SECRETARY POWELL: Well, good morning, everyone, and thank you for joining us

today to recognize the fiscal year 2005 Millennium Challenge Corporation

countries. On Monday, the Millennium Challenge Corporation Board, which  ${\tt I}$  am

privileged and proud to chair, carefully evaluated 68 candidate countries to

determine whether they would be eligible for assistance at this time.

We applied the criteria set forth in the Millennium Challenge Act, giving heavy

weight to publicly available indicators. For next year, we have selected 16

countries which have demonstrated through their policies and practices that

they rule justly, invest in their people, and that they encourage economic

freedom.

Please join me, then, in congratulating representatives of the countries we

selected: Armenia, Benin, Bolivia, Georgia, Ghana, Honduras, Lesotho, Madagascar, Mali, Mongolia, Morocco, Mozambique, Nicaragua, Senegal, Sri Lanka,

and Vanuatu. Please join me in recognizing all of them. (Applause.)

All of us recognize that the road to reform is not easy but your governments

are taking the tough steps to move in the right direction and your fellow

citizens will have a brighter future as a result. As President Bush said, the  $\,$ 

Millennium Challenge Account was born of the idea that we should provide

greater resources to countries that are taking greater responsibility for their

own development and all of the countries we have selected are doing just that.

Morocco is a new entry to the Millennium Challenge Account ranks this year.

Under the leadership of King Mohamed VI, Morocco has embarked on a program of  $\,$ 

political, economic and educational reform designed to bring Morocco into the

global community. The Government of Morocco has recently passed a family law

that revolutionizes the rights of women, has signed a bilateral free trade

agreement with the United States and has held transparent parliamentary and

local elections.

What Morocco has done exemplifies the various kinds of concrete steps taken by

the 15 countries that qualified for assistance in fiscal year 2004, and again

now in fiscal year 2005. Of course, selection, in and of itself, does not

guarantee funding. Each Millennium Challenge Account country must first develop

its own proposal to promote growth and reduce poverty. These proposals must set

clear goals and measurable benchmarks.

We're glad to report that the proposal and compact development process is

moving along quite well. Millennium Challenge Corporation already has received

proposals or concept papers from 14 of the 16 countries selected in fiscal year

2004, and we are beginning negotiations on business plans with four countries.

Today, we also wish to recognize the distinguished representatives from

threshold states. The threshold countries have demonstrated the potential to

become eligible for funding in the future, and I hope that all of them will

pass across the threshold and receive funding in the future. We are prepared to

work with them to improve their performance in areas where we still think

improvement is needed. The United States Agency for International Development

will administer the threshold program with the Millennium Challenge Corporation.

We especially wish to thank the members of Congress and their staffs who are

here with us today. It is the support that we have received from the Congress

that has made this far-reaching and revolutionary program possible.

Our thanks are also due to the representatives of the NGO and private sectors  $% \left( 1\right) =\left( 1\right) +\left( 1$ 

who are here with us this morning. We appreciate your interests and your active

support of our Millennium Challenge Account efforts.

President Bush proposed this program to help those who are helping themselves.

Many of you here today were instrumental in making the Millennium Challenge

Account a reality and your continued support and guidance are essential to the

program's effectiveness and its ultimate success. In the years ahead,  $\ensuremath{\mathsf{may}}$  all

of us continue to work in partnership, to help developing countries build their

own capacities for success and pave the way for a more peaceful, free and

prosperous world for all people.

So thank you so very much for being with us this morning and congratulations to  $% \left( 1\right) =\left( 1\right) +\left( 1\right) +\left($ 

all of the selected and threshold countries.
