This memorandum establishes the procedures for processing “third party” requests to NASA Centers and Headquarters for all records related to the Columbia/STS-107 accident and related investigations (referred to below as “Columbia-related records”). *This memorandum does not establish new procedures, but instead addresses the application of NASA’s existing Freedom of Information Act procedures (14 C.F.R. Section 1206) to the unique situation at hand.* The goals of this process include assurance of timely responses to requests, thorough documentation of all records requested by and released to third parties, and publication of those records through a NASA internet web site described below.

This policy applies to all “third parties,” which is any person or organization other than: 1) NASA employees, 2) NASA contractors involved in the Columbia accident investigation or involved in the Shuttle program, 3) other Federal agencies, and 4) the Columbia Accident Investigation Board (CAIB) chaired by Adm. Gehman, and its supporting contractors. The following procedural guidelines will be followed in handling third-party requests:

- **Processing requests:**

- Any request from third-parties for Columbia-related records will be processed under NASA’s Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) procedures, 14 C.F.R. Part 1206, including log-in/log out of all requests.
- Any oral request by a third party for Columbia-related records must be reduced to writing and submitted to the appropriate PAO/FOIA office.
- All draft responses (initial determinations) will be reviewed expeditiously by Chief Counsel (Code GG for Headquarters) and appropriate technical personnel.
- All requests will be processed promptly: the requests and records determined responsive to the requests will be promptly located and reviewed, and timely decisions will be made concerning releasability.

- **Daily lists of requests:**

- Center and HQ FOIA offices will compile a daily list of Columbia-related requests and forward their lists daily to a designated attorneys (listed below) in the Center Chief Counsel's/General Counsel (Code GG) office.

 - Centers' and HQ FOIA Officers will provide NASA Headquarters PAO with all initial determinations and released records [in digital format] on the date they are issued to the requesting party.
 - These records will be published promptly on a publicly available web site to be established by HQ PAO.

Structural, Systems Integrity Focus Of Shuttle Probe

Investigators probing the loss of space shuttle Columbia on Feb. 1 at about 9 a.m. EST during reentry will probably focus on structural- and systems-integrity.

Data sent via telemetry from the orbiter are being scrutinized for clues that could explain the vehicle's high-altitude break-up.

"We'll be poring over that data 24 hours a day for the foreseeable future," said Ron Dittmore, NASA's space shuttle program manager.

Although details are still slowly emerging from NASA, it appears that both voice and telemetry signals were lost shortly after Columbia emerged from the "blackout" portion of the reentry. Milt Heflin, NASA's Chief Flight Director, said "all vehicle data" were lost when Columbia was at 207,135 ft. altitude and Mach 18.3.

At a mid-afternoon press briefing, Heflin outlined a sequence of sensor readings and the loss of those readings:

- 8:53 a.m. EST - Lost left wing inboard and outboard hydraulic temperature sensors.
- 8:56 a.m. EST - Left main tire and brake line temperatures increasing.
- 8:58 a.m. EST - "Bondline" temperatures from sensors in the vehicle structure were lost. Three of these were on the left wing's inboard and outboard elevons.
- 8:59 a.m. EST - Left main gear tire temperatures and pressures were lost; these involved eight separate sensor measurements. At about this time, a tire pressure alert was displayed to the shuttle crew, and was apparently acknowledged verbally. This was believed to be the crew's last transmission.

U.S. officials identified several primary areas for investigators' initial focus:

- The trajectory flown by the shuttle as it entered the upper atmosphere. A too-steep approach could cause excessive heating of the vehicle's structure, which could lead to its failure.
- Integrity of the orbiter's structure throughout the reentry.
- The flight controls, including both the reaction control system (RCS) small thrusters that let astronauts fly the orbiter in space -- and aerodynamic surfaces, such as elevons on the aft edge of the wing, which control the vehicle within the atmosphere.
- Possible damage to the thermal protection system (TPS), the white and black tiles that protect the vehicle from excessive heat. During Columbia's liftoff, a piece of insulation from the external fuel tank fell off and hit the orbiter, apparently on the leading edge of the left wing. Whether this impact significantly damaged protective tiles or not, and had any effect on the shuttle orbiter's ultimate breakup during reentry, is being studied.

"We spent a goodly amount of time reviewing" film of the insulation falling off, "and then analyzing" it to see "would there be any consequences," Dittmore told reporters. "It was judged that that event did not represent a safety concern. As we look at that now in hindsight, and certainly we have, all the indications were on the left wing. We can't discount that there might be a connection, but we can't rush to judgment on it."

Information from several Defense Dept. space-monitoring facilities will also be key to the investigation. Infrared sensors on U.S. Defense Support Program (DSP) satellites are believed

to have captured data that could help NASA determine what was happening to Columbia during reentry. Officials at the North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) said they are supporting NASA, but declined to comment on specifics.

NORAD provides missile warning and space-object tracking primarily for defense purposes, but its Space Control Center in Cheyenne Mountain, Colo., also monitors shuttle launches and on-orbit operations. Using a number of space surveillance systems, NORAD, Air Force Space Command and U.S. Strategic Command provide debris-avoidance information to NASA when the shuttle is in space.

Tonight's telecon with Paul was primarily geared toward giving us an update on what was going on and seeking expertise on a variety of issues. Obviously the folks at KSC and JSC - and to a lesser extent, Stennis, will be the busiest. Of course HQ will also be swamped. The real bulk of the legal work will come down the road.

Bill Sikora will serve as legal advisor to one of the investigation teams. The rest of us are sort of on stand-by to help.

The first thing we will most likely face is a large influx of FOIA requests. All FOIA requests are supposed to get legal review before they go out.

We will expect to get lots of claims. I don't know how many LaRC will receive, if any.

