PARTS of a BIRD



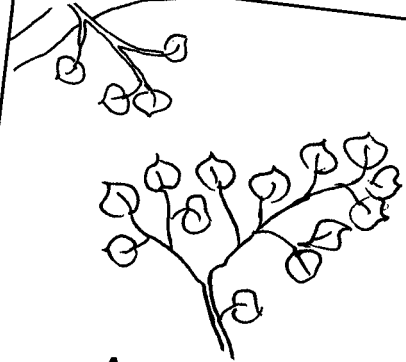
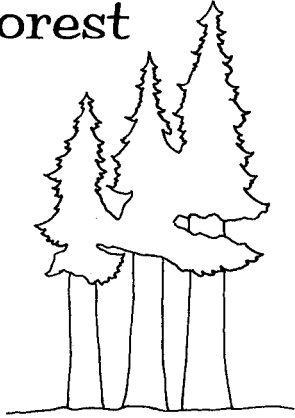
A **MIGRANT** bird lives in Klamath and Lake Counties during the spring and summer and travels to a tropical country to live in the fall and winter.



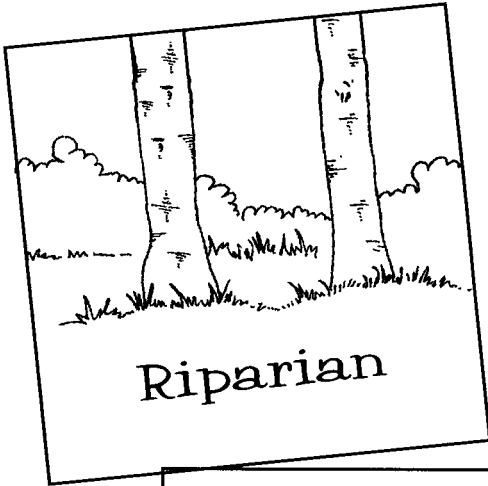
A **RESIDENT** bird lives in Klamath and Lake Counties all year long.

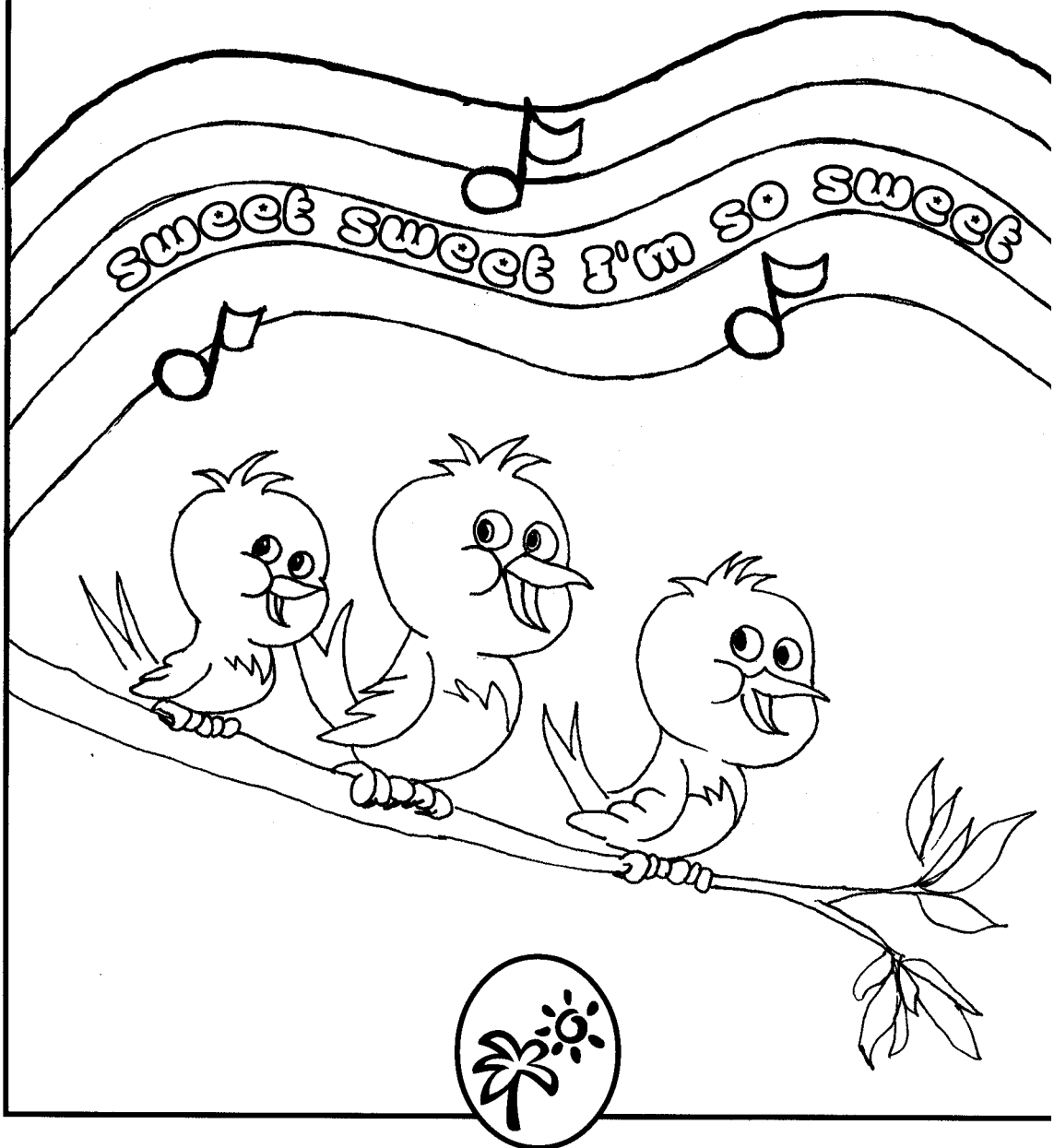
The American Robin is a common bird
often seen in towns and on **lawns**.



