CDR Long called the April Pharmacy PAC meeting to order. Minutes from the previous meeting were accepted with few edits.

LCDR Louis Flowers (AACP Liaison) dual venture with AACP includes collaboration in disseminating information to the colleges of pharmacy about pharmacy practice in PHS. AACP guests provided the following insight:

- ♦ Pharmacy Education Trends → Dr. Maine
 - Emergence of pharmacy schools 3 categories (see AACP website for the most up-dodate information on schools of pharmacy)
 - Affiliate
 - Associate pre-candidate status; eager to involve the University Point of Contact Program (UPOC)
 - Accredited
 - Two new schools of Pharmacy applied for accreditation now >100 in the U.S.
 - 72 accredited colleges in the mid-1980's; 84 accredited schools in 2002;
 Currently 94 colleges are accredited.
 - o Rapid growth attributed to greater faculty resources and quality experiential education
 - o Distributed learning on-line Pharm.D.
 - 50 students finishing courses this Spring for a completely on-line Pharm.D. program through Creighton University
 - Explosive growth in enrollment has been observed with the development of satellite campuses – the University of Florida experienced double enrollment with the addition of 3 satellite campuses simultaneously. The first class graduates Spring 2006.
 - A substantial number of schools are using distributed learning for at least some of their education. to expand enrollment and make clinical experience available to students.being
 - Scrutinized by the Accrediting Body still closely watching distributed learning expansion to ensure it is not abused.
 - Viewed as more demanding by faculty
 - o Pharmacist roles in health care:
 - Varied, exciting, message linked pharmacists to patient safety "Unsung Heroes" on PBS portrays roles of pharmacists in a one hour documentary presentation. A 20-minute recruitment piece is being broadcasted into various high schools and educational programs; a copy of the DVD will be provided to the PharmPAC; a teacher's guide is also available.
 - Public Health Pharmacist roles in state and county positions
 - HHS funding currently supports several rural outreach programs for clinical pharmacists. Research involving the need of expanded roles of pharmacists in federally supported settings is greatly needed. AACP can provide points of contact for prospective research studies.
 - American Pharmacists month is October 2006
 - Pharmacy Manpower project survey of pharmacists

- The last census of pharmacists was almost 15 years ago
- New data collection efforts include an aggregate demand index tracking system (to include new graduates as well as alumni)
- data collection and survey of pharmacy for future projections (currently ~10,000 pharmacy graduates per year)
- aging pharmacists, fewer hours worked, increase in part-time employment
- No statistics regarding career path trends is available at this time
- Update to the 2000 report to Congress Jim Coltis (HRSA) will provide the best projections based on current enrollment
- Dr. Maine offered to forward (through LCDR Flowers) a short essay on pharmacy written by Ed O'Neal, "The national shortage of pharmacists will continue if pharmacists relinquish their role in drug distribution in dispensing to automation and technicians—and finally get after the problems with medication use that exist and are so prevalent in our society." This view is in contrast to previous (1995) proclamations of work overpopulated health care work force projections.
- Post-graduate accredited residency training is growing interest and could be developed as recruitment strategy to prospective PHS officers. The demand for residencies is expected to increase as the annual number of graduates increase.
- ♦ Pharmacy Schools, Enrollment → Elizabeth Ross
 - Shortages of pharmacists continue to push high salaries and increase publicity
 - o Increase in applications National average of students accepted is ~3.5 on a 4.0 scale
 - o Increase in previous college work and bachelor degrees
 - o 0 to 6 Programs
 - o Peak numbers are up during application cycles
 - Demographics (applicants)
 - Median age = 23
 - Female = 70%
 - Male = 30%
 - Minorities account for approximately 14% of those enrolled
- ♦ Cross Issues → William Lang
 - Key policy issues
 - Educational outcomes focus on 3 core areas
 - Pharmaceutical care Pharmacist role broadened in health promotion and disease prevention
 - Systems management
 - Public Health Federal Resources under-stressed and under-funded;
 Mr. Lang stressed the importance of increasing awareness and interest in colleges and school of pharmacy with a variety of state and federal programs. Mr. Lang offered assistance in increasing visibility to students and colleges.
 - Dr. Maine added that strategies and goals have been identified in collaboration with LCDR Flowers and AACP staff to disperse information to colleges about the UPOC interest in developing strong relationships between the colleges and PHS:
 - AACP has a Student Affairs Department rather that a student listserv or student membership services
 - Career options web page has been updated to reflect a current overview of PHS options
 - Dr. Maine subscribes to the Student listserv designed for those interested in the Public Health Service
 - Schools offering Masters in Public Health (MPH) and Dual degree programs (with MPH) are growing
 - Other avenues in post graduate study in the area of Public Health focus on health outcomes analyses. Masters and PhD programs in Social

Administrative Science and Pharmaceutical Health Services Research are offered at many schools of pharmacy.

