Dear Chairmen and Ranking Members:

We urge you to retain an important provision, sponsored by Senator Durbin in the final FY 2006 Labor-HHS-Education appropriations bill, which protects the integrity of scientific advice and information in federal agencies.

The House of Representatives adopted a similar provision in an amendment barring the use of funds to appoint members of scientific advisory panels on the basis of political affiliation. The Senate-approved language defines that prohibition to include an appointee's political affiliation, voting record, and political opinions.


This provision is of critical importance. As the federal government confronts challenges to the nation's health, it must have policies based on the best scientific advice. The National Academies of Science recently reaffirmed the importance of non-political committee members, stating, "It is inappropriate to ask them to provide nonrelevant information, such as voting record, political-party

affiliation, or position on particular policies.”¹ This appropriations language ensures that government advisors are chosen for their expertise, not for their political views.

The Senate language also bars the use of funds to disseminate scientific information that is deliberately false or misleading.

With both the Senate and House including language to uphold scientific integrity in federal agencies, we believe that the final bill must include strong provisions on this important issue. We urge you to retain the Senate-approved language on scientific integrity in the final FY2006 Labor-HHS-Education appropriations bill.