There are already 100s of folks alleging injury from the debris. Some are from burns. I guess it is not obvious to people that something that fell out of the sky at that speed would be VERY hot.

We will have legal update phone calls every day at 5:00 PM for the time being. All Chief Counsels and the AGCs will participate.

Pete and my trip has been called off. So I will be at the office on Monday and for the next few days if things pick up at the office. Everyone else is scheduled to be in town, I think.

Structural, Systems Integrity Focus Of Shuttle Probe
By William Scott



Investigators probing the loss of space shuttle Columbia on Feb. 1 at about 9 a.m. EST during reentry will probably focus on structural- and systems-integrity.

Data sent via telemetry from the orbiter are being scrutinized for clues that could explain the vehicle's high-altitude break-up.

"We'll be poring over that data 24 hours a day for the foreseeable future," said Ron Dittemor NASA's space shuttle program manager.

Although details are still slowly emerging from NASA, it appears that both voice and telemetry signals were lost shortly after Columbia emerged from the "blackout" portion of the reentry. M. Heflin, NASA's Chief Flight Director, said "all vehicle data" were lost when Columbia was at 207,135 ft. altitude and Mach 18.3.

At a mid-afternoon press briefing, Heflin outlined a sequence of sensor readings and the loss of those readings:

- 8:53 a.m. EST - Lost left wing inboard and outboard hydraulic temperature sensors.
- 8:56 a.m. EST - Left main tire and brake line temperatures increasing.
- 8:58 a.m. EST - "Bondline" temperatures from sensors in the vehicle structure were lost. Three of these were on the left wing's inboard and outboard elevons.
- 8:59 a.m. EST - Left main gear tire temperatures and pressures were lost; these involved eight separate sensor measurements. At about this time, a tire pressure alert was displayed to the shuttle crew, and was apparently acknowledged verbally. This was believed to be the crew's last transmission.

U.S. officials identified several primary areas for investigators' initial focus:

- The trajectory flown by the shuttle as it entered the upper atmosphere. A too-steep approach could cause excessive heating of the vehicle's structure, which could lead to its failure.
- Integrity of the orbiter's structure throughout the reentry.
- The flight controls, including both the reaction control system (RCS) small thrusters that let astronauts fly the orbiter in space -- and aerodynamic surfaces, such as elevons on the aft edge of the wing, which control the vehicle within the atmosphere.
- Possible damage to the thermal protection system (TPS), the white and black tiles that protect the vehicle from excessive heat. During Columbia's liftoff, a piece of insulation from the external fuel tank fell off and hit the orbiter, apparently on the leading edge of the left wing. Whether this impact significantly damaged protective tiles or not, and had any effect on the shuttle orbiter's ultimate breakup during reentry, is being studied.

"We spent a goodly amount of time reviewing" film of the insulation falling off, "and then analyzing" it to see "would there be any consequences," Dittmore told reporters. "It was judged that that event did not represent a safety concern. As we look at that now in hindsight and certainly we have, all the indications were on the left wing. We can't discount that there might be a connection, but we can't rush to judgment on it."

Information from several Defense Dept. space-monitoring facilities will also be key to the investigation. Infrared sensors on U.S. Defense Support Program (DSP) satellites are believed to have captured data that could help NASA determine what was happening to Columbia during reentry. Officials at the North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) said they are supporting NASA, but declined to comment on specifics.

NORAD provides missile warning and space-object tracking primarily for defense purposes,

Def } but its Space Control Center in Cheyenne Mountain, Colo., also monitors shuttle launches and on-orbit operations. Using a number of space surveillance systems, NORAD, Air Force Space Command and U.S. Strategic Command provide debris-avoidance information to NASA when the shuttle is in space.

I have discovered what I like least about being the Rabbi here - lowering the flags. Twice now in the brief year and a half that I have been at Temple [REDACTED] I have walked over to the flag poles and lowered the flags. This year, having put up the Israeli flag in August, I was in tears while lowering that beautiful blue and white symbol of Israel and of the Jewish people.

Sunday and Monday this week were Rosh Hodesh (the new month) Adar. The Rabbis teach that as Adar enters, joy increases. This year Adar's entry was heralded by tragedy. As I watch memorial services and hear of the depressed mood in Israel, my joy has been greatly diminished these last few days.

All the astronauts on the Columbia were heroes tragically lost. Their bravery in ascending into the heaven offers a beacon of hope to a troubled world. Terror and war are brushed aside by the majesty of watching human beings leave behind this world. To watch that hopeful venture literally slam into the Earth is shattering.

For Jews and for Israel, this tragedy is as personal as it gets. Gen. Ilan Ramon (posthumously promoted from Colonel on Sunday, Feb 1) was the first Israeli astronaut. Aware of the symbolic value of his trip, Gen. Ramon took with him Jewish practice and Jewish history.

Gen. Ramon, a secular Jew, was so moved by the symbolic value of his ascent into the heavens that he decided to be an example of Jewish practice while in space. He insisted upon receiving Kosher rations and he was observant of Shabbat (the sabbath) while in space. To be a Jewish symbol meant to carry with him our sacred traditions. By his example he taught that Jewish practice is as relevant in the Space Age as it ever was. He taught that to go into space requires us to reach out towards heaven.

Israel is a beacon of hope for the Jewish people and Gen. Ramon found a way to symbolize Israel as the great hope of the Jewish people. ██████████ as a 14 year old boy in Thereisenstadt drew a beautiful painting that shows the Earth as if seen from the moon. In that hopeless place of death, this teenage boy found hope in imagination. Gen. Ramon honored those who perished in the Holocaust - and more importantly the hope that a young man could find even in the Hell that was Thereisenstadt - by bringing this picture with him into space. What a victory for the Jewish people to see a picture painted in the depths of despair made real as Ramon saw in fact the imagined vision of ██████████.