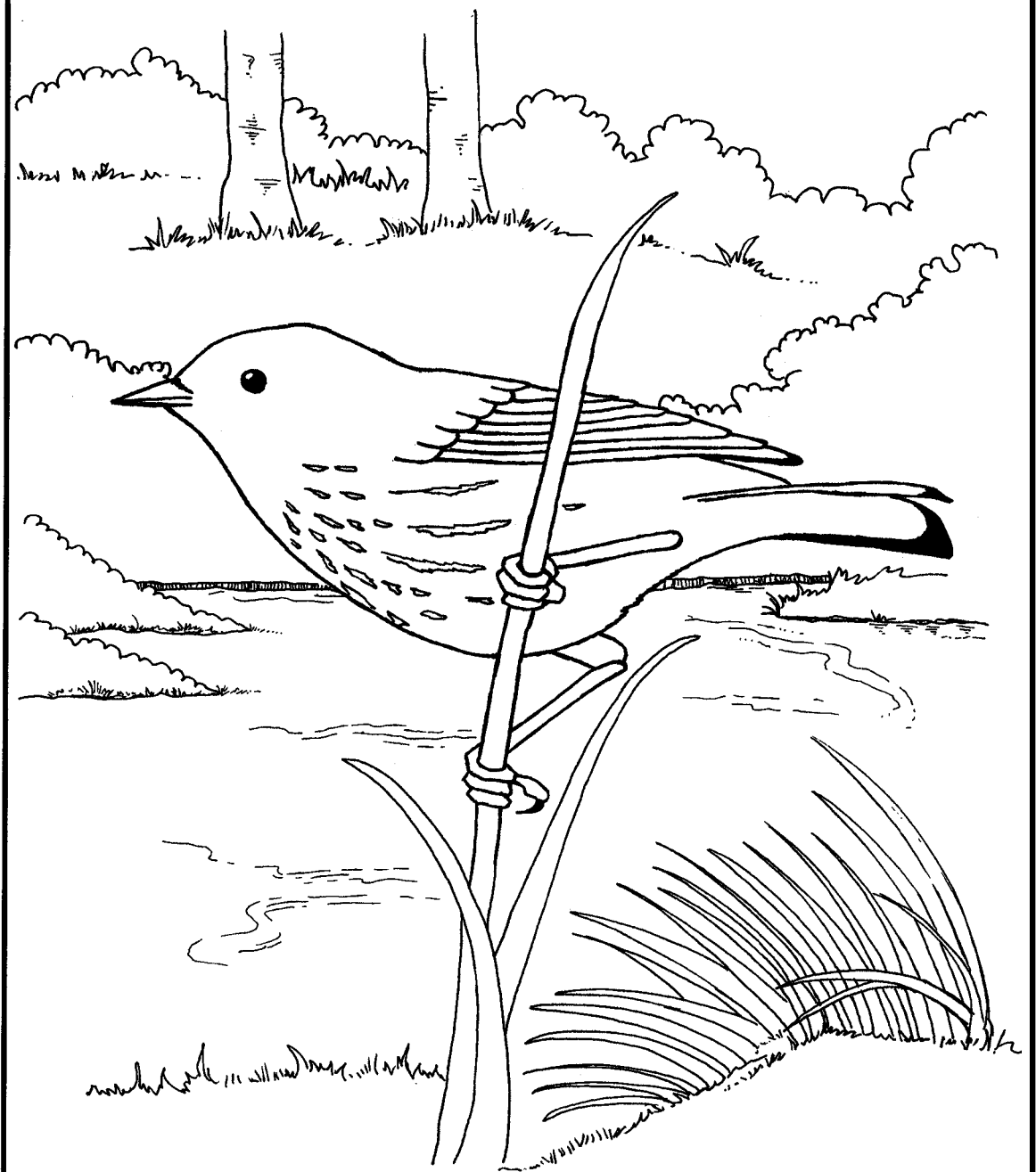

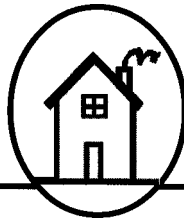
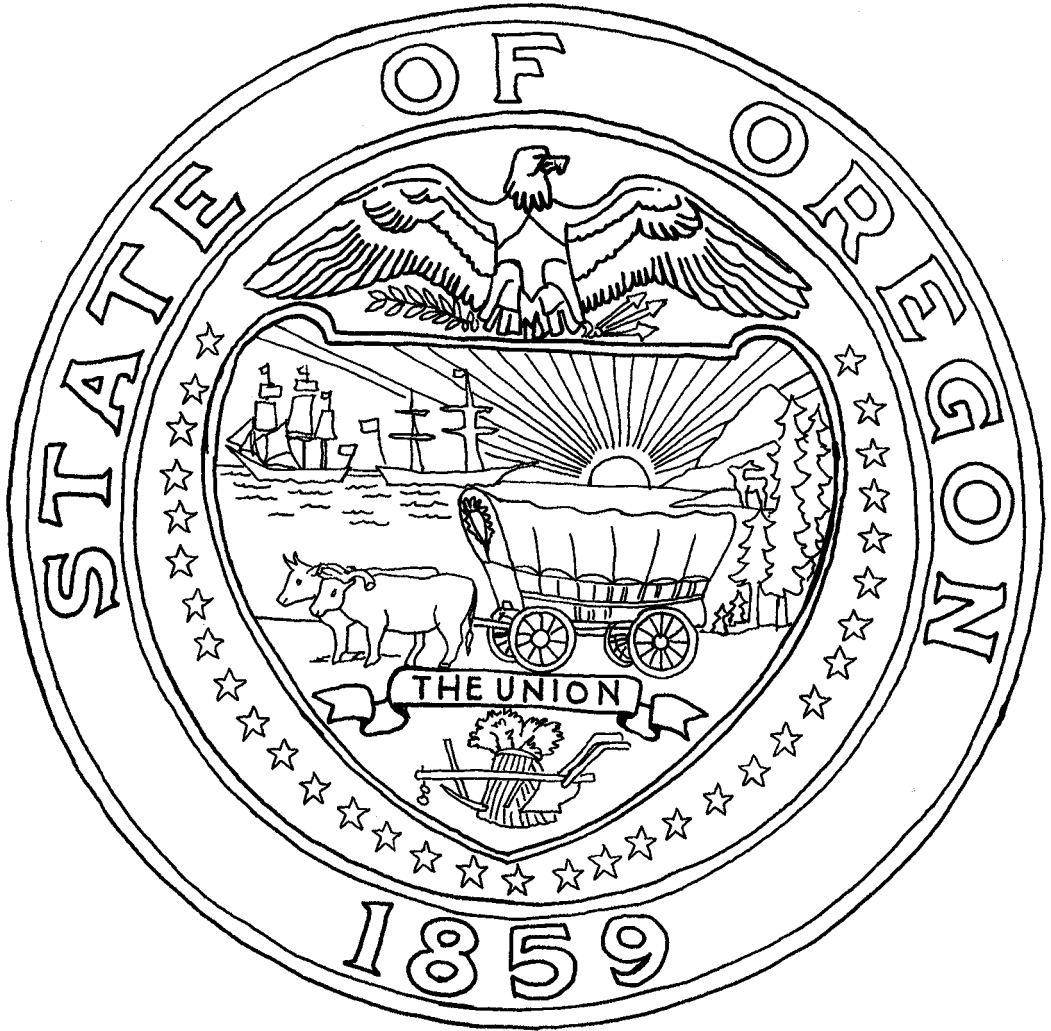
If you hear a song by a stream

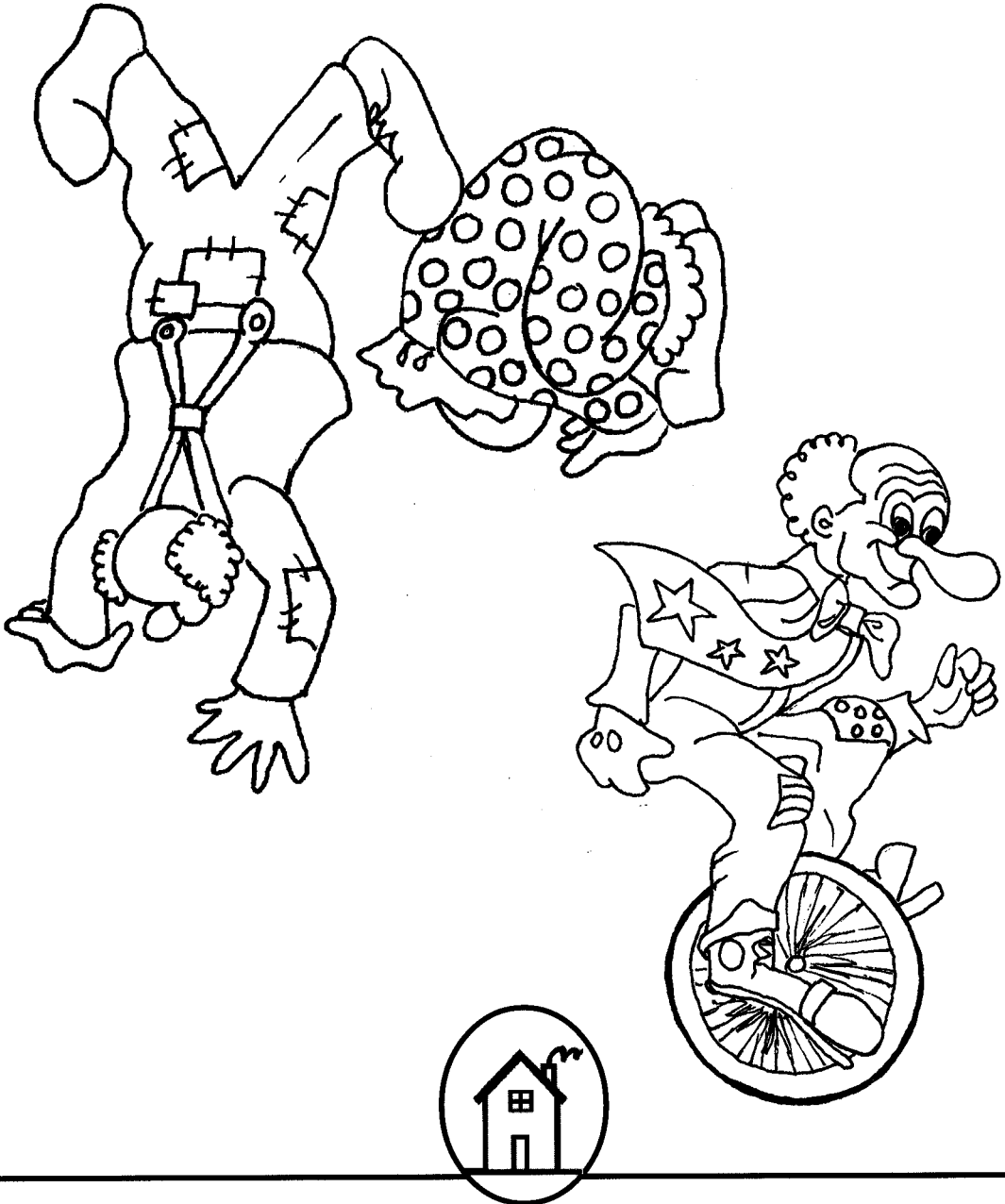
The Western Meadowlark is

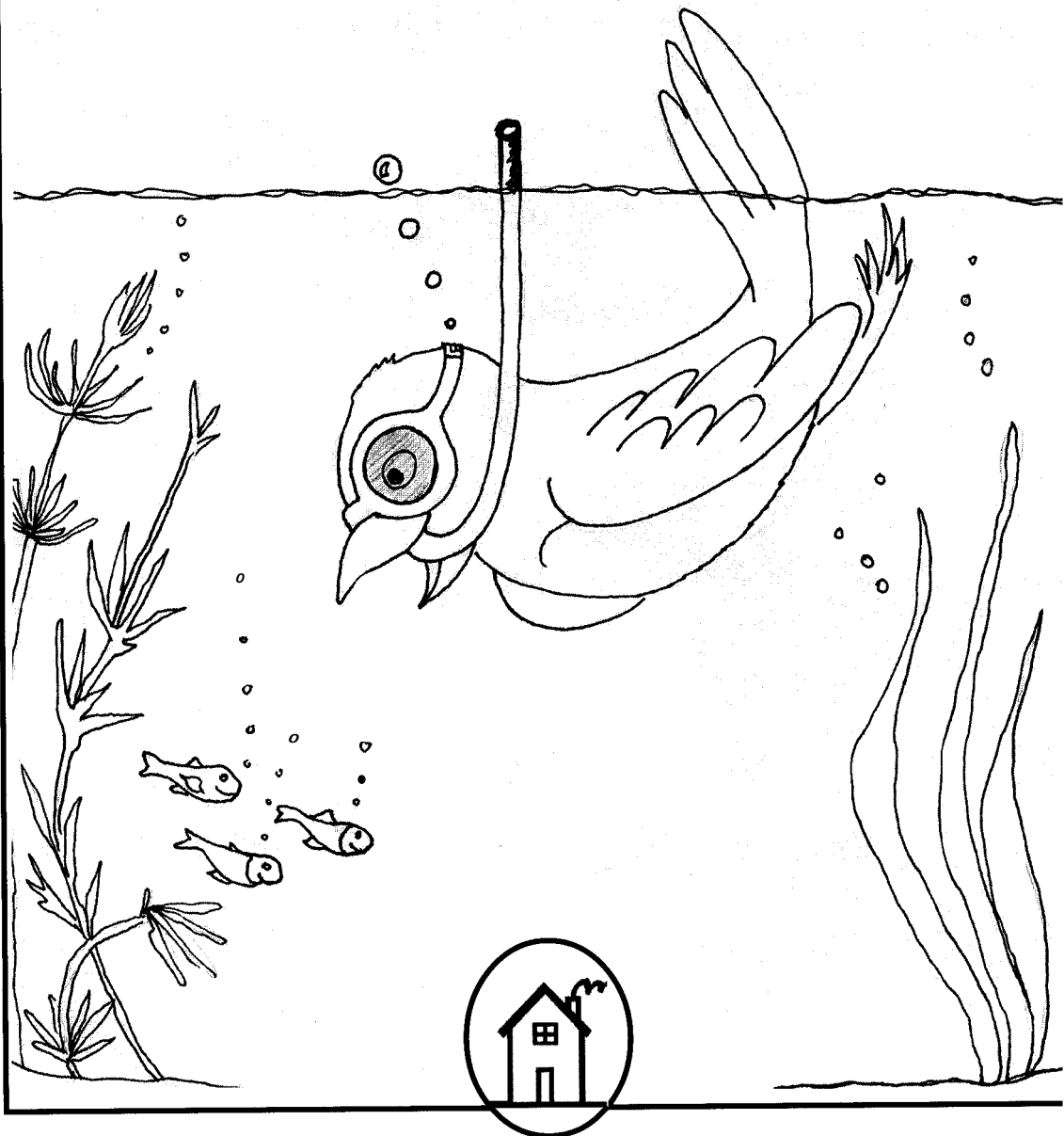
Red-breasted Nuthatches have short tails;

down, and all around tree trunks and branches.



