On May 6, 2004, President Bush directed the implementation of certain changes to the Cuba embargo to implement recommendations in the report of the Commission on Assistance to a Free Cuba. The Office of Foreign Assets Control ("OFAC") is amending the Cuban Assets Control Regulations, 31 C.F.R. Part 515 (the "Regulations"), effective June 30, 2004, to make substantive changes consistent with the President's policy. See 69 Fed. Reg. 33768. A copy of the Federal Register notice is posted on our website at www.treas.gov/ofac.

Please find below a summary of the some of the amended Regulations that affect authorized travel, carrier, and remittance forwarding service providers:

<u>Travel to visit relatives in Cuba</u>. A number of significant changes have been made to this policy:

- The general license contained in former § 515.561(a) authorizing travel-related transactions for family visits once in a twelve-month period is eliminated effective June 30, 2004. All existing specific licenses issued by OFAC pursuant to former § 515.561(b) authorizing an additional visit within the same twelve-month period have been amended to terminate on June 30, 2004. However, due to the Cuban Government's control of the flow of information within Cuba, individuals currently traveling legally in Cuba may not have access to accurate information about the amendments to the Regulations. For this reason, OFAC has issued a general license authorizing any person traveling in Cuba on June 29, 2004, under a family visit general or specific license to continue to engage in transactions in Cuba authorized by that license through July 31, 2004. Accordingly, authorized service providers may continue to provide their services to such travelers until 12:01 a.m. Eastern Daylight Time on August 1, 2004.
- Beginning June 30, 2004, under new §515.561(a) of the Regulations, OFAC will issue specific licenses for persons to visit in Cuba "a member of the person's immediate family" who is a national of Cuba ("Immediate Family specific license"). A suggested application format is enclosed. To obtain a specific license, the new rules require that:
  - (1) the person to be visited in Cuba must be a spouse, child, grandchild, parent, grandparent, or sibling of the traveler or the traveler's spouse, as well as any spouse, widow or widower of any of the foregoing;

- (2) the traveler must not have emigrated from Cuba to the United States in the last three years;
- (3) the traveler must not have engaged in travel-related transactions to, from, or within Cuba under a general license for a family visit in the last three years; and
- (4) the traveler must not have been issued a specific license for a family visit in the past three years.
- The Immediate Family specific license does not allow another person to accompany the authorized traveler merely because the second person shares a common dwelling as a family with the authorized traveler. All travelers must be members of the immediate family of the person to be visited in Cuba.
- Visits under the Immediate Family specific license are limited to no more than 14 days.
- Amended § 515.560(c) restricts persons traveling under the Immediate Family specific license to spending no more than \$50 a day plus an additional \$50 per trip, if needed, for transportation-related expenses in Cuba. (The per diem for other authorized travelers -- e.g., qualified journalists -- remains unchanged.)
- Additional visits under the Immediate Family specific license will not be authorized.
- All applications for specific licenses under former § 515.561(b) to visit a Cuban national family member more than once per year will not be authorized in view of the new policy.
- Under amended § 515.561(b), OFAC may issue specific licenses for persons to visit a
  non-Cuban national member of the person's immediate family who is in Cuba pursuant to
  an OFAC license (such as a daughter traveling in Cuba under an educational institution
  license) under exigent circumstances provided the particular exigency has been reported
  to the U.S. Interests Section in Havana, and issuance of the license would support the
  mission of the U.S. Interests Section in Havana.

Exportation of accompanied baggage. The Bureau of Industry and Security of the Department of Commerce has published amendments to the Export Administration Regulations limiting the amount of accompanied baggage a traveler may take to Cuba to 44 pounds. This limitation does not apply to persons traveling pursuant to a license issued under 31 C.F.R. §§ 515.545 (exportation, importation, or transmission of informational materials), 515.562 (official business of the U.S. Government, foreign governments, and certain international organizations), 515.563 (journalistic activities), 515.566 (religious activities), 515.574 (support for the Cuban people), or 515.575 (humanitarian projects).

<u>Carrying remittances to Cuba</u>. Amended § 515.560(c) reduces the total amount of quarterly remittances that can be carried to Cuba by an authorized traveler from \$3,000 to \$300.

<u>Importation of Cuban merchandise</u>. Amended § 515.560(c) eliminates the authorization of travelers to bring back to the United States \$100 worth of merchandise purchased or otherwise acquired in Cuba. With the exception of informational materials, no Cuban merchandise may be imported into the United States unless pursuant to an OFAC specific license.

Fully-hosted travel. The amendments to the Regulations eliminate the concept of fully-hosted travel contained in former § 515.420. The acceptance of lodging or any other service or good in Cuba, even if provided as a gift, is now considered a violation of the Regulations. No Service Provider may provide any regulated service to a person not specifically or generally licensed by OFAC. However, due to the Cuban Government's control of the flow of information within Cuba, individuals currently traveling legally in Cuba may not have access to accurate information about the new amendments to the Regulations. For this reason, any person traveling in Cuba on June 29, 2004, who is fully hosted as set forth in former § 515.420 will not be considered to have violated the Regulations provided they do not stay in Cuba beyond July 31, 2004. Accordingly, authorized service providers may continue to provide the limited services (as set forth in *Circular 2001*) to such travelers until 12:01 a.m. Eastern Daylight Time on August 1, 2004.

Attendance at certain professional meetings or conferences. Amended § 515.564(a)(1) clarifies that the "professional research" general license contained therein cannot be used to attend a professional meeting or conference in Cuba. Meeting or conference attendance in Cuba either must qualify under the "professional meetings and conferences" general license set forth in § 515.564(a)(2) or be authorized pursuant to a specific license.

Educational activities in Cuba. Amended § 515.565(a) eliminates the authorization for secondary school activities in Cuba, limits the students and staff who may travel under a undergraduate or graduate institution's license to only those students enrolled in an undergraduate or graduate degree program at the licensed institution and those staff members who are full-time permanent employees of the licensed institution, and requires the duration of most educational activities in Cuba to be at least 10 weeks. Recognizing that some current holders of educational institution licenses may have already planned summer activities in Cuba that would not meet the new requirements, OFAC is authorizing those licensed institutions to engage in all transactions authorized under former § 515.565(a) provided that the trips and all associated activities are completed by August 15, 2004.

Participation in international sports federation competitions as well as clinics and workshops in Cuba. Amended § 515.567 moves participation in international sports federation competitions from a general to a specific licensing category. The policy of authorizing participation in clinics and workshops in Cuba is eliminated.

Remittances. Amended § 515.570(a) restricts the quarterly \$300-per-household remittances so that now they may be sent only to members of the remitter's immediate family (spouse, child, grandchild, parent, grandparent, or sibling of the remitter or the remitter's spouse, as well as any spouse, widow or widower of any of the foregoing). Such remittances may not be sent to certain government officials and certain members of the Cuban Communist Party as listed in the Regulations. As before, OFAC may specifically license remittances to non-governmental

organizations, including pro-democracy groups, independent civil society groups, and religious organizations, as well as to individual members of such organizations. Amended § 515.570 also eliminates the general license authorizing depository institutions to act as remittance forwarders directly for individuals sending quarterly and emigration-related remittances (requiring that such institutions now obtain a specific license before providing those services). These institutions, however, may continue to transfer funds for their clients who are authorized remittance forwarding service providers.