Israel was riveted by Columbia's flight. Israeli school children sent scientific experiments along with Gen. Ramon. Even kindergarteners were following the Columbia's mission, as Israeli writer Lisa Katz said:

Sixteen days ago, ██████████ [her 6 year old son] came home with the number 5:40 written on his hand. When I asked him what it was, he said his kindergarten teacher had written it on all the children's hands to remind them of the time when Ilan would be taking-off in the Space Shuttle that day. He explained to me how he was supposed to count (in English with his Israeli accent) "10, 9, 8, ...lift-off" so Ilan would know that all the Israeli children were with him in spirit as he left the earth...Just yesterday, on our way to kindergarten, ██████████ told me that if he worked really hard in school, then he could become an astronaut like Ilan.

In a country filled everyday with tragic news, Gen. Ramon's historic mission was a beacon of hope. That light too has been tragically extinguished.

Yet always there is hope. Gen. Ramon remains a hero even in death because he chose to give his life meaning. He died in the service of Israel, a country he had served with great honor and distinction since the Yom Kippur war. He died as an example of holiness by carrying Judaism with him into space. Most importantly, he died as a symbol of hope, carrying a painting from the depths of the Holocaust into the beauty of space.

May the memory of this righteous man, General Ilan Ramon, be for a blessing and an inspiration. May God provide comfort to those in mourning for all the astronauts. And may we again be blessed to see hope so magnificently triumph over despair as it has these last 16 days. Amen.

Randy & Sherri,

I discussed this with Code G and we are in agreement that such a donation is within the spirit of the Exchange NPD, 9050.6G.

Paragraph 1.c.(3) states that Exchanges may, by contract, or otherwise, promote activities contributing to the efficiency, welfare, and morale of NASA employees; and paragraph 1.c.(6) authorizes Exchanges to conduct other activities authorized by the Center Director with prior concurrence of the Center Chief Counsel and Center External Affairs Officer, when activities involve the public and are clearly in NASA's and its employees' interests.

Donating to an organization that is expending effort and funds to assist in the Columbia disaster recovery is something that one could conclude contributes to the morale of NASA employees and is, therefore, clearly related to NASA and the interests of its employees. Making the donation might, at least to some degree, serve to represent the overall desire of employees to help and perhaps bring some relief from the feeling of loss that NASA employees are currently experiencing as a result of the Columbia disaster.

The usual restrictions associated with fund raising through the CFC do not apply to non-appropriated fund activities but relate to soliciting Federal employees for contributions to charitable organizations. Thus, any effort to solicit directly from employees would create potential problems that the current request does not raise. Randy, the points you mention in your previous e-mail about receiving similar requests are valid and must also be weighed in making such a decision. Another issue to ponder is whether the Exchange is in a financially viable position to make such a donation. Certainly the Exchange is not in a financial position to respond if we receive a host of these requests, but I do not anticipate that situation. While the donations from other NASA exchanges will make this request more difficult to decline, the above considerations should be weighed before deciding to donate.

I would suggest following the requirements of paragraph 1.c.(6) to authorize a donation in

response to this request. In that case, this e-mail will serve as the concurrence of the LaRC Chief Counsel. I have also copied Mike Finneran, as External Affairs Officer, to determine if he concurs. If so, I believe that Lana has authority to make the decision authorizing the donation since the Center Director has, by LAPD 9050.9, paragraph 5.a., delegated to the Associate Director for Business Management the responsibility for monitoring and implementing exchange policy.

Dear Cheri,

This wasn't an easy question to find information on. I had a hunch about the reasons for the black and white tiles, and I found a NASA website that verified my hunch. However, I don't know any ceramics engineers that may better explain the tiles, so I will try to do my best.

Most people know that black colors will absorb more radiative heat than white will. Everyone knows you wear white clothing on a hot, sunny day to keep cooler. This is because black will absorb more of the light and heat from the sun than white will (White will reflect more of the light and heat). What most people don't know is that the exact opposite is also true, that black will emit more heat than white will! Let me give an example:

Take two baseballs, one is its normal white and another is dyed all black.

If they are both heated to the same temperature and you held your hand close to one and then the other, the black one would feel warmer. A temperature gauge would verify the same thing. Although they are the same temperature, there is more radiative heat from the black baseball. (Now this is only true for holding your hand close, not touching. That is a whole different ball game! If hot enough, both can burn you with equal efficiency). This is because the black color of the baseball is able to emit more heat than the white, just like it can absorb more heat than the white.

So, what do hot black and white baseballs have to do with shuttle tiles?

Out in space there is no protective atmosphere to protect you from the sun, and while it is very cold in space, if you are hit by all of the rays from the sun, they can warm you up in a hurry! Therefore, tiles that aren't critical for re-entry are white to help reflect the radiative energy from the sun, making the temperature control for the inside of the shuttle a little easier. So that explains the white tiles, they are there to help keep the shuttle cool. (That must sound strange since it is -200°C and colder in space!) But it is true. Think how the sun can warm you up on a cold winter day!

So then what about the black tiles! Well, their purpose is much different than the others, and very important. They prevent the shuttle from burning up during re-entry into the atmosphere. One of the ways they are able to do this is by dissipating heat rapidly. By getting rid of the heat as it builds up, you collect less of a total heat build up. These tiles get rid of heat so fast, that you can pick up a tile with your bare hand seconds after it being removed from the oven, even with the center still glowing red hot! Part of this heat dissipation comes from the radiative emittance from the black colored tile.

So there you have it, part of the reason for the different color tiles. (There may be more that I don't know about!). All of this information was gleaned from the following NASA website. The content is a little jargon laden so I hope that my explanation helps. However, there is a ton of information here about the Thermal Protection System for the shuttle:

Kathy - Here are some top level general thoughts regarding information issues for the board. Apparently when Bill requested input, he stressed that he only wanted short and concise bullet type comments that could be compiled and considered by the legal advisor to the board. Here are some fairly top level suggestions geared to simply identify some of the key issues:

1) Much of the information that the board will be considering is information from NASA or other government agencies that might be subject to FOIA requests even if the board itself might not be subject to FOIA. The board should consider this situation before releasing documents received from other agencies.