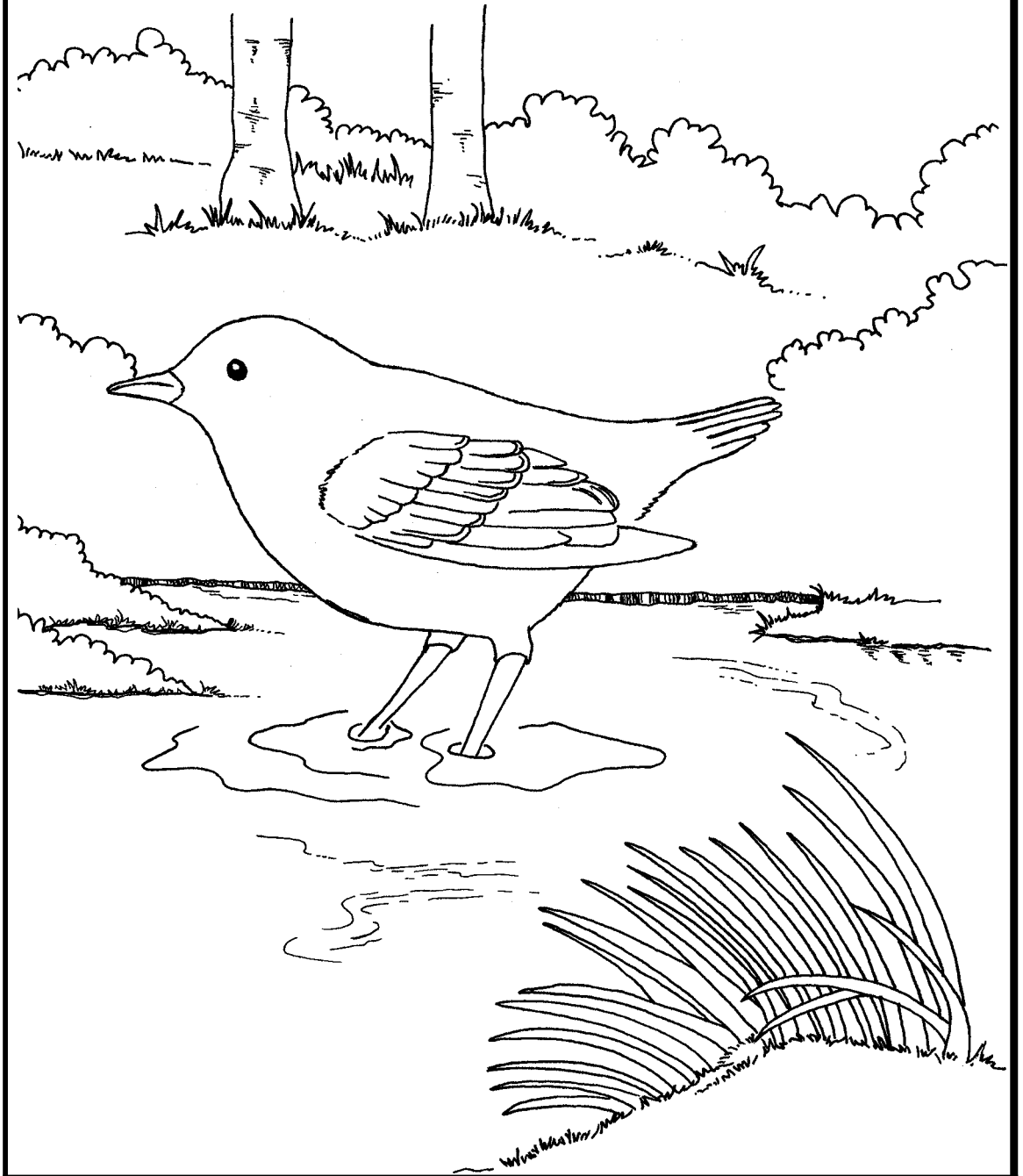

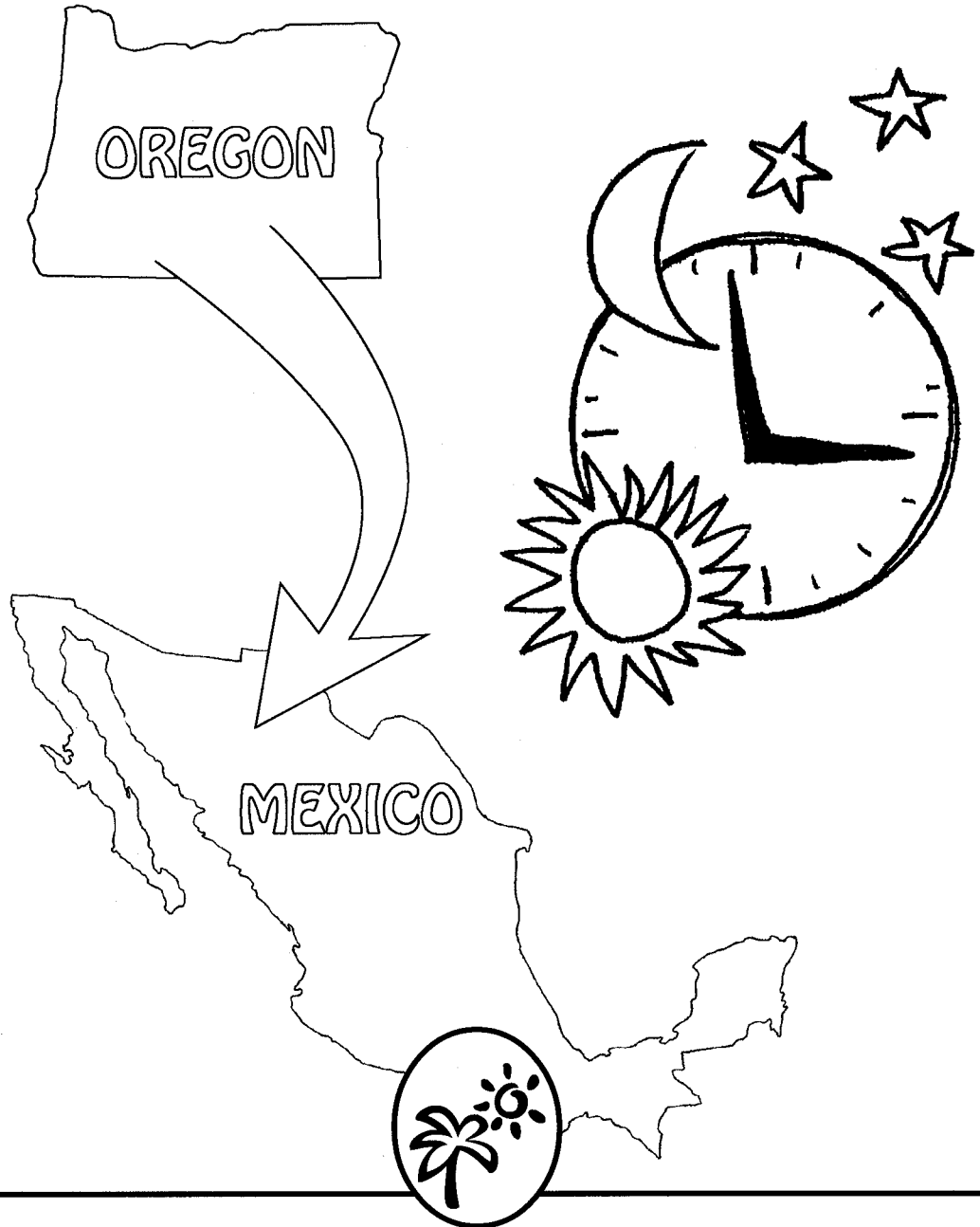
The American Dipper is the only American bird

It is often seen bobbing up and down.



