Angostura Resource Management Plan

Resource Management Plan for Angostura Reservoir Continues

For those of you new to our mailing list, the Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation), in cooperation with the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks (SDGFP), continues work on a Resource Management Plan (RMP) for Angostura Reservoir. The RMP will serve as the blueprint for future use, management and development of Angostura Reservoir. The RMP will include background information on the Angostura Irrigation District and water contracts, but will not address Reservoir water operations, irrigation facilities, or lands with the District.

We send newsletters to keep you informed on the progress of the RMP. This is the third newsletter. In this edition you will find the current status of the RMP and three alternatives, including a no-action and two action alternatives for your review and comment.

Please send your comments by August 31, 2008, so they may be considered in the development of the preferred alternative for the RMP.

RMP Update

Since the last newsletter the RMP team has reviewed the public comments and worked to include them into the proposed alternatives based on the developed goals and objectives. The focus group assisted with the development of the alternatives and will continue assisting the RMP team through information gathering. Currently the draft alternatives are being analyzed as part of the National Environmental Policy Act process. The RMP team held a second series of open house meetings to present the proposed draft alternatives for review and comment.

The team is reviewing comments received on the draft alternatives and preparing a draft environmental assessment which will be ready for public review at the end of 2008. The final RMP will be prepared based on the preferred alternative.

A fourth newsletter will present the final RMP and a tentative schedule for implementation.

Alternative A – No Action This alternative would be a continuation of existing management of Angostura Recreation Area and would continue as outlined in existing agreements, current laws, new or amended regulations, and policy. The 1992 Master Plan would serve as the blueprint for management of the area. In addition

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to the Master Plan, improvements would be made on an "as needed" basis, or if needed to meet health, safety, American's with Disabilities Act or other legal requirements.

Alternative B – Developed Recreation

Under this alternative a variety of improvements would be made to visitor use facilities, recreational areas, and resources areas. This alternative would allow for a balance between natural resource protection, developed recreation and dispersed recreation. It would limit degradation of natural and cultural resources while developing diverse recreation opportunities consistent with the Management Unit Goals.

Alternative C - Enhanced Recreation

This alternative would include all of the proposed actions from Alternative B plus additional recreational developments which provide for an increase in the overall development in MU's 2, 4, 5, 9, 10, 12, and 19.

Proposed Management Actions Considered but Eliminated

The actions in this category were not considered feasible at this time. The reasons for these determinations will be included in the Environmental Assessment.

Open House Meetings

Informal open houses were held to present the proposed alternatives for review and comment in three locations in July, 2008. Visitors were able

to view displays and other information and talk to Reclamation and SDGFP staff about the reservoir and the RMP.

We will consider comments from the public and incorporate changes into the RMP as appropriate.
