From the Director



Digital Debates is the theme of the tenth annual WebWise Conference on Libraries and Museums in the Digital World.

The conference will focus on some of the problematic "Big Issues" faced by museums, libraries, archives, and other cultural institutions as they deal with emerging technologies, changing social behaviors and expectations, and new economic realities. How can institutions involve audiences as collaborators and yet maintain their status as trusted

information sources? What are cultural institutions' rights and responsibilities in an online environment? Can they partner effectively with other organizations, including corporate entities, without losing their own identities? What kinds of investments in technology are prudent or essential to the institution's mission? We have engaged leaders from the cultural heritage community and beyond to share their views and stimulate a wider conversation on these and related topics. No one has all the answers, but we firmly believe we will all be stronger for exploring these questions as a community and standing together to face the future.

Though this year's conference is in Washington, DC, we are delighted to be partnering once again with The Wolfsonian-Florida International University, with additional support provided by the Florida Center for Library Automation and the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. In fact, it was MacArthur Foundation President Jonathan Fanton's keynote address at least year's WebWise Conference in Miami Beach that sparked the idea for this year's theme [see "Rights and Responsibilities Online: A Paradox of Our Times," reprinted in the August 2008 issue of the online journal *First Monday*].

In addition to the plenary sessions, the conference will feature demonstrations of projects funded by IMLS and by the MacArthur Foundation. We hope that all participants will be able to come to the Opening Reception on February 25. Attendees are also invited to sign up for a "Dutch-treat" dinner opportunity with MacArthur Foundation grantees following the reception, on a first-come, first-served basis. We will also provide opportunities on February 26 for registrants to join a lunch-table discussion led by IMLS staff or grantee demonstrators on topics of particular interest.