- Dr. Maine thanked the PAC for the opportunity to share information and expressed continued support from AACP.
- Guests are welcomed all to attend AACP meetings including the July 2006 conference to be held in San Diego, CA. The winter meeting is focused on outreach and advocacy issues.

Readiness Update: RADM (Upper Half) John Babb

- ♦ Deployment room to improve
 - No equipment caches waiting
 - o Minimal training funds
 - No team training
- Readiness Teams to be established target date is June 1st, the start of hurricane season
 - Team Structure 5 month rotations (one-fifth of the Corps will be on-call every 5 months)
 - 5 Rapid Response teams (6 pharmacist roles on each team)
 - 10 Secretary's Emergency Response Teams (SERT)
 - 5 Applied Public Health teams (consisting of 46 members each, including 4 physicians each; divisible)
 - 5 Mental Health teams (consisting of 26 members each; divisible)
 - o Tier Structure
 - Tier 1 deployable within 12 hours of notification
 - Tier 2 deployable within 36 hours of notification
 - Tier 3 deployable within 72 hours of notification
 - Change the current one role assignment to allow designation of several roles (e.g., administrative, logistic, etc.) Note the skill determination section on OFRD website when selecting deployment roles.
 - o Teams assembles by Rapid Deployment Team Leaders (with agency agreement)
 - Agency question: Who are "mission critical" employees? (mission critical positions include those where the agency operation cannot support the absence of an officer for a 2 week period, duty stations where the pharmacy vacancy rate is 25% or higher, officers on long-term training orders, officers on international assignment, etc.)
 - Approx 850 officers designated as mission critical by their respective agencies: these officers will only be deployed in the case of a catastrophic event.
- ◆ Rapid Deployment Teams 4 geographic centers to decrease transportation, training, and resource burdens:
 - o Washington/Baltimore
 - Atlanta/Butner/Raleigh-Durham
 - o Dallas/Oklahoma City
 - o Phoenix/Albuquerque
- Future Readiness
 - o Establishment of Tier 2 Mission Team, similar to Rapid Deployment Force; 100 additional officers will be added to each team (upon recruitment of ~600 more officers)
 - Health and Medical Response Team (HAMMER Team) dedicated Health and Medical Response Team continuously deploy, train, and train others
 - Deployable within 4 hours
 - 315 officers / 5% of the Corps
 - 50 to 100 will be current active duty; slots will be available for recruitment efforts
 - 3 year service commitment
 - Locations: DC, Oklahoma, and Arizona areas; For continuation of clinical duties, Oklahoma and Arizona members can work with IHS on an "on loan" deployable status; DC area officers can work with DC and Montgomery County

♦ PharmPAC Leads presented RADM Babb with a model Admiral's Cover. The inscription on the bottom read, "RADM John Babb – in appreciation of your guidance as acting CPO from July 2005 through February 2006 from the Pharmacy PAC."

- ♦ Readiness status update Pharmacy Category CDR Dittert (<u>steve.dittert@fda.hhs.gov</u>)
 - Current and last month (in parentheses) statistics:
 - Readiness = 72.5% (75.7%)
 - expiration of BLS and PPD noted
 - Calling efforts
 - Officers that were contacted realized basis readiness standards were not met; reasons included:
 - extended leave (maternal/paternal) periods or change of duty stations
 - duty station change
 - separation/retirement
 - difficulty in obtaining medical exam (IHS)
 - PAC addressed the process of contacting the individuals delinquent in Basic Readiness qualifications: comments were variable regarding the efficacy of the contact procedure
 - officer has responsibility vs. reminder system (lack of funding)
 - Transformation requirements will increase readiness compliance (penalties, separation)
 - Agency specific e-mail system concerns
 - Possible solutions discussed
 - CDR Dittert will investigate on possibility of quicker notification / list of officers dropping out of basic requirement standards
 - Increase report parameters to include months in the future in order to alert officers ahead of time regarding expiring qualifications
 - General monthly reminder e-mail via listserv
