

A Year at a Glance: 2003

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Natural History of Little River

The Little River Canyon area is extraordinary in both its geology and biology. As the river winds its course through the Canyon (nearly 600 feet deep at some locations), it creates a mosaic of microhabitats that support unique groups of plants and

animals. A few of these are known to exist only on Lookout Mountain. In fact, a number of plant, fish, insect, and amphibian species are federal-

ly listed as threatened or endangered.

The Canyon has been described as the "Grand Canyon of the East." It is one of the most picturesque canyon systems in the eastern United States, offering some of the deepest gorges this side of the Mississippi River. Little River Canyon has been classified as an "Outstanding

National Resource Water," which insures the strongest level of protection possible for state waterways.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

The field school staff is eager to work with your school, scout troop, club, or group in designing programs that are tailor-fitted to your needs and budget.