2) If the board opts to make a discretionary disclosure of information outside the government, that could constitute a waiver of an agency's ability to withhold release of the information under a FOIA exemption. The board should understand that once information is released, its future release cannot be withheld based on an applicable FOIA exemption under a "waiver" concept. That is, release to one individual or entity is release to all. Discretionary release of documents or detailed technical information to an individual or entity at an early stage in the investigation could also impede the board's ability to control the progress, timing and focus of the investigation.

3) Sometimes other statutes and laws preclude discretionary disclosure of information. Examples include the Privacy Act and the Trade Secrets Act that would preclude release of some information about astronauts and information received from private contractors. FOIA Exemption 6 (The "Personal Privacy Interests" Exemption) was the subject of 1990 litigation regarding the Challenger crew. Exemption 6 was used to withhold release of "the last words of the space shuttle Challenger crew, which revealed the sound and inflection of the crew's voices during the last seconds of their lives..." New York Times Co. v. NASA, 920 F2d 1002, 1005 (D.C. Cir 1990).

4) As government employees, including the members of the board, it is a crime, under 18 USC 1905 (The Trade Secrets Act), to disclose "proprietary information" received from

a contractor except as permitted by law (e.g., pursuant to the FOIA process, judicial discovery process or the like).

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6) In general, the board will not run afoul of any of the above limitations by publicly referencing to the existence of documents...but the board should carefully consider implications based on the above before discussing the technical information or data within documents that may be subject to limitations on release.

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

As I understand your request to my folks, you have asked for a list of top level thoughts for Bill Sikora as his group advises the Admiral and his team regarding FOIA as well as general release of documents and information. Tom McMurry, Karen Reilley, and Jon Arena all put their heads together and came up with the following:

First - the team is comprised of Federal employees - so they are acquiring this information within the scope of their employment. That fact is relevant to most of the following thoughts:

- 1) Much of the information that the board will be considering is information from NASA or other government agencies that might be subject to FOIA requests even if the board itself might not be subject to FOIA. The board should consider this situation before releasing documents received from other agencies.
- 2) If the board opts to make a discretionary disclosure of information outside the government, that could constitute a waiver of an agency's ability to withhold release of the information under a FOIA exemption. The board should understand that once information is released, its future release cannot be withheld based on an applicable FOIA exemption under a "waiver" concept. That is, release to one individual or entity is release to all. Discretionary release of documents or detailed technical information to an individual or entity at an early stage in the investigation could also impede the board's ability to control the progress, timing and focus of the investigation.
- 3) Sometimes other statutes and laws preclude discretionary disclosure of information. Examples include the Privacy Act and the Trade Secrets Act that would preclude release of some information about astronauts and information received from private contractors. FOIA Exemption 6 (The "Personal Privacy Interests" Exemption) was the subject of 1990 litigation regarding the Challenger crew. Exemption 6 was used to withhold release of "the last words of the space shuttle Challenger crew, which revealed the sound and inflection of the crew's voices during the last seconds of their lives..." New York Times Co. v. NASA, 920 F2d 1002, 1005 (D.C. Cir 1990).
- 4) As government employees, including the members of the board, it is a crime, under 18 USC 1905 (The Trade Secrets Act), to disclose "proprietary information" received from a contractor except as permitted by law (e.g., pursuant to the FOIA process, judicial discovery process or the like).
- 5) Obviously, it would be inappropriate to release any "classified" information. However, there may also be cause not to release certain unclassified information that

could be subject to export controls. Information related to articles listed as Defense Articles within the International Traffic in Arms Regulations (ITAR) generally cannot be released to a non-US citizen, even within the United States, without a license from Dept of State (or a determination that no license is required under an existing exemption). Defense Article Category XV - Space Systems and Associated Equipment restricts disclosure of technical data applicable to "Spacecraft (including communications satellites, remote sensing satellites, scientific satellites, research satellites, navigation satellites, experimental and multi-mission satellites), Ground Control Stations for telemetry, tracking and control of spacecraft...and certain GPS Receiving Equipment." An export control advisor should review technical data related to such equipment to determine its releasability.

6) In general, the board will not run afoul of any of the above limitations by publicly referencing to the existence of documents...but the board should carefully consider implications based on the above before discussing the technical information or data within documents that may be subject to limitations on release.

7) Some of the information provided to the board could relate to new technology and inventions by NASA or its contractors. Both NASA and its contractors could face difficulty in pursuing patents on such new technology if technical information describing it is prematurely disclosed to the public. This is one of the areas where the board should carefully avoid making discretionary releases that could bring harm to a private company or to NASA.

8) Some of the information provided to the board could relate to technology or inventions that NASA uses subject to license agreements from contractors. Under such license agreements, NASA has the ability to use the inventions or technology only for government purposes. Such license agreements would not permit release of underlying technical data for non-government purposes.

Finally - You asked us to consider whether we/NASA could be liable for the board's release of information under certain circumstances.

We have not fully researched the question in the limited time we have had to get back to you. But in the meantime we felt that we could feel that we could minimize the potential for liability if the Centers alert the board to the existence of contractor proprietary information within information that we provide to the board - along with an explanation that under FOIA we are required to notify the contractors and consider their responses prior to release of such information. We will continue to research this issue if you so desire.