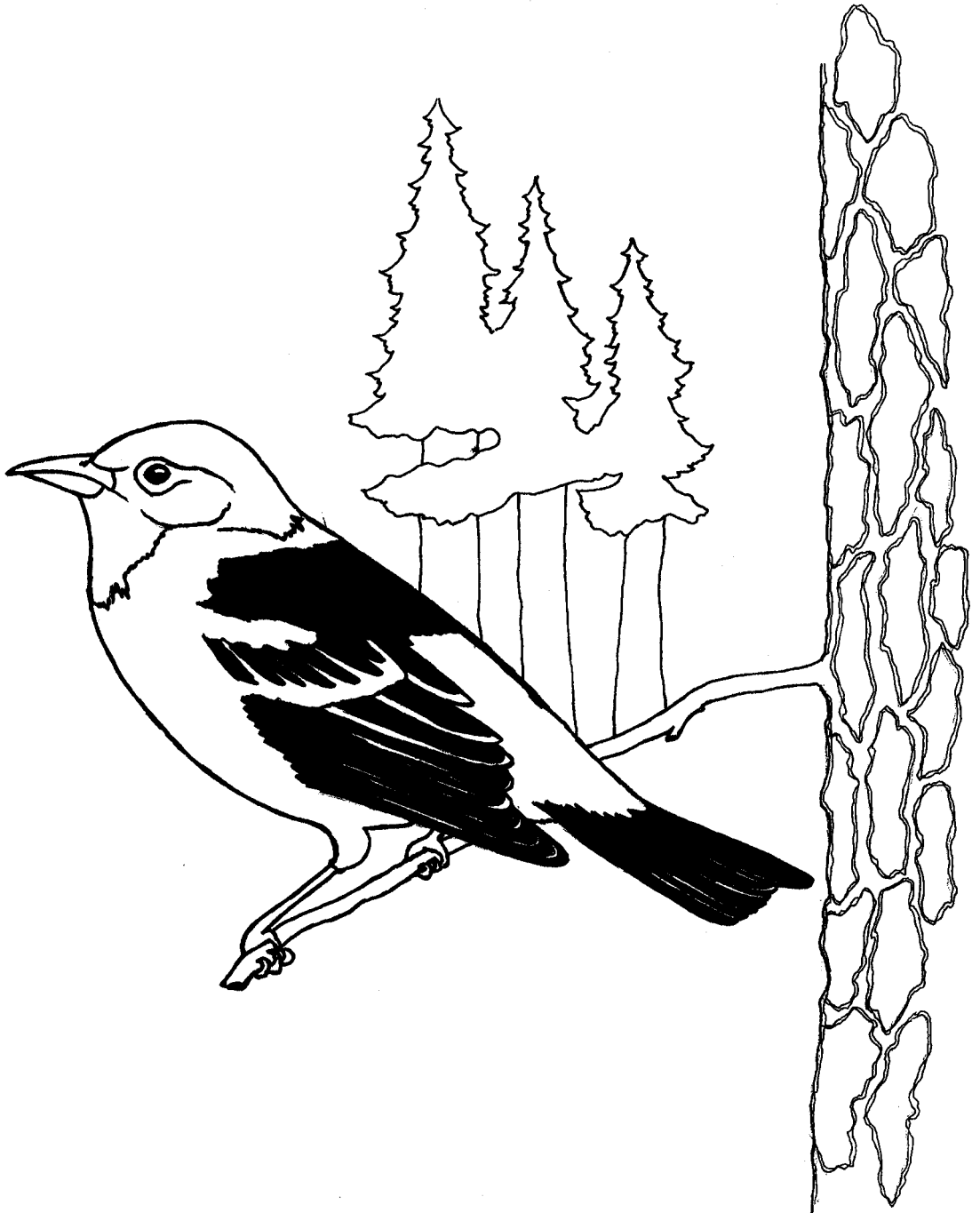

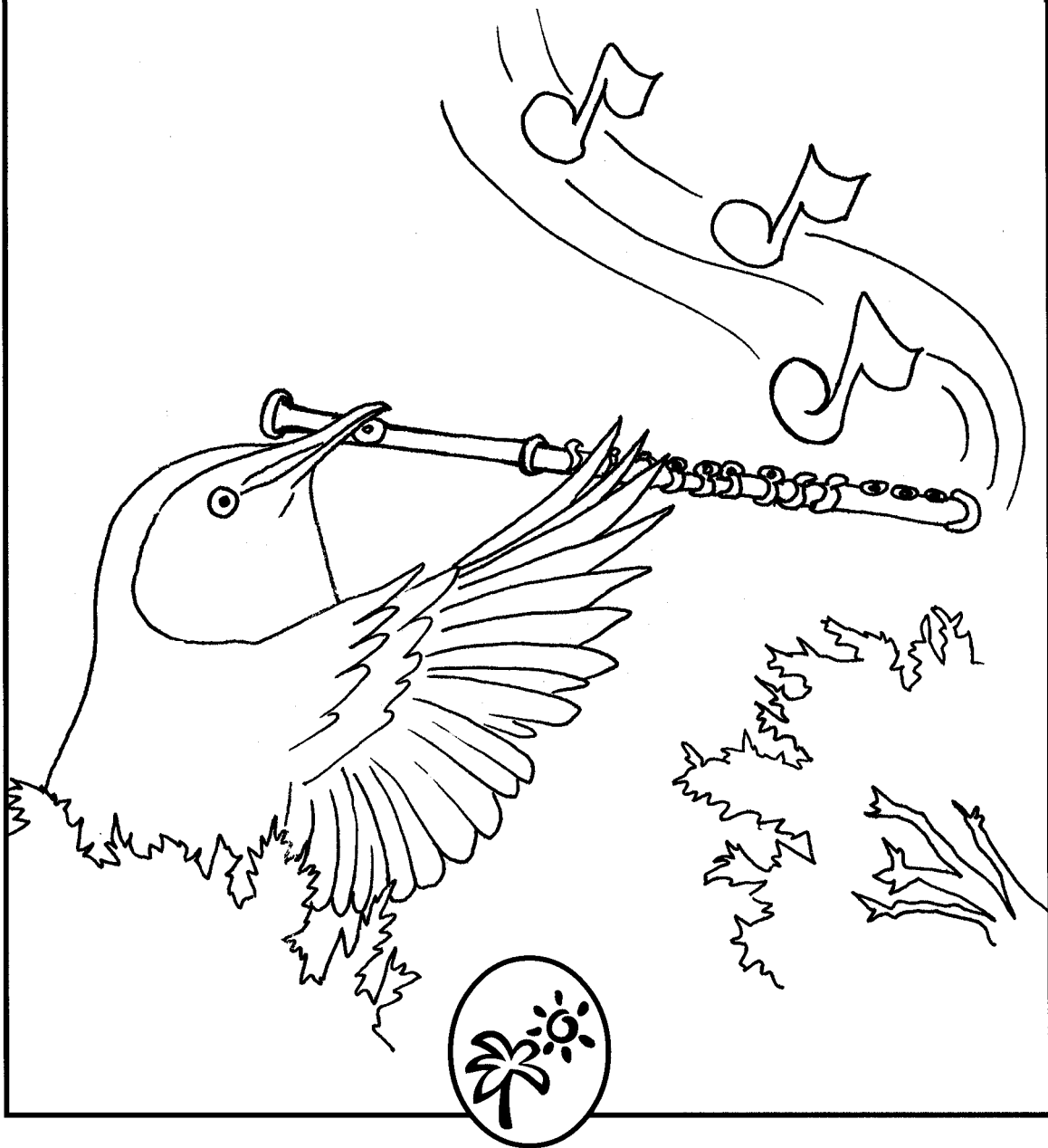
The Western Tanager travels all the way to Mexico to spend the winter and returns to our basins for the summer

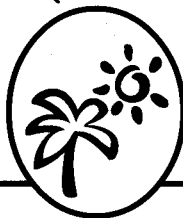
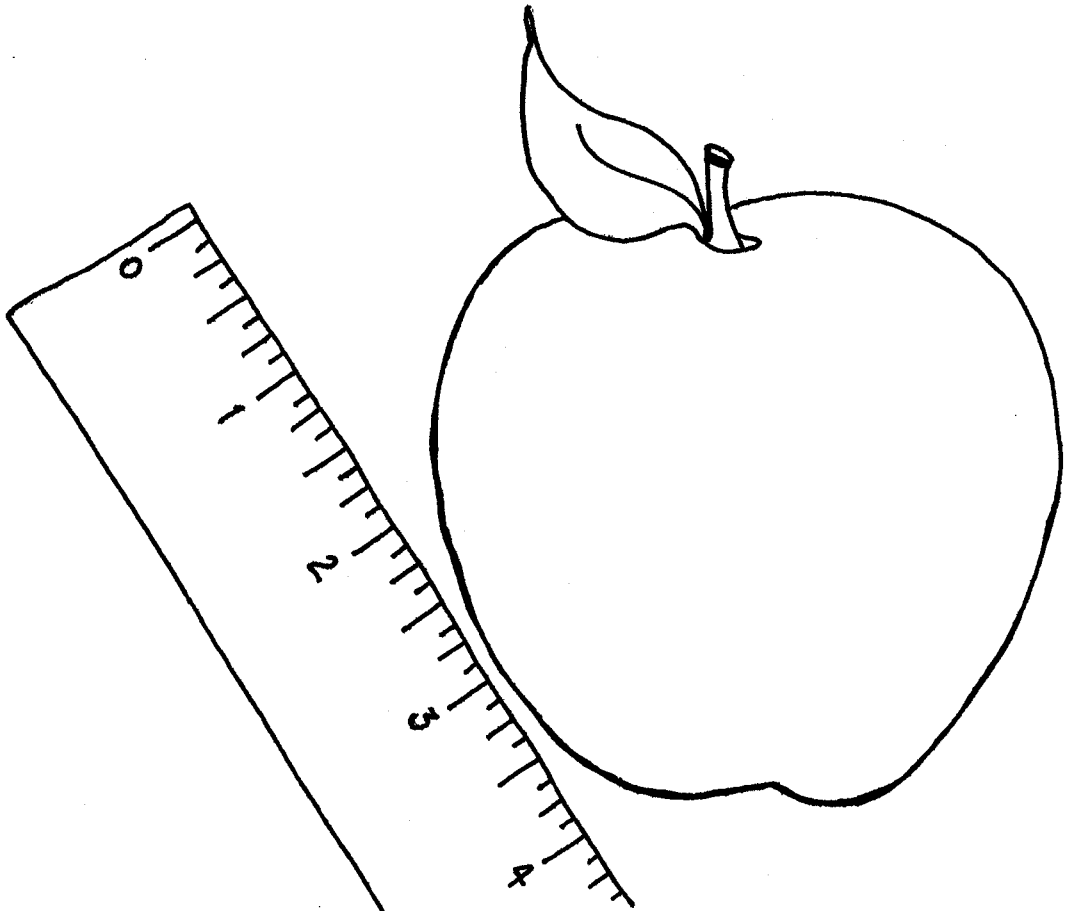
The Sage Thrasher sings ■ flute-like melody while sitting on the top of sagebrush.



