

Multiple offices better serve the world.

At the Office of Medical Services, the work we do has a profound effect on every continent. To be appointed to the U.S. Department of State Office of Medical Services, you must have more than the appropriate medical skills; you must possess a passion to live and work overseas. Of course, worldwide availability is essential — an affirmed willingness to serve anywhere in the world you happen to be needed.

Regional Medical Technologist

RMTs serve in support of the employees of the U.S. Government and their eligible family members, and may work in conjunction with other Foreign Service medical personnel. Duties include performing routine visitations to regional area Health Units to evaluate and monitor the performance of local laboratory technologists. They also maintain their own laboratory at assigned posts at the post of assignment and region. Some of the benefits we offer include tax-free housing overseas and a tax-free educational allowance overseas. In addition, technologists will receive at least 12 hours of Category 1 CME credit through an annual State Department-sponsored Continuing Medical Education program.

Regional Medical Officer

RMOs provide primary medical care to the employees of the U.S. Government and their eligible family members. RMOs work independently or in conjunction with other Foreign Service medical personnel both domestically and abroad. Their duties include the provision of appropriate health information, disease prevention programs, and emergency preparedness plans at each post, as well as a host of other medical and health-related responsibilities. Benefits include tax-free housing overseas, a tax-free educational allowance overseas, and a Physicians Comparability Allowance (PCA) from \$14,000 to \$30,000, among others. In addition, these physicians will receive at least ten hours of Category 1 CME credit through an annual State Department-sponsored Continuing Medical Education program.

Regional Medical Officer/Psychiatrist

Regional Medical Officer/Psychiatrists (RMO/Ps) provide primary psychiatric care to the employees of the U.S. Government and their eligible family members. They are located in large metropolitan cities, travel extensively in the region, and practice in conjunction with other Foreign Service Medical Practitioners. The RMO/P's duties also include providing crisis intervention, providing consultation to management on post morale matters, and a host of other psychiatric and mental health-related responsibilities. Additional benefits include relocation services, tax-free housing overseas, a tax-free educational allowance overseas, and a Physicians Comparability Allowance (PCA) from \$14.000 to \$30.000.

Health Practitioner

The Health Practitioner Corps is a team of Family Nurse Practitioners and Family Practice-centered Physician Assistants who provide support to U.S. Government employees and their eligible family members. They work independently or with other Foreign Service medical personnel. FNPs/PAs must be willing to serve anywhere in the world — spending about 80 percent of their careers abroad moving at two- to four-year intervals. The rest of their time is spent at the U.S. Department of State in Washington, D.C., or Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. Some of the duties will include providing primary healthcare at home posts and regional posts to authorized patients, collaborating with Regional Medical Officers (physicians and/or psychiatrists) and MED Headquarters as needed. Some benefits will include tax free housing overseas, a tax-free educational allowance, and post differential pay. In addition, individuals will attend at least one State Department-sponsored continuing medical education program each year and receive at least ten hours of Category 1 CME credit per CME.



Hiring Process

The following materials are required for a complete application package. They become the property of the U.S. Department of State and will not be returned. All items listed must be submitted together. To receive these documents via e-mail please send a message to **medhr@state.gov**.

- Completed Application for Federal Employment (DS-1950)
- Completed Employment Data Form; this is an optional form, which requests information to be used for statistical purposes only
- Official transcripts, plus any other documentation which includes all courses taken, grades, semester or quarter hours earned, cumulative grade point averages for all courses taken, class standing(s), and major (copy of Bachelor's degree)
- Completed SUPPLEMENTARY QUESTIONNAIRE

All professional applicants must hold a current license as a physician, nurse practitioner, physician assistant, or medical technologist in a state, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, a territory of the United States, or the District of Columbia. Physicians must be board certified in family medicine, internal medicine, emergency medicine, or psychiatric medicine.

NPs and PAs should hold current national certification as Family Nurse Practitioner or Physician Assistant from the American Nurses Credentialing Center, the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners, or the National Commission on Certification of Physician Assistants.
