The Organic and Biological Mass Spectrometry (OBMS) Group in the Chemical Sciences Division (CSD) at the Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL) currently has an immediate opening for a research scientist with particularly strong skills in tissue imaging and high throughput analysis. The research will involve the use and development of novel surface sampling and ionization methods coupled with mass spectrometry.
