HISTORY OF HOUSE COMMITTEES CONSIDERING VETERANS' LEGISLATION

Originally prepared March 4, 1964, by the Library of Congress, Legislative Reference Service, American Law Division; revised to July 19, 1989, by the Library of Congress, Congressional Research Service, Government Division.

INTRODUCTION

Legislation relating to veterans has played an important role in the activity of every Congress since the founding of our Nation. In the earliest Congresses, the House first considered veterans' measures, like other legislative proposals, in a Committee of the Whole, composed of all Representatives. After a Committee of the Whole agreed on a proposal's general thrust, a temporary, select committee was appointed to work out the particulars. Through this system the House created dozens of select committees in its first years.

Existing alongside these select committees were a handful of permanent committees, called standing committees. The first standing committee of the House which considered measures relating to pensions was the Committee on Claims, created November 13, 1794. The Committee on Claims was vested with jurisdiction over revolutionary and land claims, and all sorts of pensions.² That Committee apparently handled all veterans' legislation until the creation of the Committee on Pensions and Revolutionary Claims, on December 22, 1813. From that date until the creation of the Committee on Veterans' Affairs by the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 (P.L. 79-601), veterans' measures were considered by various committees as the House saw fit to create to consider problems and legislation at various points in time.

Following is a history of the Committee on Veterans' Affairs from its inception on January 2, 1947, and of the predecessor committees which considered legislation now within its purview.

I. PREDECESSOR COMMITTEES OF THE COMMITTEE ON VETERANS' AFFAIRS

Throughout the history of the House, numerous committees have addressed veterans' issues. This section briefly traces the evolution of these committees until the creation of the Committee on Veterans' Affairs (1947).

The following diagram illustrates the evolution of committees dealing with veterans' issues. Numbers across the top of the diagram indicate important years—those during which a relevant committee was created, and possibly another abolished. Committees listed in a column were created during the year at the head of the column. Dashes (- - -) between years indicate the existence of a committee from the date at the head of the first column until the date at the head of the second column. Where a committee in one column has an arrow to one or more committees in another column, relevant portions of its jurisdiction were transferred to those committees in the latter year.

From the Committee on Claims, 1794, to the Committee on Pensions and Revolutionary Claims, 1813

The Committee on Claims was established on November 13, 1794, and it shares with Elections the distinction of being the oldest standing committee of the House. Upon the establishment of the Committee on November 13, 1794, it was given jurisdiction of all "matters or things touching claims and demands on the United States. A note in Barclay's Digest and Standing Rules and Orders of the House of Representatives, 1860-61 (p. 176), states "that originally the Committee on Claims was charged with all revolutionary and land claims, and all sorts of pensions."

Although a Committee on Claims existed until 1947, its jurisdiction relating to veterans was removed in 1813 and transferred to a new Committee on Pensions and Revolutionary Claims. On December 22, 1813, the Committee on Pensions and Revolutionary Claims was established with the adoption of a motion by Representative Stevenson Archer of Maryland. Originally seven members were appointed to the Committee, and its duties were as follows:

[T]o take into consideration all such petitions, and matters, or things, touching military pensions, and, also claims and demands originating in the Revolutionary War, or arising therefrom, as shall be presented, or shall or may come in question, and be referred to them by the House; and to report their opinion thereupon together with such propositions for relief therein, as to them shall seem expedient.

The Committee on Pensions and Revolutionary Claims Splits into Two Committees, 1825

In effect, the jurisdiction of the Committee on Pensions and Revolutionary Claims was split between two committees in 1825. Its claims jurisdiction was transferred to a Committee on Revolutionary Claims, and its pensions jurisdiction was transferred to a Committee on Revolutionary Pensions, renamed the Committee on Military Pensions a few days later.

The Committee on Revolutionary Pensions was created on December 9, 1825, by the adoption of a proposal submitted by Representative Peter Little of Maryland. The Committee was renamed Military Pensions on December 13, 1825, by the adoption of a proposal of Representative Daniel Webster of Massachusetts. Its jurisdiction was as follows: 11

[T]o take into consideration all such matters respecting pensions for military service, and also, all such matters respecting invalid pensions, as shall be referred to them by the House.

