



(1) That he hold a certificate of disability, which certificate need not be filed, unless called for.
(2) That he serve 180 days.
(3) A permanent physical disability not due to vicious habits. (It need not have originated in the service.)
(4) The rates under the act are graded from \$6 to \$18, proportioned to the degree of inability to earn a support, and are not affected by the rank held.
(5) A permanent physical disability, and the rate under this one may apply under other laws, but he can not draw more than one pension for the same period.

Every pension application must be filed in the office of the Comptroller of the Treasury.

oners, besides half of us do more
in three, and didn't work hard than

each, we work six hours a day,
we have had & consider able rain
lately, but we are on a gravelly

our walls & ravelles we are not troubled
too much with mud. I came across

he is a fine looking young man
you said you did not think that

I went by any more, but am expect
to get our pay before a great while
as we shall get fifty dollars
of our bounty, when we get paid
if you want it or can loan it to
I will draw it and send it home
I can send it to you almost next
if you think you can not let it to
advantage I wont draw it if you
think again will be higher in the
spring than now I can send you
what you will want so you need
not sell, I can borrow money too
a little on no interest, I have not
had from back since I last
wrote to you, I suppose he is saying
get to the Indians, I would rather
say stay close to them, according
to letters from the north most of
the state the Chippewas are going
to war with the whites. I wonder
like to come to the state to fight them

As soon as the railroad was cut they put us on half rations but we had a little bread and we had some hard tack and rice so we have fared pretty well. It had began to think we were going to have as hard times as we had last fall and winter but this is alone of from the road and is pretty well reduced in force by sickness and desertsions. By the papers that we have got yesterday and to day we are whipping the rebels on all sides but I expect to see here of all the news before this time. As today is Christmas I expect you are having a good time, it will tell you how we are spending it. This morning we had inspection at nine o'clock and then we waited and watch for the mail until noon, this after noon I guess most of the boys have

writing letters as some of them got about a dozen. It is raining a little this after noon so we know what a time we are having. I expect we shall get our pay of course before a great while now as the road is open, it shall try and try them Town orders when I get it. I think it is as well as I can do with the money, I got two papers to day the Illinois and Chicago, I have never had but one Rochester paper yet, I think something must be wrong. The boys are in high rate health this winter, by one winter to know if I thought could get a likeness by mail, I think I can & would like to have Harry's Dolles and Eggers, & have the rest of the news, so good bye write as soon as you get this.

We have been having some splendid weather for a few days, it has been warm and pleasant, although it has been warm and pleasant, although there has been a good deal rain this winter we have not been much cold but I think we shall get it before a great while, the boys that went up the river before the gray rolls before the winter money I have got a little yet, I have lent

the boys that came down last fall have not had any pay since they came down, I don't know how much Harry's Tally and Grec's likewise which you would send, I think they would come through safe. To day is Sunday but we have not had any inspection to day as usual but we had a monthly inspection yesterday, we are having pretty good times for soldiers, some of the time we work on

the fort and some of us we drill, we work three hours a day and drill two, but we don't do both the same day, so we have the rest of the time to ourselves, we come on guard about once in eight days, and on fatigue the same, so we have plenty of time to read or do our own task my I can't think of much to write today, so I will stop, will soon, Wm H. six feet in front to sit in, we have

when we get it we will get fifty dollars
bounty, it shall not send any home this
time, & have been talking of buying

morning it is pretty cloudy around camp
we have some of us got shanties built
but they have not got lumber enough
to build for all, there is four in a
shanty we have bunches on the back
end and size have about 6 by 8 feet
in front to set in, they are building
chimneys in them, they build a chimney
between two shanties and have a
fire place on each side, they have not
got the shanty built by the size of ours

weather lately, but we don't mind it much, we have got pretty comfortable shanties, they are about 14' by 12' and four feet high and covered with dog tents, we have got a fine place and chimney and bunches so that we are pretty well off beside of some that have just come from the front. We moved our shanties yesterday about ten rods, but we pitched in and put up our chimney and to day we finish it ~~pays~~, you wanted to know how far the claims were from Leavenworth, and which way they are from there. ~~They are about 2 or 3 miles nearly~~ North from Leavenworth and about sixteen miles west from Clew Mtn. If you have got that map & let you have last spring you can tell just where they are, the towns and ranges are marked on the sides of it, and the sections

are marked in squares, they connen^{ce} to number in the north east corner of each town, sec 1 in the north east corner and 2 & 5 and 6 are west of it, sec 4 is south of 6 and 8 & 10 and 12 are east of 5, mine is the north west corner of sec 2. Town 100 Range 33, and yours is the south east corner of sec 34 Town 110 Range 33, yours lays north west of mine and they corner if you should go to look at them you will find the sec corner between them on the west side of a little lake close down among the weeds, I have written to you several times and asked you for copies ~~close~~ in that part of the country and how the snow stood the month, and if it was setting up early, you said that you could buy timber cheap there what kind of timber is it and

had been here, he is at Knoxville
now & saw two letters from him
last night, that he wrote to his
Cousin, He was well when he wrote
was here, The Boys are all well
at present, we are having a pretty
good time this winter, we come on
Guard once in ten days, and work
some and drive a little, we have no
lets yet. I have not heard from
home since I wrote to you but am
expecting a letter every day.
You wrote that you expected to
get a furlough this winter, probably
you are at home now.

Charles Whitman is well and
extends his respects to you, there is
no news here at present, Good and
Thomas have hid in the Woods I guess
for we can't get any news from them,
it was reported that they were fighting
at Corinth yesterday but the Rebels
don't say any thing about it this
morning, You wrote that General
Lincoln was dead, who is your General
now, is Brigham Captain yet and
how do you like him, was he on the
march with you, I saw by theirin
papers, that shot a lot of deserters
did you see them shot,
Some of our Boys begin to think
of going home before long, some of them

guess they will have to stay till the
21st of March, when they will all go

Dear parents I take my pen and ink to write you a few lines in answer to one I received from you a few days ago. I am well at present although I have just been sick for about ten days. I ate some green corn and peaches at Winchester and it gave me the diarrhea we used to drill every morning the sun was very hot I did not take any medicine until I got down sick. I laid abed all the forenoon the day we started we started at two o'clock the 15th I drove my team that day we camped about sundown the next day I rode in a mule wagon the road was very rough and stony so you may know I did not have a very easy time of it. The next day I rode in an ambulance which was not much better, the next morning I got into the wagon again and rode here where we got about noon. I had not ate any thing scarcely since we started at night our supper came up I got some pickles and one thing another to eat and began to feel better, a person can live as well here as any place with plenty of money, you can get a bullet of biscuits for us a paper of tea about a quarter of a pound for 25¢ a small can of fruit for 87½¢ butter 6c per pound I herring for 5c & crackers 5c and other things in proportion.