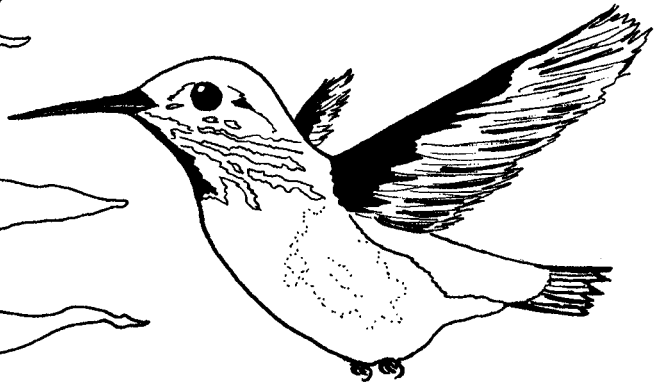
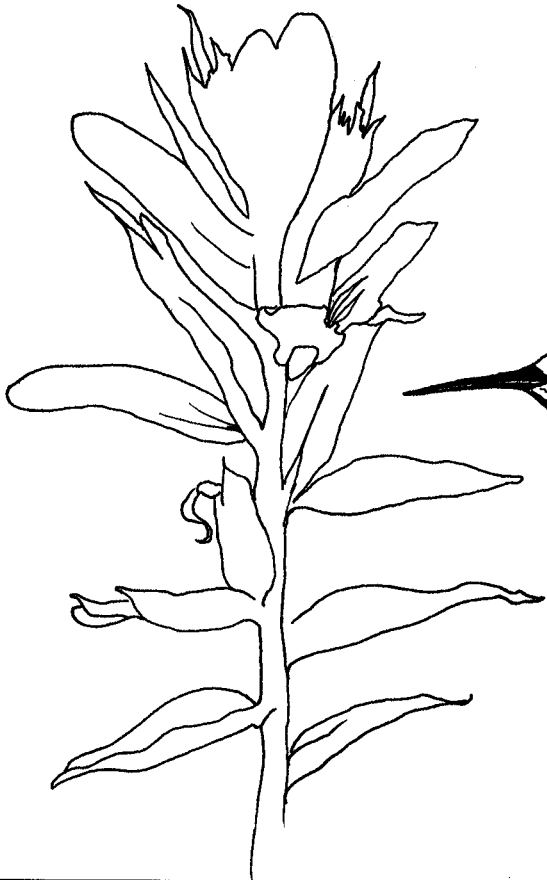
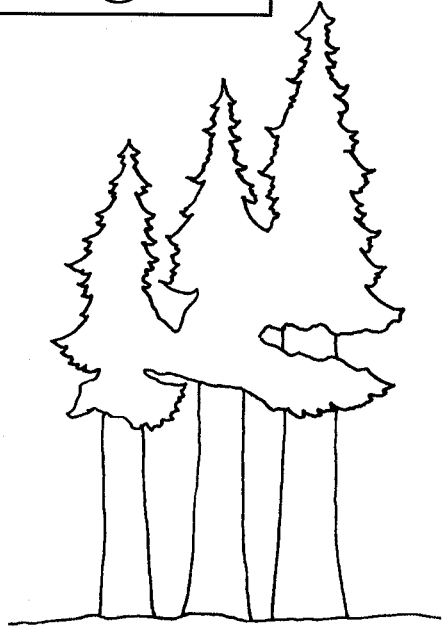

The Calliope Hummingbird is the smallest bird in North America, measuring about $3 \frac{1}{4}$ inches!



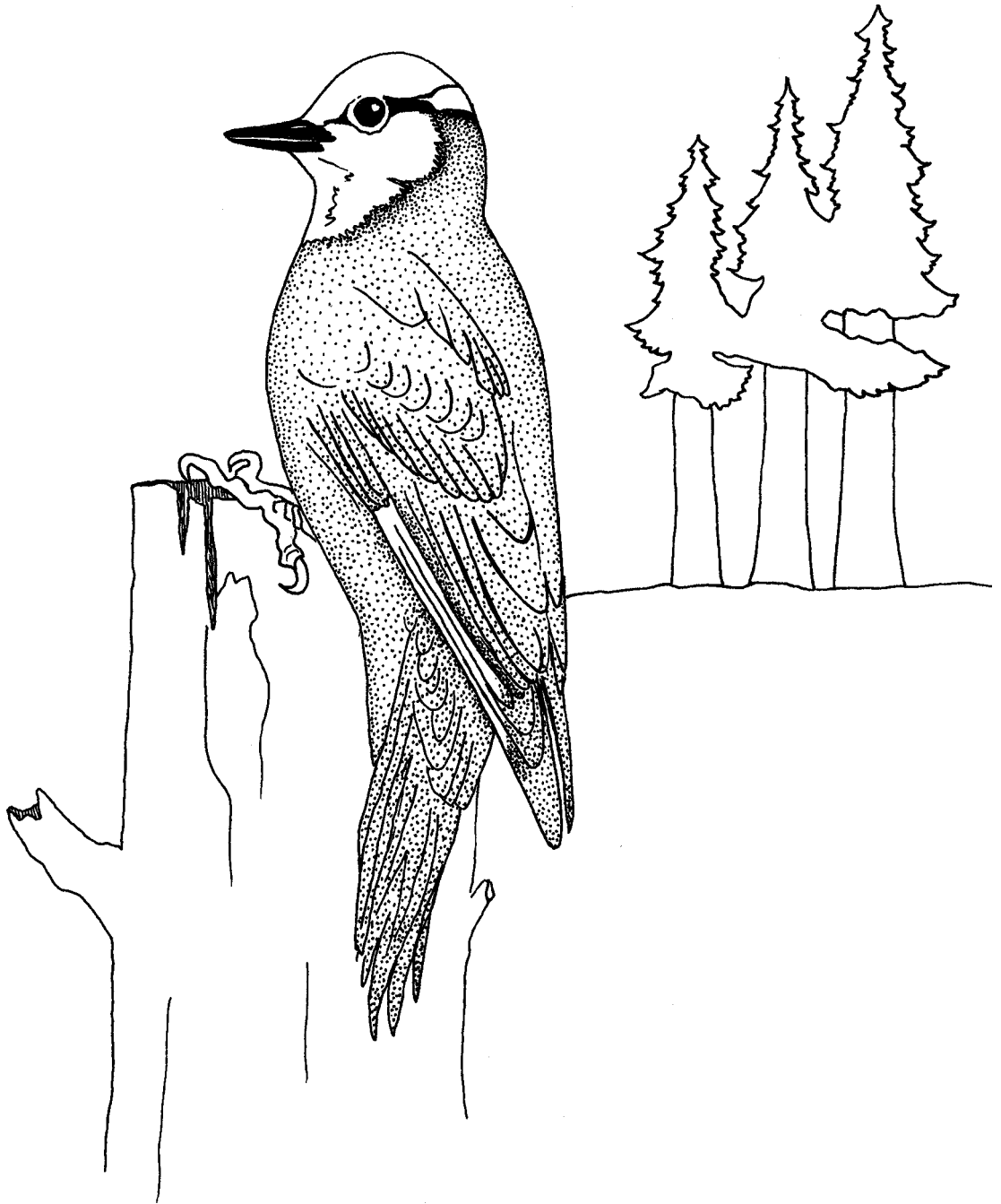

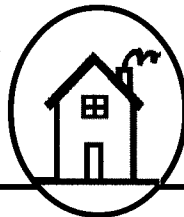
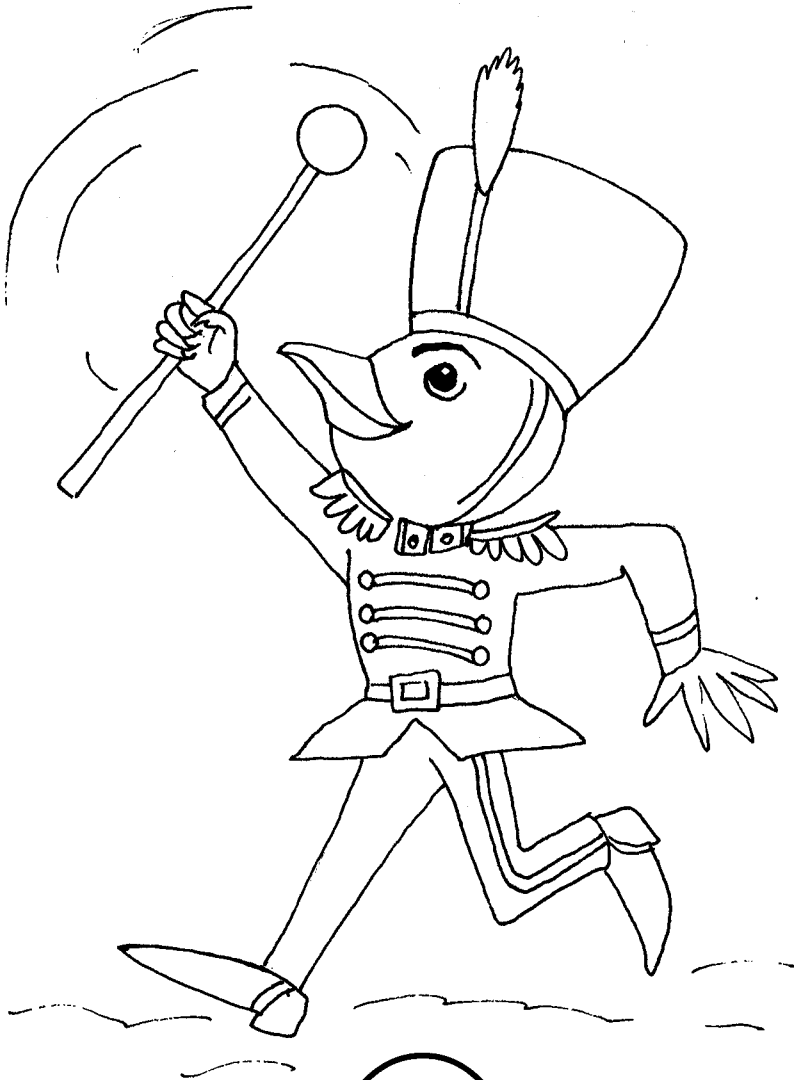
The White-headed Woodpecker eats wood-boring bugs from old growth ponderosa pine trees.

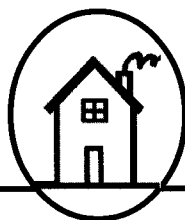
The Red-winged Blackbird **has** bright red wing patches that it loves to display.