The same December 13, 1825, proposal of Representative Webster changed the name of the Committee on Pensions and Revolutionary Claims to the Committee on Revolutionary Claims. This name change reflected the Committee's loss of jurisdiction over revolutionary pensions to the newly-created Committee on Military Pensions. The jurisdiction of the Committee on Revolutionary Claims was as follows:

[T]o take into consideration all such petitions and matters or things touching claims and demands originating in the Revolutionary War, or arising therefrom, as shall be presented or shall or may come in question, and be referred to them by the House; and report their opinion thereupon, together with such propositions for relief therein, as to them shall seem expedient.

The Committee on Military Pensions Splits into Two Committees, 1831

In 1831, the Committee on Military Pensions was abolished and its jurisdiction was split, in effect, between two committees—the Committee on Revolutionary Pensions and the Committee on Invalid Pensions. On January 10, 1831, a resolution submitted by Representative James Trezvant of Virginia, Chairman of the Committee on Military Pensions, was agreed to. 14 The resolution transferred jurisdiction over pensions for services in the

Revolutionary War, except invalid pensions, to a reestablished Committee on Revolutionary Pensions. 16

The same 1831 resolution transferred jurisdiction over invalid pensions, to a new Committee on Invalid Pensions. In addition, in practice if not by Rule, pensions from the War of 1812 were within the purview of this Committee. In

From the adoption of this resolution until 1873, accordingly, the Committees on Invalid Pensions, on Revolutionary Pensions, and on Revolutionary Claims all existed concurrently.

From 1832 Until the Turn of the Century: Abolition of Committees on Revolutionary Pensions, 1880, and Revolutionary Claims, 1873

Following the Civil War, matters pertaining to pensions of that War were referred to the Committee on Invalid Pensions. Is In general, this Committee reported all general pension legislation relating to veterans of the Civil War; Is it also reported private and special acts for the relief of soldiers of that War. In addition, on December 6, 1888, Is the resolutions distributing the President's message referred to the Committee on Invalid Pensions so much as related to "pension laws and their modification and revision."

In the 40th Congress, the jurisdiction of the Committee on Revolutionary Pensions was expanded to include all matters relating to pensions of soldiers of the War of 1812. On March 26, 1867, a precedent-setting matter on this subject was initially referred to the Committee on Invalid Pensions, according to common practice. However, the Chair of that Committee suggested it be referred to the Revolutionary Pensions panel, because his panel was overworked. Following is a statement from the Congressional Globe to that effect.

If there be no objection, the Chair will make a statement to the House. Yesterday the House referred a joint resolution of the Legislature of Michigan, in reference to pensions to soldiers of the War of 1812, to the Committee on Invalid Pensions when appointed. The Chair had a conference with the chairman in the 39th Congress, and who will probably be the chairman of the committee in the 40th Congress, and he stated that the committee was overworked and suggested that the subject should be referred to the Committee on Revolutionary Pensions. There being no objections, that reference was made.²²

The Committee on Revolutionary Pensions was abolished during the rules recodification of 1880, when its jurisdiction was transferred to a new Committee on Pensions.²³ The Committee on Pensions received jurisdiction over pensions of all the wars of the United States, other than the Civil War.²⁴ It reported private and special bills for the relief of soldiers of all wars except the Civil War.²⁵ as well as bills proposing general pension legislation for all wars except the Civil War.²⁶ Appropriations for laws reported from this Committee were determined by the Committee on Appropriations in the general pension appropriation bill.²⁷

During the same period, the Committee on Revolutionary Claims was abolished when a Committee on War Claims, with broader claims jurisdiction, was created.²⁸ The change occurred on December 2, 1873, by a motion of Representative William P. Frye of Maine. The jurisdiction of the Committee on War Claims was all petitions, matters, or things touching claims growing out of any war in which the United States had been engaged.²⁹ Although it principally considered claims not directly related to veterans, it considered legislation relating to claims for reimbursement for burial of dead officers,

soldiers, and sailors, ³⁰ and for reimbursement of officers and men of the Army for medical expense incurred during leave or furlough.³¹

By 1880, accordingly, House Committees considering veterans' legislation still numbered three, but then comprised the Committees on Invalid Pensions, on Pensions, and on War Claims.

From the Turn of the Century To 1946: Creation of Committee on World War Veterans' Legislation, 1924

A Committee on World War Veterans' Legislation was established on January 18, 1924, with the adoption of H. Res. 146.⁸² It originally had jurisdiction over legislation pertaining to:⁸³

[W]ar-risk insurance of soldiers, sailors, and marines and other persons in the military and naval service of the United States during or growing out of the World War, the United States Veterans' Bureau, the compensations and allowances of such persons and their beneficiaries, and all legislation affecting them other than civil service, public lands, adjusted compensations, pensions, and private claims.

