbers? And did we

- 1 take an effort or action to try to avoid and correct
- 2 that? I didn't quite understand why it was that we had
- 3 two different numbers for the phone-in session.
- 4 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Oh, I misunderstood. I
- 5 thought the problem number was on the closed sessions.
- 6 I could be wrong.
- 7 MR. FUENTES: Well, what I had was the agenda
- 8 that was sent to me had a 678 area code number to call
- 9 in.
- 10 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Which is -- that's my
- 11 number.
- MR. FUENTES: And then subsequently, I
- 13 received an e-mail to say, call in on an 800 number,
- 14 which is the one I am talking to you on.
- 15 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Right.
- 16 MR. FUENTES: And I was wondering whether
- anybody may have tried to get in on the 678 number and
- 18 been excluded from participation. Did we or staff take
- 19 adequate effort to try to resolve that? I just don't
- want anybody to come back to the board and have us
- 21 accused of consciously not having this fully an open
- 22 number. So I'd like to clarify that for the record, is

- 1 all I'm trying to do.
- 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Well, thank you for
- 3 that, Tom. And let me ask the staff to tell us what
- 4 steps were taken and what communication was made to
- 5 clarify the correct number. Who could comment on that?
- 6 MS. BATIE: Mr. Chairman, this is Pat Batie.
- 7 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Yes, Pat?
- 8 MS. BATIE: I would like to do so. I was out
- 9 of the office briefly and at the time that the Federal
- 10 Register notice was issued. And there was an error
- 11 made initially in the notice before it went to the
- 12 Federal Register, and it indeed included your phone
- 13 number as the call-in number.
- Only the board apparently received a copy of
- 15 that notice. The notice that was published in the
- 16 Federal Register did in fact have the correct 1-800
- 17 number on it, Mr. Fuentes, in response to your
- 18 question. So that is what happened. That was the
- 19 confusion that occurred in my absence regarding the
- 20 phone number.
- Just to give you a little bit more
- information, when we arrange these phone numbers, we

- 1 have to designate a call leader. And often
- 2 Mr. Strickland is designated as the call leader. He
- 3 was in this case. When we received the conference call
- 4 information from the provider, the call leader's name
- 5 and phone number appear first. The young lady that
- 6 handled this for us is a temporary, and she is not
- 7 familiar with Mr. Strickland's number, and she thought
- 8 that that was the call-in number.
- 9 So it was an unusual circumstance. I
- 10 apologize for the confusion. But the public did
- 11 receive the correct call-in information.
- 12 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Tom, does
- 13 that --
- MR. FUENTES: I think that's very
- 15 satisfactory, and I think it's good for us to just have
- 16 it on the record.
- 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Good. I
- 18 appreciate your bringing it to our attention, and I
- 19 hope that was a satisfactory explanation. And it
- appears that when it finally got to the Federal
- 21 Register, it was correct.
- 22 All right. Is there any public comment?

1 (No response.) 2 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Hearing none, the next 3 item is to consider and act on whether to authorize an 4 executive session of the board to consider and act on a 5 response to the U.S. Government Accountability Office's 6 draft report on LSC's oversight and management of LSC 7 grants to legal services programs. 8 Is there a motion to authorize an executive session? 9 10 MOTION 11 MS. SINGLETON: Sarah Singleton moves that we authorize an executive session. 12 MS. CHILES: Jonann Chiles seconds. 13 14 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: All right. Any discussion on the motion? 15 16 (No response.) 17 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Let's proceed to a vote, then. All those in favor of the motion, please say 18 19 aye. 20 (A chorus of ayes.) 21 CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Opposed, nay. 22 (No response.)

1	CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: The ayes have it, and
2	we've adopted a resolution to go into executive
3	session. And it will be necessary for us to ring off
4	from this call, and we have instructions for another
5	call-in number. And I would suggest, then, that we do
6	just that.
7	MR. MEITES: Frank, before you hang up, this
8	is Tom. In case, we can't get through, could we have
9	Pat Batie's telephone so we can call her?
10	CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Pat, would you provide
11	your cell phone number?
12	MS. BATIE: Yes. That number is (202)
13	409-5129.
14	MR. MEITES: Thanks, Pat. And we'll hang up
15	now, then.
16	CHAIRMAN STRICKLAND: Okay. Thank you,
17	everyone.
18	(Whereupon, at 2:31 p.m., the board meeting
19	adjourned to executive session.)
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