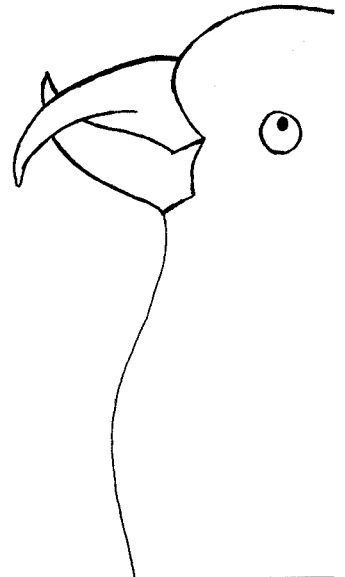
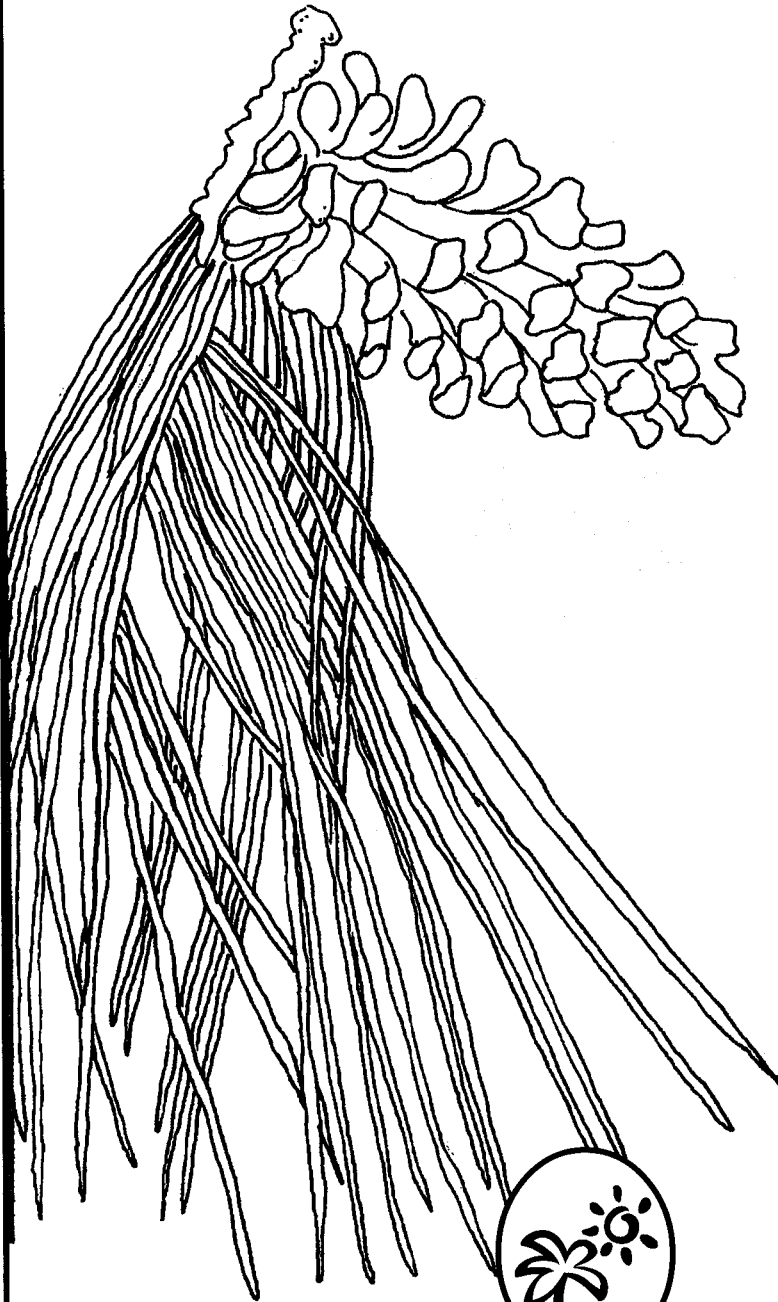
The Lazuli Bunting is a colorful bird that lives in shrub lands and **near** streams.



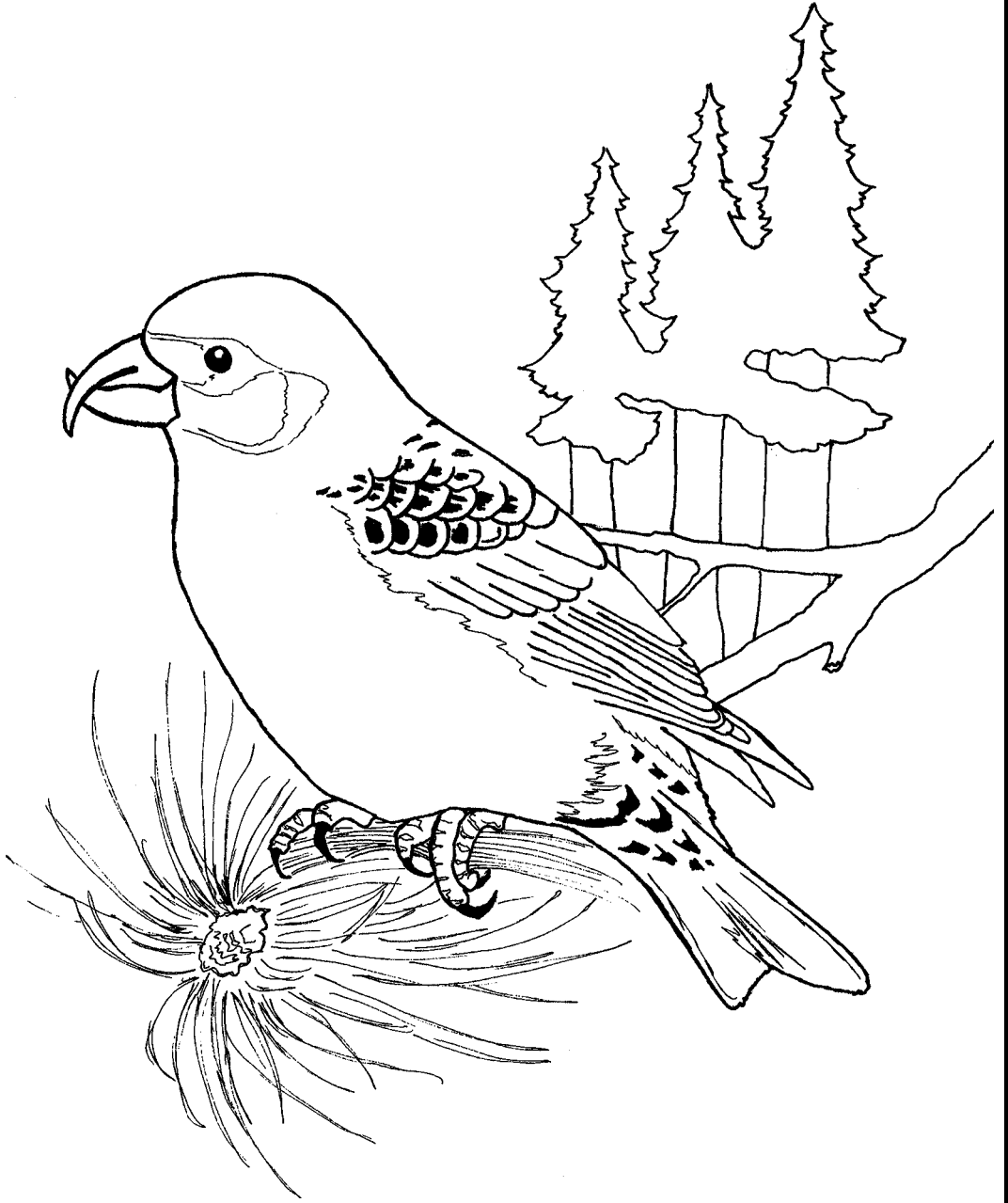

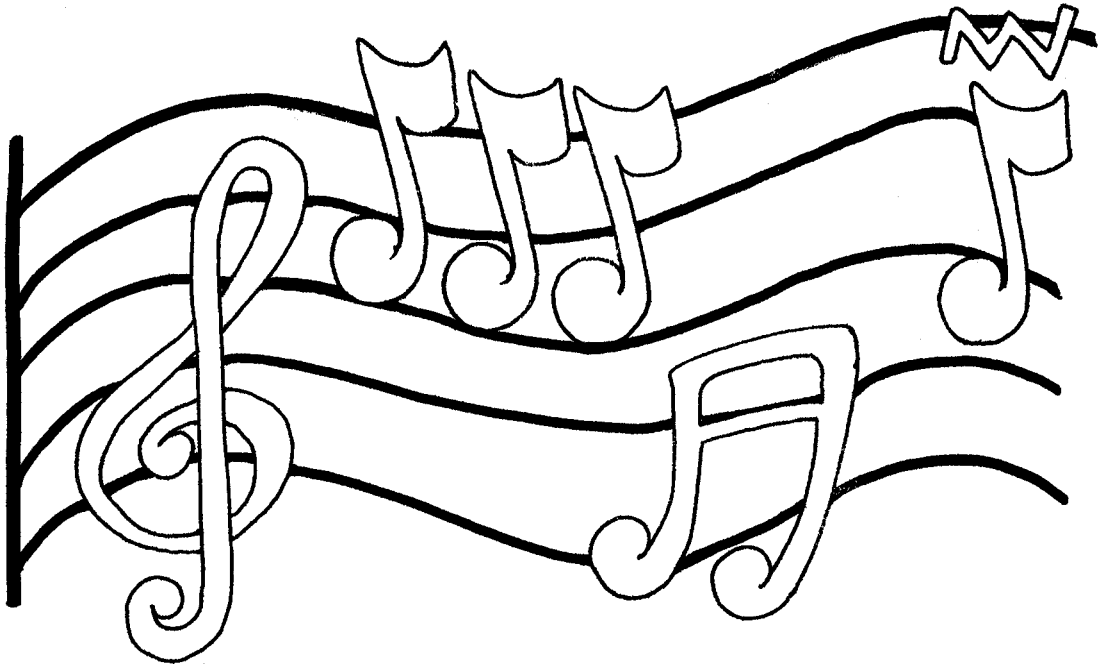
The Red Crossbill has a special bill that it uses to pry seeds out of pine cones.



