National Procurement Fraud Task Force (NPFTF)

The NPFTF is composed of officials from across the Federal government and from each of the OIGs. The Task Force seeks to increase coordination and strengthen partnerships among all IGs, Federal law enforcement agencies, and DOJ prosecutors to fight procurement fraud more effectively. Some of the types of fraud targeted by the Task Force include: defective pricing; product substitution; misuse of classified and procurement-sensitive information; false claims; grant fraud; labor and product mischarging; accounting fraud; conflict of interest; and public corruption.

The Task Force includes several committees, each chaired by IGs, devoted to procurement issues including:

- --Training
- --Relations with the Private Sector

- --Legislation
- --Iraq/International
- --Intelligence
- --Information Sharing
- -- Grant Fraud.

During the latest NPFTF meeting on January 25, 2007, the goals and accomplishments of the Task Force were discussed, and each of the committees and select regional working groups gave reports on their progress. The next NPFTF meeting will be in March 2007.

Investigator Training Update: Curriculum Review; New Course; and FY 2008 Projections

The Inspector General Criminal Investigator Academy (IGCIA) has established a permanent curriculum review committee to periodically review and revise the Academy's basic training programs, specifically the Inspector General Investigator Training Program (IGITP) and the Inspector General Transitional Training Program (IGTTP). This group is expected to provide consistency in the Academy's curriculum review process and will convene for the first time this spring. A new 1-week IG In-Service Training Program (IGISTP) has been developed in response to the Academy's needs assessment survey results. This program was designed to satisfy the periodic refresher training requirements specified in the Attorney General's Guidelines

for OIGs with Statutory Law Enforcement Authority and the PCIE/ECIE Quality Standards for Investigations. Instruction in the following topical areas will be included in the IGISTP: legal updates, defensive tactics, arrest techniques, use of force, intermediate weapons and firearms training. The Academy expects to offer this program for the first time in the fourth quarter of FY 2007.

At the December 12, 2006 AIGI meeting, an ad-hoc working group was formed to discuss the IG Academy's business model and strategic plan for future years. Recent efforts by the community have focused on providing training for 2007 and this group's efforts will focus on more global issues for FY 2008 and beyond. Volunteers to this group include Bill Tebbe, AIGI, Railroad Retirement Board/OIG; Bert Vint, AIGI, Office of Personnel Management/OIG; Mark Woods, AIGI, Department of Agriculture/OIG; and John Dupuy, Deputy AIGI, Department of the Interior/OIG. Stephanie Hall and Angela Hrdlicka will also be involved in this working group. The initial kick-off meeting for this group will be in February.

Projection packets soliciting FY 2008 training projections for FLETC and IGCIA programs will soon be sent to all agencies and will have a quick turnaround time. FLETC and the IGCIA require this information in order to develop their respective FY 2008 training calendars and allocations. Seats will not be allocated to agencies which did not submit projections. Agencies without an allocation in a particular training program will only be admitted on a space-available basis.
