Teaching With Documents: Use Primary Sources with Community Connections

- Civil Rights documents and court records relative to your state or town, as well as violations that rocked the conscience of Americans nationwide.
- Census pages that list the ethnic composition of a community and perhaps your students' ancestors, too.
- Records—photographs, newspaper clippings, memos, reports, and letters—covering Federal programs and policies effecting your state during World Wars I and II, the Prohibition and Great Depression eras, the rise of environmental and conservation movements, and much more.
- Immigration and citizenship records of the famous, common, and infamous.

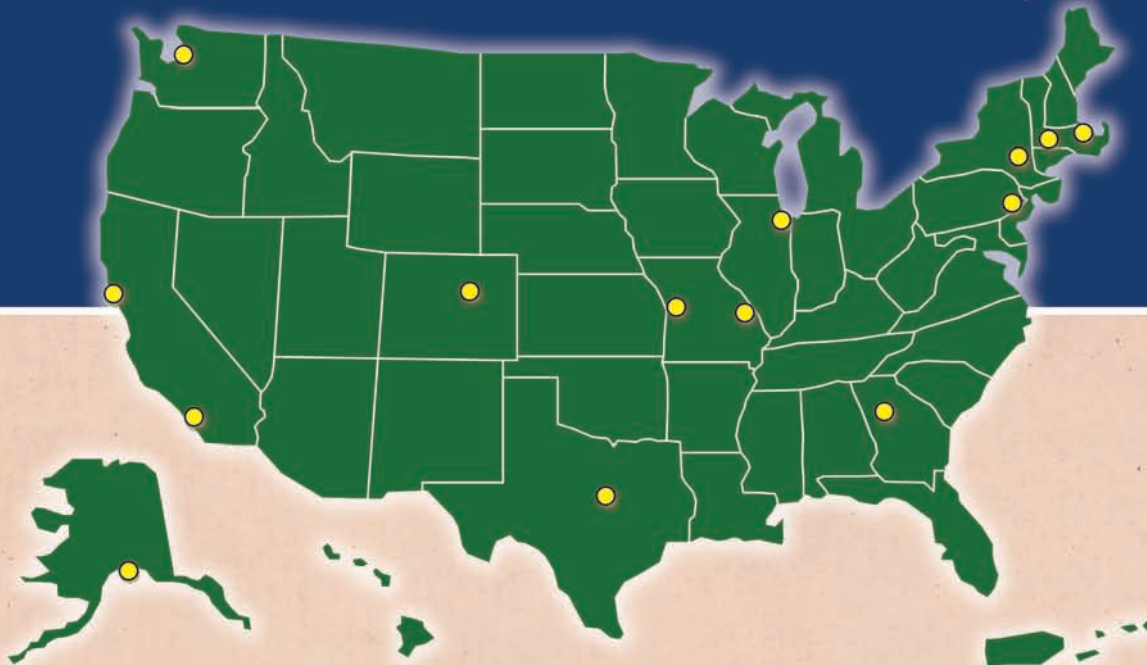