Working SBIR protest issues with Dryden and Headquarters personnel. This protest over an SBIR Phase I award was submitted by a former Dryden engineer who has a reputation as a confrontational figure. The protest challenges the NASA evaluation procedure for proposals received and alleges selection decisions are arbitrary and do not evaluate proposals on their overall merit. **(WILLIAMS)**

Contacted Submitter to let them know there had been a FOIA request for their contract. Submitter responded with a letter indicating that they believe the CLINs should be redacted. Although we disagree with their position, sent a formal Submitter's letter outlining the Agency's position on release of CLINs and requesting a formal objection and/or response. **(LORD)**

Met with members of our IFMP data conversion team to review non-disclosure agreements that contractors will sign in order to access DFRC financial data. As agreed, only non-privacy act material may be removed from DFRC, but all contractors will sign non-disclosure agreements, regardless of whether the data they are working with contains privacy act information. **(LORD)**

Researched a cure notice/show cause notice issue. A contractor previously fell behind on their construction schedule, and we sent them a cure notice in February 2002. We did not take further action at that time. The Contracting Officer now wants to establish a new deadline (February 9, 2003) and send a Show Cause notice. The issue is whether we have waived our right to do so by failing to act in a timely manner after sending the original cure notice. **(LORD)**

In a related issue, the Contracting Officer also wanted to know whether we may enforce the liquidated damages clause even if we waived our right to terminate the contract. Research indicates that it is in our best interests to enforce the liquidated damages clause based on delays associated with the new deadline. **(LORD)**

Advised Center management with respect to a pending sensitive situation involving a contractor employee. **(WILLIAMS)**

Preliminary contact from the Air Force and Boeing concerning what support Dryden can offer to the Airborne Laser (ABL) program currently in initial test stages here at Edwards Air Force Base. The program uses a 747 as the carrier vehicle and some of our equipment and/or expertise (present because of the 747 shuttle carrier aircraft at Dryden) may be utilized on a noninterference, reimbursement basis to assist. Discussion of what is appropriate agreement vehicle, as well as necessary parties and other considerations, is ongoing **(WILLIAMS)**.

Reviewed amendment and associated statement of work for the Unmanned Air Combat Vehicle project. This agreement allows for the ongoing Dryden work in supporting this program having a high national and DOD interest. **(WILLIAMS)**

Kathy - This morning I contacted the HCAT and the Johnson EOC to inquire as to the procedures for forwarding information to both of those organizations. The HCAT individual advised that information should be sent to the EOC - don't even bother sending any info copy to the HCAT because they will simply forward it to the EOC. The EOC advised that information could be faxed to them at [REDACTED] or, if it is in electronic form, it could be emailed to them at [REDACTED]. They advised that the address is not just for images and that any sort of electronic information sent to that site will be quickly reviewed and dealt with in an appropriate manner. Based on this information, it seems that the agency has essentially made the EOC the portal through which all relevant information to the investigation is to be funneled. If there is information that seems to be relevant for investigators' consideration and that relates to internal agency operations, we might want to consider alerting Johnson's OCC as to its existence and the fact that we are advising that it be treated just like all other relevant information related to the disaster - and forwarded to the EOC. I say this only because the individuals with the information might not feel comfortable faxing it and wondering to whom it might be released - inadvertent or otherwise. Perhaps we could also make ourselves available to answer questions regarding the best procedures to be used in forwarding any information that our folks feel should be considered by the investigators. That way we would hopefully be apprised when any information that is of concern to someone makes it into the right hands and we could alert the folks at the EOC to be on the lookout for it..

This memorandum establishes the procedures for processing “third party” requests to NASA Centers and Headquarters for all records related to the Columbia/STS-107 accident and related investigations (referred to below as “Columbia-related records”). *This memorandum does not establish new procedures, but instead addresses the application of NASA’s existing Freedom of Information Act procedures (14 C.F.R. Section 1206) to the unique situation at hand.* The goals of this process include assurance of timely responses to requests, thorough documentation of all records requested by and released to third parties, and publication of those records through a NASA internet web site described below.

This policy applies to all “third parties,” which is any person or organization other than: 1) NASA employees, 2) NASA contractors involved in the Columbia accident investigation or involved in the Shuttle program, 3) other Federal agencies, and 4) the Columbia Accident Investigation Board (CAIB) chaired by Adm. Gehman, and its supporting contractors. The following procedural guidelines will be followed in handling third-party requests:

- **Processing requests:**
 - Any request from third-parties for Columbia-related records will be processed under NASA’s Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) procedures, 14 C.F.R. Part 1206, including log-in/log out of all requests.
 - Any oral request by a third party for Columbia-related records must be reduced to writing and submitted to the appropriate PAO/FOIA office.
 - All draft responses (initial determinations) will be reviewed expeditiously by Chief Counsel (Code GG for Headquarters) and appropriate technical personnel.
 - All requests will be processed promptly: the requests and records determined responsive to the requests will be promptly located and reviewed, and timely decisions will be made concerning releasability.
 - [Dave Kings’ group in Lufin – need to discuss procedures]

- **Daily lists of requests:**

- Center and HQ FOIA offices will compile a daily list of Columbia-related requests and forward their lists daily to a designated attorneys (listed below) in the Center Chief Counsel's/General Counsel (Code GG) office.

- **Publicly available web site for released records:**

- Centers' and HQ FOIA Officers will provide NASA Headquarters PAO with all initial determinations and released records [in digital format] on the date they are issued to the requesting party.
- These records will be published promptly on a publicly available web site to be established by HQ PAO.

Randy & Sherri,

I discussed this with Code G and we are in agreement that such a donation is within the spirit of the Exchange NPD, 9050.6G.

Paragraph 1.c.(3) states that Exchanges may, by contract, or otherwise, promote activities contributing to the efficiency, welfare, and morale of NASA employees; and paragraph 1.c.(6) authorizes Exchanges to conduct other activities authorized by the Center Director with prior concurrence of the Center Chief Counsel and Center External Affairs Officer, when activities involve the public and are clearly in NASA's and its employees' interests.