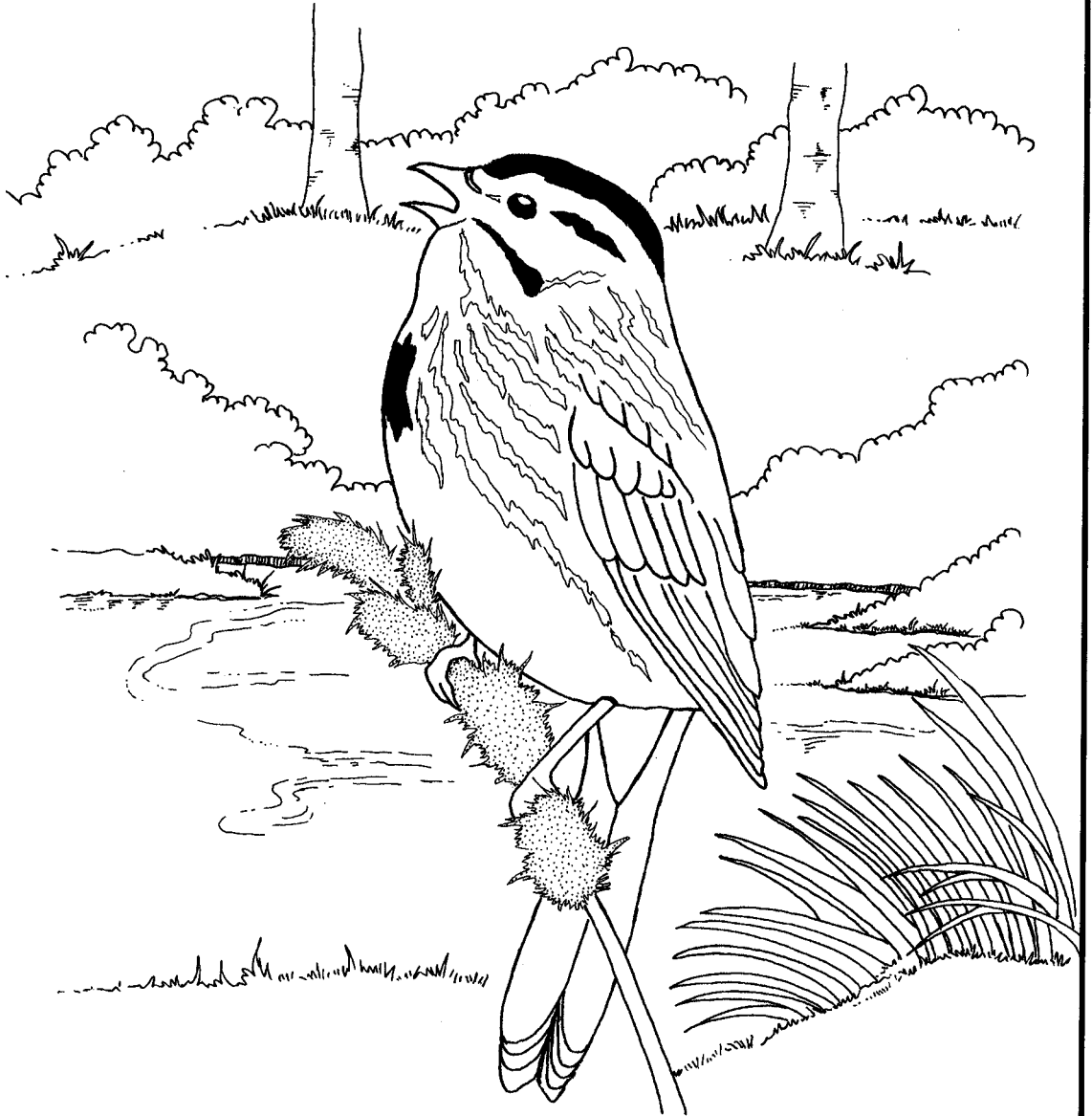

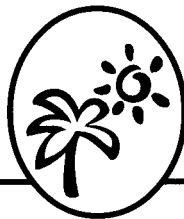
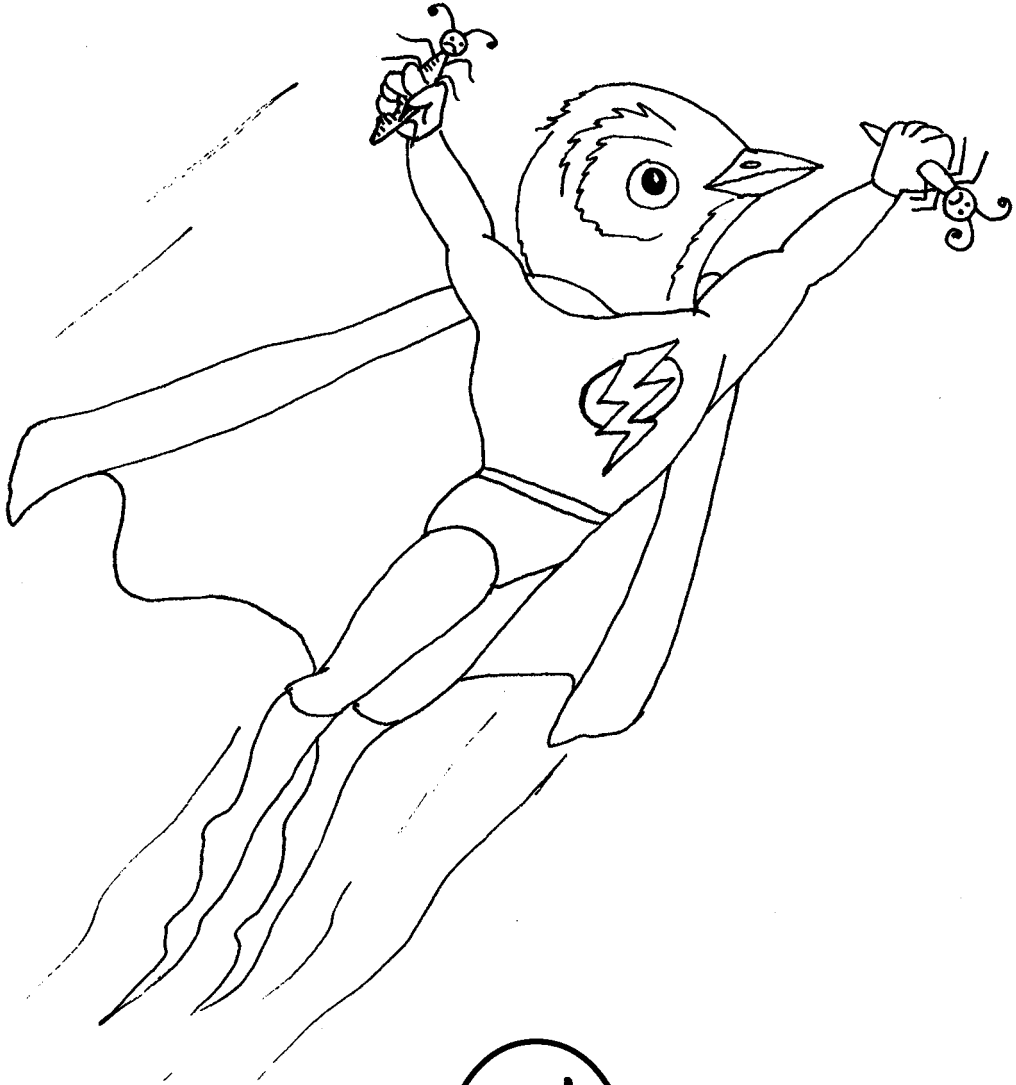
The Song Sparrow's beautiful melody consists of three or four short, clear notes followed by a buzzy "towwee" and a trill.



