But to disarm your child's anxiety

(and yours). Don't feel you have
to make direct eye contact either.

That can increase the discomfort.

DON'T PREACH. SHARE. Let your
children know how you felt when
you were their age. So they know

you understand what they're going through. And don't just talk, ask questions. This absolutely needs to be a two-way discussion. Because kids really respond better when they're talked with, not at. Believe it or not, your kids actually do want to know how you feel about sex and how you want them to behave. Of course they may never ask you about it. So you need to take the first step.
