DELAWARE ENTITIES MAY COMPETE FOR ADDITIONAL FEDERAL DISCRETIONARY FUNDS AVAILABLE UNDER THE RECOVERY ACT

NOTE: Listed below are examples of direct federal grants programs. Much of the money in the Recovery Act is awarded by formula to the states, which then distribute these funds competitively. Examples include water infrastructure, highway, and energy programs. Please visit http://www.recovery.delaware.gov/, where more information about state programs will be posted as it becomes available.

Here are 11 *federal* competitive grant programs available to Delawareans. For others, please visit http://www.recovery.gov.

- 1) Community Oriented Policing Services: The COPS Hiring Recovery Program has \$1 billion in competitive grants. This will allow the hiring of more police and other local law enforcement personnel to improve the security of our cities, towns, and counties. For this program, the application deadline is April 14. http://www.cops.usdoj.gov/Default.asp?Item=2108
- 2) Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program: So-called Byrne-JAG money allows state and local law enforcement agencies to improve their technology, equipment, and capability. There is \$225 million in Byrne-JAG money is available in competitive grants, in addition to the \$2 billion that will be awarded by formula. Application information will be available soon at: http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/BJA/recoveryact.html
- **3)** Job training: There is \$750 million for competitive grants for worker training and placement programs in high growth and emerging industry sectors, of which \$500 million is for jobs in the renewable energy and energy efficiency sectors. Formal application guidance will be available soon at: http://wdr.doleta.gov/directives/corr_doc.cfm?docn=2717
- 4) Education: There is \$5 billion in education funds set aside for states pursuing higher standards, quality assessments, robust data systems and teacher quality initiatives. Of this, \$650 million is for an innovation fund to scale up successful school programs. These grants will be made in fall 2009 and spring 2010. http://www.ed.gov/policy/gen/leg/recovery/index.html
- 5) Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grants: There is \$400 million in competitive funding for cities with populations under 35,000 for energy efficiency and green energy projects. Larger cities and counties receive a separate \$2.8 billion in formula funding. Application details will be available soon, but steps to prepare for submitting an application are available at: http://apps1.eere.energy.gov/wip/block_grants.cfm
- 6) **Firefighter grants:** There is \$210 million for Firefighter Assistance Grants, which help fire departments modernize and improve capacity. Details are not yet available, but we expect awards will be made this summer. http://firegrantsupport.com/
- 7) Public housing: There is \$995 million for a Public Housing Capital Fund that will help public housing authorities with capital projects. Particularly, this competitively awarded funding will prioritize projects that leverage private-sector financing or improve the energy efficiency of public housing stock. There is a separate \$3 billion in formula funding. Applications details are still forthcoming, but awards will be made before October. http://www.hud.gov/recovery/phcapfundh.cfm
- 8) National Institutes of Health: There is \$200 million for a program called NIH Challenge Grants in Health and Science Research, which will award money for research on specific high-priority health and science topics. <u>Applications will be accepted from March 27 to April 27.</u> http://grants.nih.gov/grants/funding/challenge_award/
- 9) Rail modernization: There is \$8 billion for capital grants for high-speed rail corridors, intercity passenger rail service, and congestion relief rail projects. A plan for awarding this money will be made available by April 18. http://www.fra.dot.gov/us/content/2166
- **10)** Neighborhood Stabilization Program: There is \$1.98 billion in the Neighborhood Stabilization program for competitive grants. The NSP aims to reduce the effects of foreclosure by helping state and local governments purchase or finance the purchase of and rehabilitation of foreclosed homes. - 11) Broadband Technology Opportunities Program: There is \$4.7 billion in funding to expand broadband services to unserved and underserved areas and to improve broadband access for public safety agencies. Grants under these programs will only be awarded to meritorious projects by the designated federal agency. Entities in Delaware that are interested in applying for competitive grants should be moving forward to make their applications as quickly and thoroughly as possible under differing and often complex criteria. The offices of Senator Kaufman, Senator Carper, Governor Markell, and Lieutenant Governor Denn are working together to provide information and assistance to Delaware applicants.