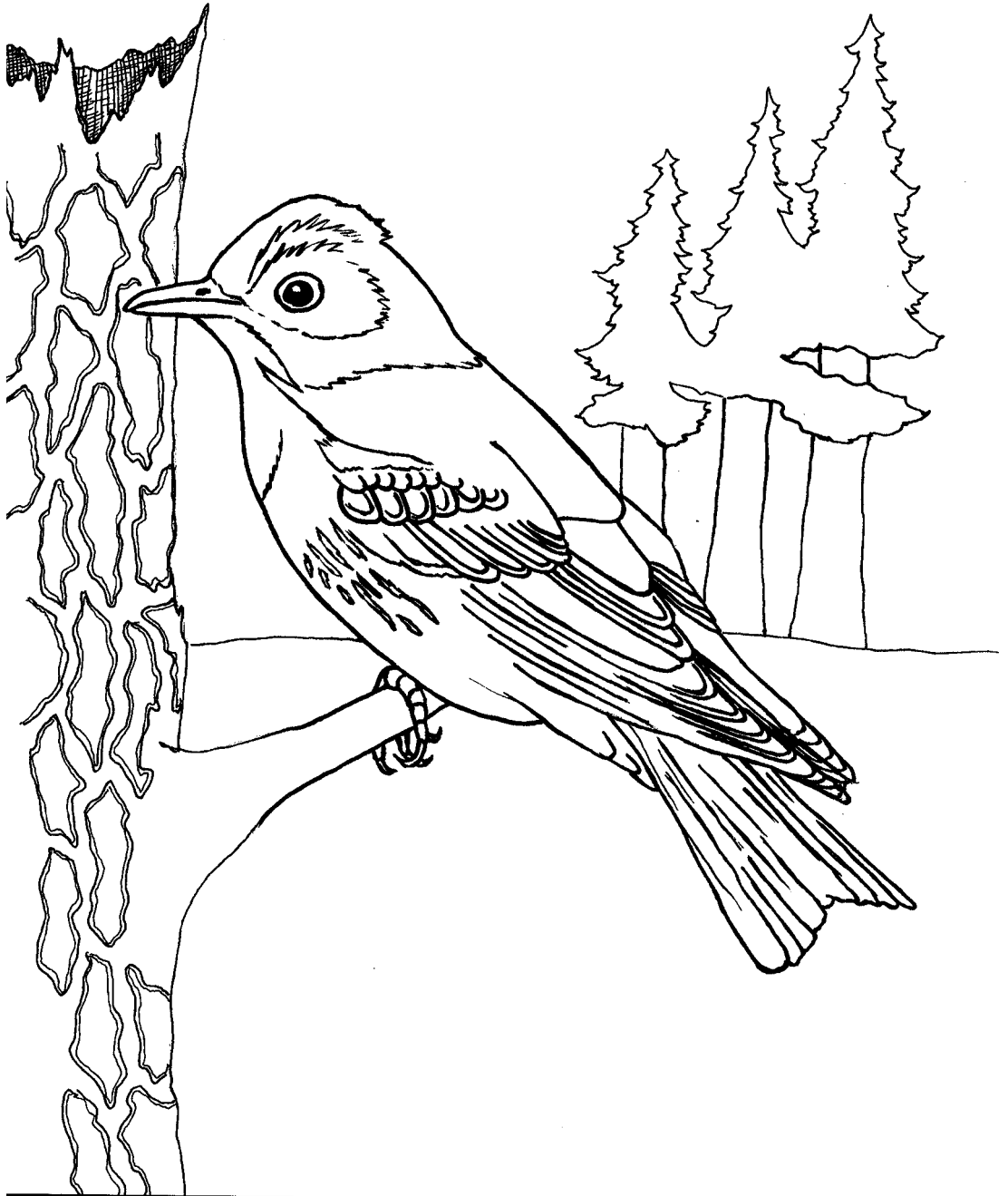

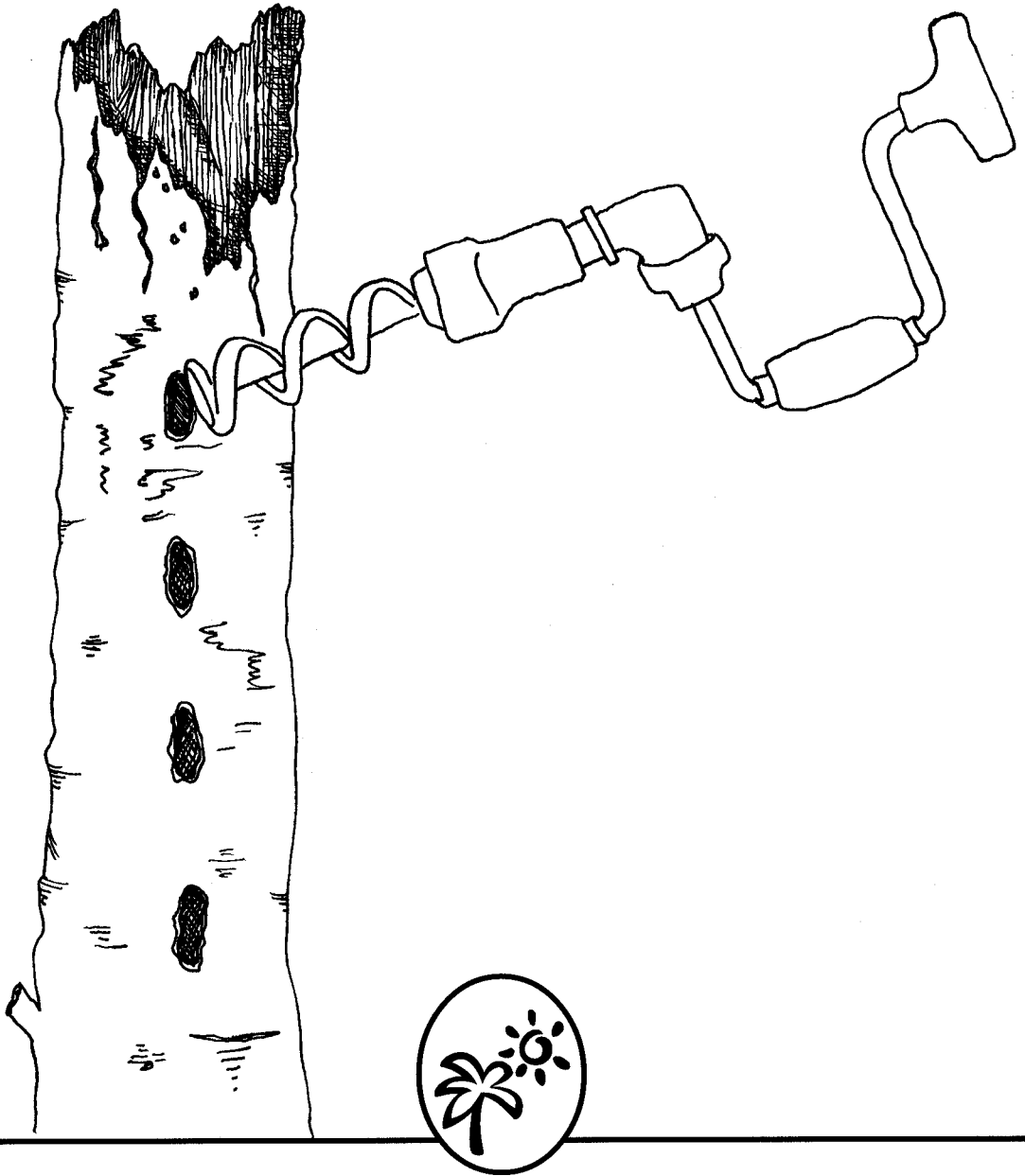
The Olive-sided Flycatcher flies with *super* speed from high perches to catch insects.

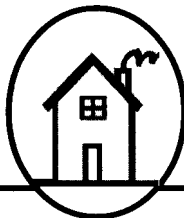
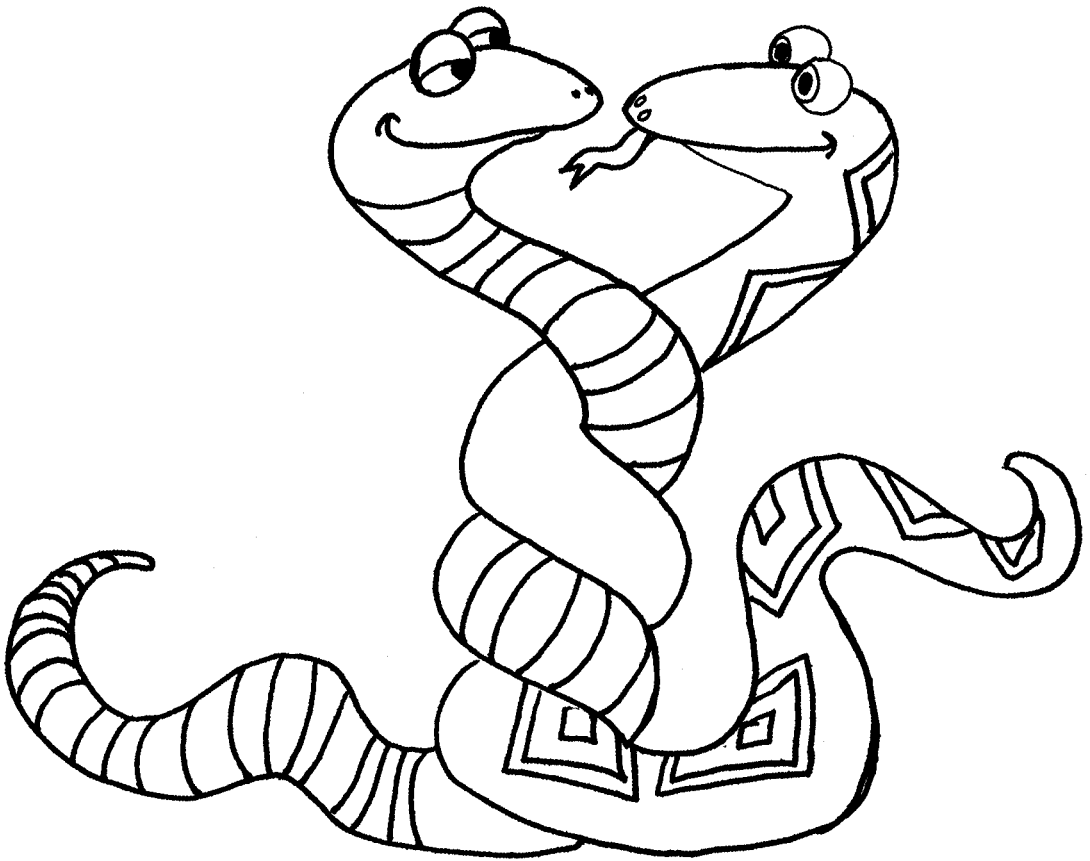
Red-naped Sapsuckers drill evenly-spaced rows of holes in aspen trees. They then visit these “wells” for sap and the insects they attract.



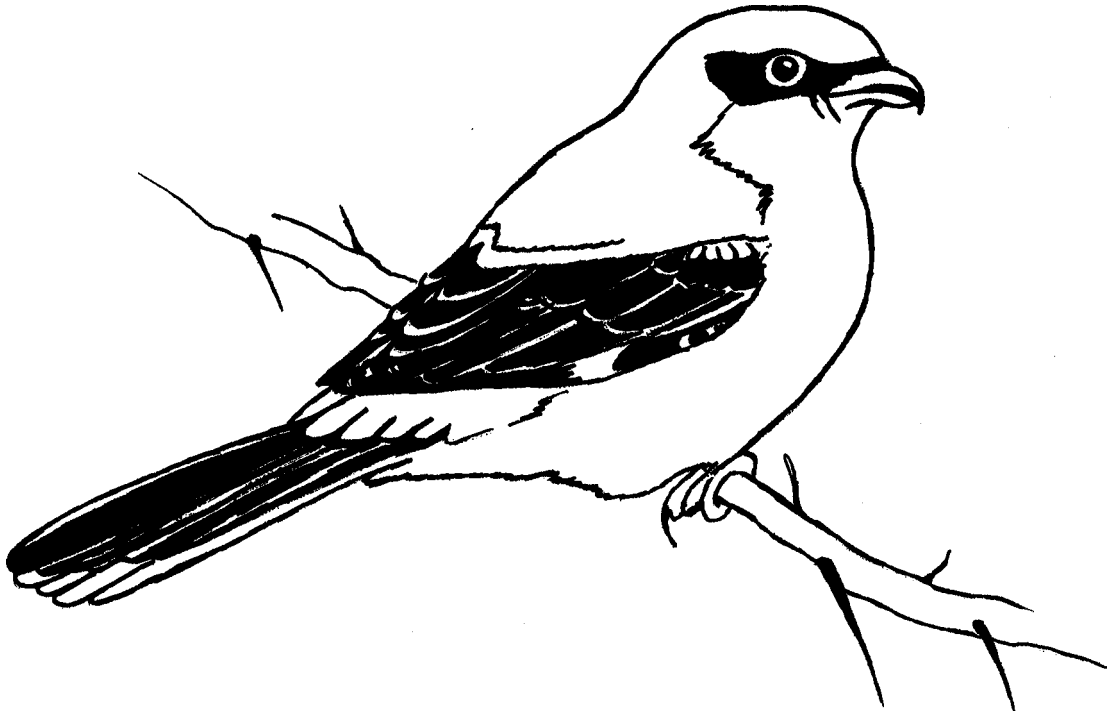

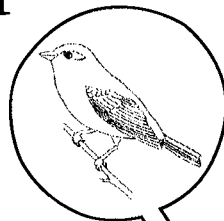
**The Loggerhead Shrike is a masked hunter

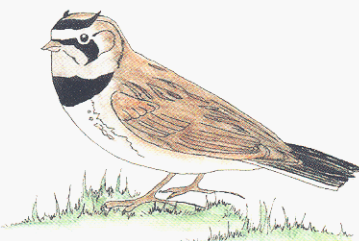

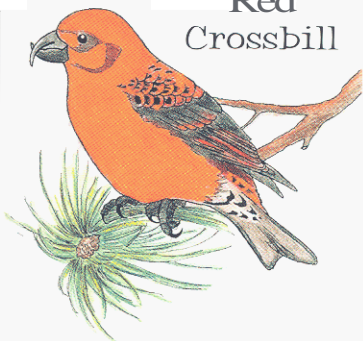
