ACTION: APPROVAL OF A DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY WORKER  
HEALTH AND SAFETY VOLUNTARY PROTECTION PROGRAM LOGO  
AND FLAG

ISSUE:

The Department of Energy Voluntary Protection Program, patterned after the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's Voluntary Protection Programs, is a visible symbol of our commitment to worker health and safety at Departmental facilities. One implementation activity remaining is formal authorization for flags to be awarded to sites in the program and permission to use a related logo. Use of a logo other than the official Department of Energy logo requires Secretarial approval. As part of our 1993 Department of Energy-wide safety conference, a breakout team chose three designs for award flags. Additional background information on the Voluntary Protection Program flag is in the Attachment.

Also attached are examples of the STAR, MERIT, and DEMONSTRATION flags, each of which contains the Department of Energy Voluntary Protection Program logo.

BACKGROUND

The Department's Voluntary Protection Program flag will follow a tradition established by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. They adopted the concept of providing a flag to participants in their Voluntary Protection Program based on the Navy's success with a similar concept during World War II. Private sector employer participants in the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's program have noted that displaying the flag is not a trivial matter. The flag not only visibly identifies companies who are industry leaders for excellence in worker protection, but also serves as a constant reminder of the focus the company must maintain on the safety and health of its workers. By building on this tradition, the Department of Energy Voluntary Protection Program will maintain its similarities to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration program, and will receive many of the benefits of that program's long-fought-for and hard-won credibility. The Department's flag will serve to mark sites where management, labor, and the Department are truly engaged in a new era of cooperation to promote worker safety and health.

The Department of Energy Voluntary Protection Program calls for three different flags to be awarded to sites depending on whether the site is accepted under the STAR, MERIT, or DEMONSTRATION program. STAR program participants are those contractor sites that have demonstrated excellence and leadership in protecting the safety and health of their workers. They have gone beyond simple compliance and have implemented comprehensive, continuously improving programs intended to empower and involve all employees in their safety and health program. MERIT program participants are those contractor sites that have also demonstrated excellence in protecting the safety and health of their workers, but are lacking complete implementation of one or more areas required for STAR participation. These sites are accepted into the program with the understanding that areas of deficiency will be corrected within a set timeframe, after which they will be reviewed and are candidates for full-fledged STAR status. The DEMONSTRATION program is for contractor sites that are operating at STAR quality, but are in industries with which the Department has little experience. Under DEMONSTRATION, these sites are observed by the Department of Energy for a set time period, at which time the Department will make a determination as to whether it is necessary to modify STAR requirements in order to accept the candidate site.
