2006 LEAVENWORTH SPRING BIRD FEST... A SUCCESS!

An estimated 1,500 people participated in the 2006 Bird Fest weekend: visitors, residents, students, business owners, artists, musicians and storytellers. More than 50 guides, many of whom are leaders in their fields, led almost 40 outdoor trips. Another 20 people offered Bird Fest related events including art workshops and shows, concerts, and book signings. At least 50 community members volunteered in varying capacities, from helping with the activities to researching bird biographies for the website.





SIGHTINGS FROM BIRD FEST 2006

- Almost 120 bird species were identified on Bird Fest trips and events.
- Observations from the Wenatchee River watershed included ruddy duck, Williamson's sapsucker, lark sparrow, and seven species of warbler.

General Information



pre-festival event is scheduled for Thursday, May 17: Lake Birds Float and Draw from 9 AM—noon. The festival officially begins at 6 AM on Friday morning with Flycatchers and Bark Gleaners and the Pontoon Boat trip on Fish Lake. The festival comes to an exquisite end on Sunday at 2 PM with the Songbird Concert at Canyon Wren Recital Hall.

BIRD FEST CENTRAL located just east of the Gazebo in downtown Leavenworth, is the site for information. This is where you can register for field trips that still have space available, get a checklist of birds found on the Wenatchee River Watershed and a map for "do it yourself" birding, pick up a free Bird Bulletin for kids, purchase a Bird Fest hat, and get your questions answered. Lengths of field trips are approximate and include travel time. Please be prompt. Times listed are departure and/or start times. Come prepared for variable spring weather.

Friday 5:30 AM – 5 PM, Saturday 5:30 AM – 5:30 PM, and Sunday 5:30 AM – 2 PM

WHAT TO BRING

Expect sunny weather but be prepared for wind, spring showers, and chilly mornings and evenings. Wear sturdy footwear and layered clothing. Bring sunscreen, hat, rain jacket, an extra set of dry clothes, water, snacks,

and insect repellent. Events are scheduled to allow ample time for exploring the town, shopping, and enjoying meals at local restaurants. Please look for the bright yellow Bird Fest flags that denote our Bird Fest sponsors! Binoculars, spotting scopes, cameras, plant and bird field guides are optional but recommended for your enjoyment. No pets, please.

Pre-registration is recommended for many Bird Fest events. Look for this icon a on the Schedule at a Glance pages 6 - 7. You can register for these activities May 1 - May 17 by calling the Leavenworth Chamber of Commerce at (509) 548-5807.

Reservations recommended for all participants. Some of these activities may have space available on the day of the event. Please inquire at Bird Fest Central.

Reservations will be taken for half of the participant limit. The remainder will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis. You may sign up for these trips, as well as trips without pre-registration, ½ hour before the scheduled departure. Bird Fest greeters will be happy to assist you at Bird Fest Central next to the Gazebo in the downtown park. Should you find an event is full, we will have information on other activities.

eotropical migratory songbirds, raptors, and water birds come here for a very important and brief part of their year — to breed and fledge. They make the treacherous trek from Mexico, Central, and South America specifically for the fine habitat that the Wenatchee River Watershed offers. The songs sung here are reserved for this season alone; they are heard only in the breeding area. By showcasing our mountains, rivers, and forests — from Icicle Creek to Fish Lake to Blackbird Island to Wenatchee's Confluence Park — Bird Fest 2007 encourages citizens to value our natural resources, including these amazing migrants, and to protect our region's habitat.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS

Leavenworth is on US Highway 2 between Stevens Pass and Wenatchee. Travel from Western Washington using either Stevens Pass or Snoqualmie Pass/Blewett Pass. Look for Bird Fest Central near the downtown Gazebo between Front Street and Highway 2.

Parking in downtown Leavenworth may be a challenge. We encourage Bird Fest participants to park across the highway near City Hall and the swimming pool or at the D.O.T. sheds on Highway 2 at the west end of town.




EXHIBITS

FEATURED SPEAKERS & ARTISTS

Dr. Gordon Orians, Emeritus Professor of biology and the former director of the Institute of Environmental Studies at the University of Washington, and a member of the National Academy of Sciences will be our keynote speaker. Dr. Orians is a renowned ecologist who has contributed to our understanding of everything from old growth forests to human evolution. Dr. Orians has lectured on ecological and environmental topics around the world, including in Spanish in Latin America and Spain. The theme of his keynote address is Birders and the Future of Biodiversity. Birds are heavily impacted by human expansion, changes in their habitat, and global climate change. What is the outlook for birds, and what can we do to help? Additionally, Dr. Orians contributed a large body of research to the understanding of blackbirds, and he will lead a Sunday field trip focused on them.

David Drummond is the director of the Merlin Falcon Foundation's Coastal Forest Merlin Project, a 20-year study providing valuable conservation stewardship and educational outreach for this rare raptor. David has been a naturalist, ranger and wildlife biologist for WA Fish and Wildlife, a field research biologist at Olympic National Park, Educator and Field Seminar Instructor, and a regional wildlife biologist. He has led treks and taught seminars in 22 countries during the past 25 years.

Dayton Edmonds weaves tales from the southern summer dance grounds of Oklahoma to the wildlife refuges of the snowy northwest; from stories of ancestral circuits and present-day struggles. He is a full-blooded Native American of the Caddo Nation, who has developed a diverse ministry, lifestyle and artistry. Dayton says about his specialty: "My purpose is to tell the story, to pass it on so that others may hear, see, feel and enjoy... to gently challenge people to grow."

