

Polling Shows That Americans Want Quality, Affordable Health Care

As Americans continue to struggle under this recession, reducing health care costs is more important than ever. According to recent reports, a majority of American families are seriously concerned about the skyrocketing costs of health care. With Americans increasingly focused on this issue, a majority of the public supports reform to lower costs, preserve and expand patient choice, and assure access to quality, affordable health care for all.

## **Health Care Costs Hurting American Families**

Rising health care costs have had a negative impact on Americans' finances, including a decrease in contributions to retirement plans (32%) and other savings (53%) and in difficulty paying for basic necessities (29%) and other bills (37%). – Employee Benefit Research Institute, 7/09

## **Americans Call for Health Care Reform**

**85% say the current health care system needs "fundamental changes"** or we need to "completely rebuild it." – New York Times/CBS News poll, 6/20/09

**58% say "government reform [is] necessary to stall skyrocketing costs** and expand coverage for the uninsured." – Washington Post/ABC News poll, 6/24/09

**55% think the "U.S. health care system is in need of a great deal of reform."** – CNN/Opinion Research Corp. survey, 7/1/09

## Americans Trust Democrats to Enact Health Care Reform

**57% say Democrats are more likely to improve health care,** compared to only 18 % of respondents who picked Republicans. Even one of four Republicans said the Democrats would do better. – New York Times/CBS News poll, 6/20/09

53% say "they trust Obama more than Congressional Republicans [33%] to take on the issue" of health care reform. – Quinnipiac University poll, 7/1/09

"Nearly half of those questioned have more trust in the president than in congressional Republicans (38%) to handle health care overhaul." – CNN/Opinion Research Corp. survey, 7/1/09