Donating to an organization that is expending effort and funds to assist in the Columbia disaster recovery is something that one could conclude contributes to the morale of NASA employees and is, therefore, clearly related to NASA and the interests of its employees. Making the donation might, at least to some degree, serve to represent the overall desire of employees to help and perhaps bring some relief from the feeling of loss that NASA employees are currently experiencing as a result of the Columbia disaster.

The usual restrictions associated with fund raising through the CFC do not apply to non-appropriated fund activities but relate to soliciting Federal employees for contributions to charitable organizations. Thus, any effort to solicit directly from employees would create potential problems that the current request does not raise. Randy, the points you mention in your previous e-mail about receiving similar requests are valid and must also be weighed in making such a decision. Another issue to ponder is whether the Exchange is in a financially viable position to make such a donation. Certainly the Exchange is not in a financial position to respond if we receive a host of these requests, but I do not anticipate that situation. While the

donations from other NASA exchanges will make this request more difficult to decline, the above considerations should be weighed before deciding to donate.

I would suggest following the requirements of paragraph 1.c.(6) to authorize a donation in response to this request. In that case, this e-mail will serve as the concurrence of the LaRC Chief Counsel. I have also copied Mike Finneran, as External Affairs Officer, to determine if he concurs. If so, I believe that Lana has authority to make the decision authorizing the donation since the Center Director has, by LAPD 9050.9, paragraph 5.a., delegated to the Associate Director for Business Management the responsibility for monitoring and implementing exchange policy.

I join **all of** Langley in mourning the tragic losses related to the Columbia disaster. I also share the intense desire to do everything possible to assist investigators as they strive to determine the cause of the tragedy and prevent it from happening again. In response to the inquiries I have received regarding offers of technical assistance and pertinent information, you should be apprised of the following procedures.

NASA is directing all information pertinent to the investigation to the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at Barksdale Air Force Base. If you have information you feel is pertinent to the investigation, I encourage you to immediately forward it to the EOC. Information forwarded to the EOC is being safeguarded, processed, and forwarded to the appropriate officials.

Pertinent information, including documents, statements or other data may be faxed to the EOC at (281) 483-0002 or (281) 483-4215. You can also contact the EOC directly by calling (281) 483-9778. Any form of electronic documentation or data may also be emailed to the EOC at columbiainages@nasa.gov. There is no requirement to copy Center management. However, please feel free to do so if you wish.

You may also receive requests for information, documents or data from investigators as they begin the task of sorting through and evaluating the information they encounter. I share the commitment to fully comply with our moral, professional and legal obligations to provide full, open and completely truthful information to the investigators.

Another source of inquiry may be third party non-governmental organizations that have nothing to do with the official investigation(s). Such requests should be processed through existing Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) procedures. Accordingly, refer requests from third-party non-governmental organizations to LaRC's FOIA officer, Cheryl Cleghorn at FOIA@larc.nasa.gov. Cheryl is also available at 864-2497. All FOIA requests for Columbia related documents or data will receive legal review and be processed in accordance with FOIA laws and regulations.

In addition, as early as Saturday afternoon I offered LaRC expertise in matters that may be relevant to the investigation to NASA Headquarters and those supporting the investigation. Already, we are being involved with tests in the 20-Inch Mach 6 Tunnel, starting today, doing thermal mapping of the Orbiter, and I was asked by Fred Gregory this morning for our structures expertise to be used to help reassemble and analyze the recovered parts of Columbia.

We can all take solace in the fact that LaRC stands committed to assist with the Columbia investigation in a manner that is forthright and dedicated to establishing all relevant facts and circumstances. If you perceive any inclination to the contrary, advise me immediately. Rest assured, this Center is dedicated to an investigation that is beyond reproach.

Finally, I **personally** understand the immense sense of loss that we as part of the NASA family are feeling. Please take advantage of our Employee Assistance Program (EAP)—it is there for you, especially under such trying conditions. Structural, Systems Integrity Focus Of Shuttle Probe
 By William Scott



Investigators probing the loss of space shuttle Columbia on Feb. 1 at about 9 a.m. EST during reentry will probably focus on structural- and systems-integrity.

Data sent via telemetry from the orbiter are being scrutinized for clues that could explain the vehicle's high-altitude break-up.

"We'll be poring over that data 24 hours a day for the foreseeable future," said Ron Dittmore, NASA's space shuttle program manager.

Although details are still slowly emerging from NASA, it appears that both voice and telemetry signals were lost shortly after Columbia emerged from the "blackout" portion of the reentry. Milt Heflin, NASA's Chief Flight Director, said "all vehicle data" were lost when Columbia was at 207,135 ft. altitude and Mach 18.3.

At a mid-afternoon press briefing, Heflin outlined a sequence of sensor readings and the loss of those readings:

- 8:53 a.m. EST - Lost left wing inboard and outboard hydraulic temperature sensors.
- 8:56 a.m. EST - Left main tire and brake line temperatures increasing.

- 8:58 a.m. EST - "Bondline" temperatures from sensors in the vehicle structure were lost. Three of these were on the left wing's inboard and outboard elevons.

- 8:59 a.m. EST - Left main gear tire temperatures and pressures were lost; these involved eight separate sensor measurements. At about this time, a tire pressure alert was displayed to the shuttle crew, and was apparently acknowledged verbally. This was believed to be the crew's last transmission.

U.S. officials identified several primary areas for investigators' initial focus:

- The trajectory flown by the shuttle as it entered the upper atmosphere. A too-steep approach could cause excessive heating of the vehicle's structure, which could lead to its failure.

- Integrity of the orbiter's structure throughout the reentry.

- The flight controls, including both the reaction control system (RCS) small thrusters that let astronauts fly the orbiter in space -- and aerodynamic surfaces, such as elevons on the aft edge of the wing, which control the vehicle within the atmosphere.

