### [Technology in Libraries: Providing Access, Linking Communities](#)

This one day symposium, held at the Cerritos Public Library on Friday, March 6, was an overwhelming success, thanks to the efforts of Co-Chairs Cheryl Bartel and Jeff Williams and of all their diligent and hardworking committee members! The Symposium focused on the application of innovative technologies that build a sense of community, connecting users both within the library and the greater organization.

Engaging, interactive presentations explored the role of libraries in connecting communities and investigated issues of accessibility to electronic resources and tools. **Michelle Kraft**, author of the well-known blog, "[The Krafty Librarian](#)," gave the keynote presentation, *The Evolving Library*. Her discussion of differences between two generations of library users, the Net Generation and the Net Learners, led to her exploration of strategies that work best to accommodate the needs of each of these user groups.

Other invited speakers were **Patricia F. Anderson**, Emerging Technologies Librarian for the Health Science Libraries, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor and author of “[Emerging Technologies Librarian](#)” a blog about current web technologies, tools, and trends; and **Tracey Hughes**, GIS Coordinator for the Social Sciences and Humanities Library, UC San Diego. Patricia’s presentation, *Online Healthcare Communities in Social Media and Virtual Worlds*, gave listeners a snapshot of the work she does in this area and of the online health communities (especially the homebound and caregivers) for whom social media is a lifeline to relationships and resources. Tracey’s presentation, *Geographic Information Systems and Their Application in Health & Medicine*, illustrated how GIS is being used in health and medicine, and highlighted the potential of spatial analysis to answer complex questions.

The contributed papers and posters were outstanding and met the symposium goal of increasing attendees’ knowledge of how to incorporate low cost/high impact and easy-to-use technologies into the library experience, focusing on real-world examples and custom-tailored implementation that appeal to librarians and users in various library settings.

Funded by NN/LM PSR to enhance the use of technology at Network Member institutions, the symposium was developed and conducted by the Medical Library Group of Southern California and Arizona (MLGSCA) in cooperation with Hawaii Pacific Chapter, Medical Library Association (HPCMLA) and Northern California and Nevada Medical Library Group (NCNMLG).

## [Update on Emergency Preparedness and Response](#)

Since the beginning of the year, new resources have been developed, training has been conducted, and planning has taken place to enhance emergency preparedness and response in the region. These have resulted in new features for the Emergency Preparedness and Response Toolkit (<http://nnlm.gov/ep/>), a session conducted at the meeting of the Hawaii-Pacific Chapter of the Medical Library Association (HPCMLA), and planning for a summit for hospital librarians in April.

### **New Toolkit Features**

- Online tutorial – Dan Wilson has created an online tutorial for the Toolkit, available from the new page called "[Tutorials](#)." It is a great overview and will keep you up to date on the various features and functionality of the Toolkit site, which is an emergency preparedness resource for libraries.
- Risk Assessment Maps and Charts – This new section is in the column on the right side of the Toolkit. Here you will find links to maps that Dan has used in his presentations about the NN/LM initiative. Check these out!
- [Mutual Aid Agreement](#) (MAA) – this has been added to the page that formerly contained only the MOU agreement. The MAA is a "softer" version of the MOU and may facilitate partnering without raising legal issues, etc. for your library.



## February HPCMLA Presentation

On February 20, Judy Consales and Julie Kwan conducted a session on NN/LM Emergency Preparedness and Response called, “Are You Ready?” It focused on personal preparedness, developing an action plan for the library, and taking advantage of existing resources and networks. Just thinking about the kinds of emergencies that can happen and what you might do can help you to see the “gaps” in your ability to respond and motivate you to take those first steps to prepare!



## Upcoming Hospital Librarians Summit

On Tuesday, April 21 Dan Wilson, Coordinator, and Susan Yowell, Project Assistant, NN/LM National Emergency Preparedness Plan, are convening a day-long meeting for hospital librarians and RML staff from each of the NN/LM regions. They will be joined by representatives from NLM’s Disaster Information Management Research Center (DIMRC) and an invited speaker from the Joint Commission at the Library of the Health Sciences, University of Illinois, Chicago. Ellen Aaronson, a member of the EP&R Advisory Committee of NN/LM PSR and Cinda McClain, the Arizona liaison for our regional initiative, will be attending this meeting with Heidi Sandstrom.

The purpose of the meeting is to provide an overview of this initiative, to discuss issues of importance to hospital librarians, and to brainstorm various strategies to enhance the emergency preparedness of hospital and other primary access libraries in the regions.

We are planning a regional meeting at the end of June in Los Angeles. ## **[Easily Publish RSS News Feeds On Your Web Page with Grazr](#)**

Have you wondered how you can dynamically publish an RSS news feed on your web page? Grazr is a free web service that lets you do this easily without any programming. After you've incorporated the Grazr code into your web page, the news feed will automatically update with any new headlines from that feed. Your web page will be refreshed with new content!

### **Step 1: Visit Grazr and Create an RSS Widget**

The Grazr web page lets you create an "RSS Widget" that you can embed into your web page or blog. To get started, navigate to <http://www.grazr.com/>.



## Step 2: Create a Widget

Click on the “Create Widget” tab at the top of the page.

Fill in the URL of the feed you want to publish under the “Enter a feed or outline URL” box:

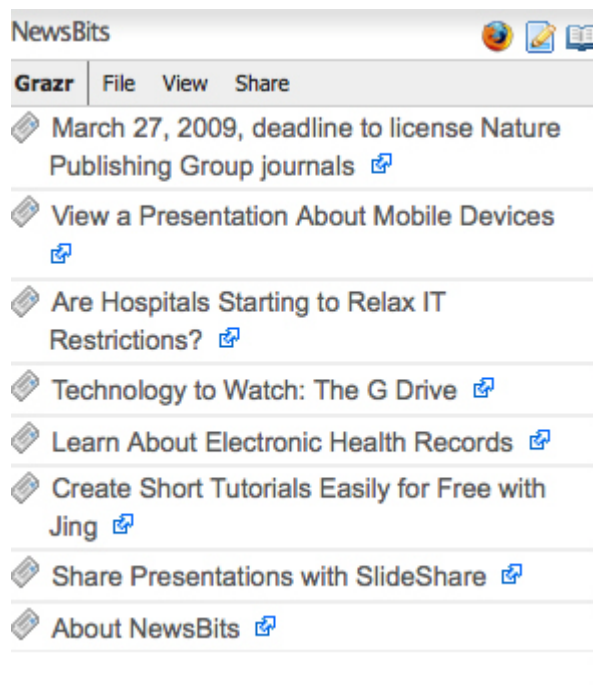
A feed can be in RSS, RDF, or Atom format. Outlines are in OPML format.



Enter the URL of your news feed; in this case, the URL of the PSR Newsbits blog feed


Click the Update button.

## Step 3 (Optional): Customize Your Widget

If you wish, you can customize your widget's look and feel with the "Customize Your Widget" box (to see the expanded options below, click the "More Options" link at the bottom of the box).



## Step 4: Publish Your Widget

Grazr provides automatic publish buttons for some popular services (Google, Facebook, Twitter, etc.) To use those, you will need to establish a free Grazr account.

Most likely, however, you will want to embed the Grazr code in your own web page. To do this, copy the code listed under "Embed code":

Using your favorite web page editor, paste the code into your web page in an appropriate place. View the page in a browser, and you should see the updated RSS feed!