The Committee's jurisdiction was enlarged on January 3, 1939,³⁴ to include pensions of individuals and their beneficiaries within the Committee's purview. This change was reflected in the Committee's written jurisdiction by adding "and pensions" after "allowances," and by deleting "pensions" before "and private claims." ³⁵

At the same time, the pensions jurisdiction of two other committees was clarified. That of the Committee on Pensions was clarified to state coverage of pensions for specific wars—the Spanish-American War, the Philippine Insurrection, and the Boxer Rebellion.³⁵ That of the Committee on Invalid

Pensions was clarified to state coverage of pensions not specifically covered by the other two committees:³⁷

[A]ll the wars of the United States and peacetime service, other than the Spanish-American War, Philippine Insurrection, Boxer Rebellion, and World War.

The Committee on War Claims also continued to exist.

The Legislative Reorganization Act Of 1946: Creation of the Committee on Veterans' Affairs, 1947

The Committees on Pensions, Invalid Pensions, and World War Veterans' Legislation were abolished by the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946, effective 1947, when their jurisdiction was transferred to a new Committee on Veterans' Affairs. The Committee on War Claims also was abolished by the 1946 Act, and its jurisdiction was transferred to the Committee on the Judiciary. 99

II. COMMITTEE ON VETERANS' AFFAIRS

The Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 (P.L. 79-601) established the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs, effective with the outset of the 80th Congress (1947).

Section 121(a)(18) of the Act⁴⁰ amended House Rule X to create the Committee on Veterans' Affairs, consisting of 27 members. This provision became House Rule X, section (1)(r).

Section $121(b)(1)(r)^{41}$ of the act amended House Rule XI, according the Committee the following jurisdiction:

- 1. Veterans measures generally.
- 2. Pensions of all the wars of the United States, general and special.

- 3. Life insurance issued by the government on account of service in the Armed Forces.
 - 4. Compensation, vocational rehabilitation, and education of veterans.
 - 5. Veterans' hospitals, medical care, and treatment of veterans.
 - 6. Soldiers' and sailors' civil relief.
 - 7. Readjustment of servicemen to civilian life.

This provision of the act became House Rule XI, section 18.

Since 1947, the Committee's jurisdiction was modified substantively only once, but the size of the Committee changed often. Although provisions of House Rule X specified the size of the Veterans' Committee as 27, on several occasions the House passed a resolution allowing a different number of Members to serve on the Committee, as follows:

82nd Congress, H.Res. 60, set the size at 23; 83rd Congress, H.Res. 418, set the size at 28; 91st Congress, H.Res. 174, set the size at 25; 92nd Congress, H.Res. 192, set the size at 26; 93rd Congress, H.Res. 158, set the size at 26.

In addition, between the 84th and 90th Congresses the number of Members elected to the Committee varied, although it appears that no resolutions on point were agreed to by the House.

The Committee Reform Amendments of 1974 (H.Res. 988, 93rd Congress, effective 1975, 94th Congress) eliminated the provision of House Rules specifying the size of the Veterans' Committee and of the other House committees. Since then the House has been able to elect as many Veterans' Committee members as it chooses without first passing a resolution setting the Committee's size.

The Committee's jurisdiction was enhanced in 1967, with the adoption of H. Res. 241, during the 90th Congress (1967-1969). The resolution transferred jurisdiction over national cemeteries from the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs. Since then the Committee's jurisdiction has not been modified substantively. The Committee's present jurisdiction appears in House Rule X, clause (1)(u) as follows:

- (1) Veterans' measures generally.
- (2) Cemeteries of the United States in which veterans of any war or conflict are or may be buried, whether in the United States or abroad, except cemeteries administered by the Secretary of the Interior.
 - (3) Compensation, vocational rehabilitation, and education of veterans.
- (4) Life insurance issued by the Government on account of service in the Armed Forces.
 - (5) Pensions of all the wars of the United States, general and special.
 - (6) Readjustment of servicemen to civil life.

- (7) Soldiers' and sailors' civil relief.
- (8) Veterans' hospitals, medical care, and treatment of veterans.