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"We spent a goodly amount of time reviewing" film of the insulation falling off, "and then analyzing" it to see "would there be any consequences," Dittmore told reporters. "It was judged that that event did not represent a safety concern. As we look at that now in hindsight, and certainly we have, all the indications were on the left wing. We can't discount that there might be a connection, but we can't rush to judgment on it."

Information from several Defense Dept. space-monitoring facilities will also be key to the investigation. Infrared sensors on U.S. Defense Support Program (DSP) satellites are believed to have captured data that could help NASA determine what was happening to Columbia during reentry. Officials at the North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) said they are supporting NASA, but declined to comment on specifics.

NORAD provides missile warning and space-object tracking primarily for defense purposes, but its Space Control Center in Cheyenne Mountain, Colo., also monitors shuttle launches and on-orbit operations. Using a number of space surveillance systems, NORAD, Air Force Space Command and U.S. Strategic Command provide debris-avoidance information to NASA when the shuttle is in space.

Investigators probing the loss of space shuttle Columbia on Feb. 1 at about 9 a.m. EST during reentry will probably focus on structural- and systems-integrity.

Data sent via telemetry from the orbiter are being scrutinized for clues that could explain the vehicle's high-altitude break-up.

"We'll be poring over that data 24 hours a day for the foreseeable future," said Ron Dittimore, NASA's space shuttle program manager.

Although details are still slowly emerging from NASA, it appears that both voice and telemetry signals were lost shortly after Columbia emerged from the "blackout" portion of the reentry. Milt Heflin, NASA's Chief Flight Director, said "all vehicle data" were lost when Columbia was at 207,135 ft. altitude and Mach 18.3.

At a mid-afternoon press briefing, Heflin outlined a sequence of sensor readings and the loss of those readings:

- 8:53 a.m. EST - Lost left wing inboard and outboard hydraulic temperature sensors.
- 8:56 a.m. EST - Left main tire and brake line temperatures increasing.
- 8:58 a.m. EST - "Bondline" temperatures from sensors in the vehicle structure were lost. Three of these were on the left wing's inboard and outboard elevons.
- 8:59 a.m. EST - Left main gear tire temperatures and pressures were lost; these involved eight separate sensor measurements. At about this time, a tire pressure alert was displayed to the shuttle crew, and was apparently acknowledged verbally. This was believed to be the crew's last transmission.

U.S. officials identified several primary areas for investigators' initial focus:

- The trajectory flown by the shuttle as it entered the upper atmosphere. A too-steep approach could cause excessive heating of the vehicle's structure, which could lead to its failure.
- Integrity of the orbiter's structure throughout the reentry.
- The flight controls, including both the reaction control system (RCS) small thrusters that let astronauts fly the orbiter in space -- and aerodynamic surfaces, such as elevons on the aft edge of the wing, which control the vehicle within the atmosphere.
- Possible damage to the thermal protection system (TPS), the white and black tiles that protect the vehicle from excessive heat. During Columbia's liftoff, a piece of insulation from the external fuel tank fell off and hit the orbiter, apparently on the leading edge of the left wing. Whether this impact

significantly damaged protective tiles or not, and had any effect on the shuttle orbiter's ultimate breakup during reentry, is being studied.

"We spent a goodly amount of time reviewing" film of the insulation falling off, "and then analyzing" it to see "would there be any consequences," Dittmore told reporters. "It was judged that that event did not represent a safety concern. As we look at that now in hindsight, and certainly we have, all the indications were on the left wing. We can't discount that there might be a connection, but we can't rush to judgment on it."

Information from several Defense Dept. space-monitoring facilities will also be key to the investigation. Infrared sensors on U.S. Defense Support Program (DSP) satellites are believed to have captured data that could help NASA determine what was happening to Columbia during reentry. Officials at the North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) said they are supporting NASA, but declined to comment on specifics.

NORAD provides missile warning and space-object tracking primarily for defense purposes, but its Space Control Center in Cheyenne Mountain, Colo., also monitors shuttle launches and on-orbit operations. Using a number of space surveillance systems, NORAD, Air Force Space Command and U.S. Strategic Command provide debris-avoidance information to NASA when the shuttle is in space.

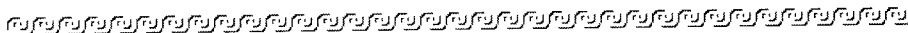

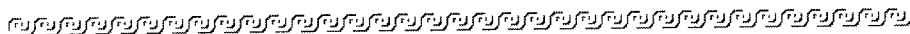

Third party requests are requests from any person or organization other than: 1) NASA Employees; 2) NASA contractors involved in the Columbia accident investigation or involved in the Shuttle program; 3) other Federal Agencies; or 4) the Columbia Accident Investigation Board (CAIB) chaired by Adm. Gehman and its supporting contractors.

LAPD 1300.2 provides that the FOIA Officer serves as the LaRC focal point for requests for release of information and records to third-parties. Anyone receiving third-party requests for Columbia related records must provide the requests and responsive records to the FOIA Officer who will make the appropriate response to the requesting party. Oral requests by a third-party for Columbia-related records must be reduced to writing and submitted to the LaRC FOIA Officer. The LaRC FOIA Officer, Cheryl Cleghorn may be reached at FOIA@larc.nasa.gov or by calling 864-2497.

The FOIA Officer and the Office of Chief Counsel (OCC) FOIA team will work together to expeditiously review all draft responses and promptly process all requests. This memorandum establishes the procedures for processing “third party” requests to NASA Centers and Headquarters for all records related to the Columbia/STS-107 accident and related investigations (referred to below as “Columbia-related records”). *This memorandum does not establish new procedures, but instead addresses the application of NASA’s existing Freedom of Information Act procedures (14 C.F.R. Section 1206) to the unique situation at hand.* The goals of this process include assurance of timely responses to requests, thorough documentation of all records requested by and released to third parties, and publication of those records through a NASA internet web site described below.

