The rising cost of health care is one of the biggest drags on our economy, and small businesses are struggling to keep their heads above water. That is why the Democratic proposal takes the necessary steps to reduce the burden of ballooning health care costs on American families, businesses and our fiscal future.

Today: Small Businesses Crushed by Health Care Costs

<u>Less than half (45 percent) of small businesses insure workers;</u> 60% of America's uninsured – or 28 million—are small business owners, workers, and their families

Costs going up: Insurance costs for small businesses have risen 129% since 2000

<u>Workers pay more:</u> Small business workers pay an average of **18% more in premiums** than those in large firms for the same benefits. Their **deductibles are more than double**

<u>Higher administrative costs:</u> Up to 25 percent of the cost of premiums for some small business health plans, compared to 10 percent for large firms.

Democratic Plan Will Benefit Small Businesses

Small businesses are among those who will benefit the most under the Democratic plan, giving them greater access to coverage at lower costs and helping them stay afloat in this economic downturn and beyond. The Democratic proposal:

- o **Gives small businesses the benefits of large-group rates,** lower administrative costs, and the ability to offer choice of plans to employees (Health Insurance Exchange)
- o **Increases competition in the insurance market** in areas where a lack thereof results in higher costs
- Ensures small businesses don't pay higher premiums if they employ a sicker workforce
- o Provides a tax credit to assist small businesses who want to offer coverage