The Falcon Research Group (FRG) is a non-profit organization based in Bow, WA. Founded in 1985, the FRG is dedicated to the support of field research, public education and the conservation of birds of prey. To achieve these goals, they conduct a variety of field studies involving hawks and people. These include the Entiat Ridge Experimental Raptor Banding Station, the Seattle Peregrine Project, the San Juan Peregrine Survey, Long-billed Hawk Syndrome Monitoring, the Everett Osprey Study, the annual Skagit Flats Winter Raptor Survey and Global Peregrine DNA Survey. 
Dr. William Gaines is currently assigned to the Okanogan and Wenatchee National Forests as the Forest Wildlife Biologist-Ecologist. Dr. Gaines has a Ph D from the University of Washington and has led study efforts for grizzly bear, gray wolf, and wolverine. For the past 10 years he has led research on the effects of wildfire on birds and other wildlife. Bill is an engaging speaker with a lovable wit.

Icicle Creek Piano Trio, the resident ensemble of the Icicle Creek Music Center, represents a meeting of nations; Marcia Kaufmann, violinist, is from the United States, Oksana Ezhokina, pianist, from Russia, and Sally Singer, cellist, from Great Britain. Joining the Trio for this fifth annual Songbird Concert will be community ensembles, The Marlin Handbells, and the Hi Strung String Band.

Martyn Stewart has traveled the world—from the highlands of Scotland, to the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, to Australia—and recorded sounds in the most unlikely places. He freelances for radio, television, and films, and monitors National Parks to protect the soundscape. Additionally, Martyn has contributed to major zoo exhibitions around the world, the BBC and NPR, and to various birding reference tapes and CDs. He has accumulated an impressive library of nature sounds, including recordings of biomes that no longer exist and dawn choruses from all over the world.



Enjoy field monitoring observations at some of the best sites in the Upper Valley while learning about the rich wetland and forest habitats of the lonely Meadow Creek area in the Chiwawa valley. Visit birding stations with wildlife biologist Heather Murphy and Upper Basin Birder Sally Soest as part of a long-term monitoring project for which volunteers provide birding data to the USFS and Barn Beach Reserve. Many composers have been inspired by nature, sometimes as directly as quoting cuckoos in the tunes; sometimes indirectly, referencing larks and nightingales, pastoral settings, or scenic locations in their pieces' titles. 

Red Crossbills (Picotuerto Rojo in Mexico) flit in large, nomadic flocks among the tops of conifer trees.

Their unique, long, crossed mandibles are specialized for prying open pine and fir cones to get at the seeds within. These birds may nest at any time of year. Listen for the high, thin "chipachipa-chipa" or "kik-kik-kik" that reveals this year-round resident.



White-headed Wood-pecker (Carpintero Cabeza Blanca in Mexico) favors ponderosa pines in our fire recovery areas. Though considered a year-round resident, it sometimes migrates to lower mountain slopes in the winter. Listen carefully for its hoarse, squeaky "pee-deek" as it moves among the trees.

Warbling Vireo (Vireo Gorjeador in Mexico) A riparian lover, this melodious singer has a rapid running "warble." This small neotropical migrant winters from central Mexico south through the west coast of South America to northern Chile.



Turkey Vulture (Zopilote Aura in Mexico)
These scavengers lay
well-hidden eggs on
the ground or in hollow
stumps. They winter in
the Southern US and
across South America to
the tip of Argentina.

The American Goldfinch (Jilguero canario in Mexico) is Washington's state bird and may winter as far south as Mexico. This bright yellow songster makes good use of the thistle plant. Nests are lined with thistledown, nestlings are fed

regurgitated milky seed pulp, and goldfinches are especially attracted to thistle seeds at your feeder.

Vaux's Swift (Vencejo de Vaux in Mexico) A cigar-shaped body and tail and bat-like wing beats distinguish swifts from swallows. Vaux's swifts are communal roosters - they may be seen by the dozens or hundreds at nightfall, arriving as a "spiral" into their roost cavity, often made by a Pileated Woodpecker.



The Chipping Sparrow (Gorrión Coronirrufo Cejiblanco in Mexico) is an indicator species for the Partners in Flight bird conservation plan. They represent neotropical migratory songbirds nesting in ponderosa pine forests.

The Barred Owl (Búho Listado in Mexico) is a large, dark-eyed, year-round resident of forests in the Eastern, Northern and Northwestern US. It is closely related to the threatened Northern Spotted Owl. The Barred's loud, territorial barking hoots and screams echo from dark forest groves, as the owls emerge at dusk to hunt for rodents, birds, and frogs.



estern Tanager, the "spokes-bird" for Leavenworth Spring Bird Fest, is called Tangara Capucha Roja in Mexico. This brilliantly colored neotropical migrant flies from wintering grounds in Mexico and Central America to nest in Western North America, including the Wenatchee River Watershed. Western Tanagers, first documented during the Lewis and Clark 1804-06 expedition, have a wide diet that includes scale insects, wasps, grasshoppers, ants, elderberries, and wild cherries. Look for it among the canopies of ponderosa pines and Douglas-firs where it calls with its distinctive, repeated "peedck" or robin-like chirps. The Western Tanager heralds spring in North Central Washington!