This policy applies to all “third parties,” which is any person or organization other than: 1) NASA employees, 2) NASA contractors involved in the Columbia accident investigation or involved in the Shuttle program, 3) other Federal agencies, and 4) the Columbia Accident Investigation Board (CAIB) chaired by Adm. Gehman, and its supporting contractors. The following procedural guidelines will be followed in handling third-party requests:

- **Processing requests:**

- Any request from third-parties for Columbia-related records will be processed under NASA’s Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) procedures, 14 C.F.R. Part 1206, including log-in/log out of all requests.
- Any oral request by a third party for Columbia-related records must be reduced to writing and submitted to the appropriate PAO/FOIA office.
- All draft responses (initial determinations) will be reviewed expeditiously by Chief Counsel (Code GG for Headquarters) and appropriate technical personnel.
- All requests will be processed promptly: the requests and records determined responsive to the requests will be promptly located and reviewed, and timely decisions will be made concerning releasability.

GRATUITUOUS SERVICE AGREEMENT

ARTICLE 1.0 BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE

This Agreement sets forth the conditions under which I may render gratuitous services to NASA. These gratuitous services involve support for the investigation of the loss of the Space Shuttle Columbia on February 1, 2003, specifically I will be _____

_____. In conformance with Article 2.3 I agree to coordinate my activities under this Agreement through the Structures and Materials Competency, Langley Research Center.

ARTICLE 2.0 INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY AND DATA RIGHTS

2.1 NASA has exclusive rights to all data generated by, or resulting from, the gratuitous services provided under this Agreement. I will comply with NASA policies and procedures before releasing any such data.

2.2 In the performance of this Agreement, I may have access to, be furnished, or use data of third parties which the United States (U.S.) Government has agreed to handle under protective arrangements and/or U.S. Government data, the use and dissemination of which the U.S. Government intends to control. In order to protect the interests of the U.S. Government and the owners, licensors, and licensees of such data, I agree, with respect to any such third party or U.S. Government data to: (1) use, disclose and reproduce such data only to the extent necessary to perform the work required under this Agreement; (2) preclude access and disclosure of such data to unauthorized persons; and (3) return or dispose of such data, as NASA may direct, when the data is no longer needed for performance of this Agreement. Notwithstanding the above, I shall not be restricted in use, disclosure, and reproduction of any data that is in the public domain at the time of disclosure or thereafter enters the public domain without breach of this Agreement by me; is known to me at the time of disclosure; has been disclosed to me without restriction from NASA; has become known to me without similar restrictions from a source other than NASA, that source having the right to disclose; or is required to be produced by me pursuant to a court order or other U.S. Government action. If I believe that any of these events or conditions that remove restriction on the use, disclosure, and reproduction of the data apply, I shall promptly notify NASA of such belief before acting on such belief, and, in any event, shall give notice to NASA before unrestricted use, disclosure, or reproduction of such data.

2.3 I will not represent myself as an agent, representative, or spokesperson of NASA regarding any work performed in furtherance of this Agreement or the loss of the Space Shuttle Columbia. I will comply with NASA policies and procedures before discussing the nature or results of my work under this Agreement with any entity or individual not employed by NASA.

ARTICLE 3.0 WAIVER OF RIGHTS

I will not pursue any claims against the U.S. Government or its employees. This provision includes, but is not limited to, claims for money, reimbursement for expenses and claims for compensation or injuries I may suffer while performing work under this Agreement. I waive any and all claims against the U.S. Government on account of such gratuitous service performed under this Agreement. This Article does not waive remedies otherwise available to me under the Federal Tort Claims Act.

Randy & Sherri,

I discussed this with Code G and we are in agreement that such a donation is within the spirit of the Exchange NPD, 9050.6G.

Paragraph 1.c.(3) states that Exchanges may, by contract, or otherwise, promote activities contributing to the efficiency, welfare, and morale of NASA employees; and paragraph 1.c.(6) authorizes Exchanges to conduct other activities authorized by the Center Director with prior concurrence of the Center Chief Counsel and Center External Affairs Officer, when activities involve the public and are clearly in NASA's and its employees' interests.

Donating to an organization that is expending effort and funds to assist in the Columbia disaster recovery is something that one could conclude contributes to the morale of NASA employees and is, therefore, clearly related to NASA and the interests of its employees. Making the donation might, at least to some degree, serve to represent the overall desire of employees to help and perhaps bring some relief from the feeling of loss that NASA employees are currently experiencing as a result of the Columbia disaster.

The usual restrictions associated with fund raising through the CFC do not apply to non-appropriated fund activities but relate to soliciting Federal employees for contributions to charitable organizations. Thus, any effort to solicit directly from employees would create potential problems that the current request does not raise. Randy, the points you mention in your previous e-mail about receiving similar requests are valid and must also be weighed in making such a decision. Another issue to ponder is whether the Exchange is in a financially viable position to make such a donation. Certainly the Exchange is not in a financial position to respond if we receive a host of these requests, but I do not anticipate that situation. While the donations from other NASA exchanges will make this request more difficult to decline, the above considerations should be weighed before deciding to donate.

I would suggest following the requirements of paragraph 1.c.(6) to authorize a donation in response to this request. In that case, this e-mail will serve as the concurrence of the LaRC Chief Counsel. I have also copied Mike Finneran, as External Affairs Officer, to determine if he concurs. If so, I believe that

Lana has authority to make the decision authorizing the donation since the Center Director has, by LAPD 9050.9, paragraph 5.a., delegated to the Associate Director for Business Management the responsibility for monitoring and implementing exchange policy.
