DECLARATION

BY THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE

INITED STATES OF AMERICA.

IN GENERAL CONGRESS ASSEMBLED.

HEN in the Course of human Events, it becomes nec lary for one People to dissolve the Political Bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the Powers of the Carth, the separate and equal Station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent Respect to the Opinions of Mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them

We hold their Truths to be felf-existent, that all Men are created equal, that they are, endowed by their Creator with certain unalicable Rights, that among thefe and Life, Libers, you due the Purfusio of Happines—The Issue their Rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just Powers from the Confert of the Creator that whenever any Form of Government becomes defiredative of the Rights of the People to after to tabelluli, in and to incline a new Government, Justice, as Posterious on the Purfusion on the Purfusion, and the Purfusion of the Pur

He has conftrained our fellow, Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the Executioners of their Friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.

He has excited domestic Insurrections amongs us, and has endeavoured to bring on the Inhabitants of our Frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages, whose known Rule of Warfare; is an undistinguished Destruction, of all Ages, Sexes and Conditions.

In every stage of these Oppressions we have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble Terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated Injury. A Prince, whose Character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the Ruler of a free People.

Nor have we been wanting in Attentions to our British Brethren. We have varied them from Time to Time of Attempts by their Legislature to extend an unwarrantable Jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the Circumstances of our Emigration and Settlement here. We have appealed to their native Justice and Magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the Ties of our common Kindred to disavow these Usurpations, which, would inevitably interrupt our Connections and Correspondence. They too have been deaf to the Voice of Justice and of Consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the Necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of Mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace, Friends.
