Celebrate Advances In Space!

Prior to Buzz, Alan, and Yuri there were several unknowns who paved the way for their venture into space. From April to May 1959, McDonnell engineers customized couches for several Yorkshire pigs to test the impact of landing and to eliminate major consequences. They strapped the swine into their testing equipment and dropped them. The scheduled "pig drops" became quite popular, and numerous McDonnell employees and Space Task Group engineers watched the event. Shockingly enough the pigs withstood the test (with acceleration peaks of 38 to 58 g) with "minor internal injuries." The fact that the pigs walked away significantly encouraged the scientists and engineers since NASA had just selected their Mercury astronauts. More test launches utilized monkeys before NASA was ready to send humans.

Sam, a rhesus monkey, was one of the best-known monkeys of the space program. His name was an acronym for the U.S. Air Force School of Aviation Medicine at Brooks Air Force Base, Texas. He was launched on

December 4, 1959, housed in a cylindrical capsule within the Mercury spacecraft atop a Little Joe rocket in order to test the launch escape system (LES). Approximately one minute into the flight, traveling at a speed of 3,685 mph, the Mercury capsule aborted from the Little Joe launch vehicle. After attaining an altitude of 51 miles, the spacecraft landed safely in the Atlantic Ocean. Sam was recovered several hours later with no ill effects from his journey. He was later returned to the colony

in which he trained, where

he died in November 1982 and his remains were cremated.

If the animals that were part of the Space Program survived, both pigs and monkeys eventually ended up enjoying a great life at the National Zoo with lots of celebrity status.


Miss Sam, another rhesus monkey and Sam's mate, was launched on January 21, 1960, for another test of the LES. The Mercury capsule attained a velocity of 1,800 mph and an altitude of 9 miles. After landing in the Atlantic Ocean 10.8 miles downrange from the launch site, Miss Sam was also retrieved in overall good condition. She was also returned to her training colony until her death on an unknown date.
