State and Workforce Investment Areas

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Executive Summary

The 2008 Arkansas Labor Market and Economic Report is produced by the Labor Market Information division's Occupational/Career Information unit to provide relevant information about the economy and workforce in Arkansas and the 10 Workforce Investment Areas. The primary focus of this report includes the years 2003 to 2007, with some information covering shorter periods due to accessibility of data. Projection information for industry and occupational trends covers the years 2007 to 2009.

Arkansas's population growth has remained consistent, adding over 100,000 new residents to the state over the fiveyear period. Arkansas was ranked 32nd in the United States for total population in 2007 and had the 20th fastest growing general population between 2003 and 2007. In Arkansas's 10 Workforce Investment Areas, Northwest Arkansas experienced the largest population growth, while the Eastern, Southeast, and Southwest WIAs continued to see decreasing populations.

The state's labor force and employment continued to show increased numbers, while unemployment rates saw a small decline in 2005, but increased slightly in 2006 and 2007. The Northwest Arkansas WIA's unemployment rate was well below the state rate in 2007, while the Eastern Arkansas WIA saw a drop in its unemployment rate, it remained above the state rate.

Arkansas has also seen a shift in the age of its workforce. The percentage of mature workers, those 55 and older, has increased on the state level, as well as, in every WIA. While older workers increased, the percentage of younger workers, ages 14-44, has decreased since 2003.

Employment in Arkansas is projected to increase by 2.6 percent between 2007 and 2009. Of the 35,514 new jobs to be added during the projection period, 30,861 are estimated to occur in Services-Providing industries, while Goods-Producing industries are predicted to add 3,092 jobs. Arkansas is projected to add 1,561 self-employed and unpaid family workers to the workforce.

Short-term industry growth is primarily in the Services-Providing group with the fastest growing industries directly related to the Fayetteville Shale areas of North Central and West Central Arkansas. Overall, manufacturing industries are projected to continue to lose jobs.

The state's top growing occupations require only short-term on-the-job training, resulting in rapid opportunities for individuals to contribute to economic growth. Mirroring the fastest industry growth, jobs related to oil and natural gas will be among the top fastest growing occupations. Production related occupations lead the fastest declining occupations.

Arkansas's per capita personal income has increased over the five-year period, however, the state's income remains at approximately 77 percent of the United States per capita income. During the first quarter of 2008, the cost of living in Arkansas's urban areas remained below the national average for all urban areas in the index.

More than 500,000 Arkansas workers earn between \$10 and \$20 dollars an hour, with the mean wage for all employer sizes being \$32,452 a year.

State of Arkansas

Profile

Arkansas's population grew to 2,834,797, or by 4.2 percent, from 2003 to 2007, while the state's labor force grew by 98,000 to 1,367,800 during the same time period. Employment increased by 8.2 percent over the five-year period, while the annual unemployment rate dropped fourtenths of a percentage point to 5.4 percent.

Comprised of 75 counties, the State of Arkansas has 10 Local Workforce Investment Areas and six Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs).

Higher education opportunities in Arkansas are abundant, giving prospective students a wide range of institutions from which to choose. From two-year community and technical colleges to four-year universities, residents can choose between state, public, private, or religious-based institutions. With a variety of programs, Arkansas's higher education institutions provide students the opportunity to earn many different degrees.


Industry

Elementary and Secondary Schools is projected to be the lead industry in the state in net growth over the 2007-2009 projection period. Private schools are estimated to outpace the public schools in percent growth, but a strong charter school movement could contribute to the industry growth. The Leisure and Hospitality supersector contains three industries on the top 10 growth industries list with Full Service Restaurants expected to add 2,459 jobs. General Freight Trucking is estimated to add 1,065 jobs, despite unstable gas prices, which will lead to a rise in food prices.

Activity in the Fayetteville Shale is likely to lead to enormous economic growth in the state, especially within the North Central and West Central regions. Oil and Gas Extraction is estimated to more than double with a 175.1 percent growth. Support Activities for Mining will increase employment by 56.4 percent. Together, they are predicted to add 2,947 jobs through the first quarter of 2009. Other highlights include a strong growth in Aerospace Product and Parts Manufacturing, as well as, an emerging presence of Ship and Boat Building. Six of the top 10 fastest growing industries are in Manufacturing, all within durable goods industries.

Manufacturing jobs overall continue to slide with eight of the top 10 declining industries projected to be in this supersector. Animal Slaughtering and Processing could lead in this decline with 778 job losses in the projection period. Electrical Equipment Manufacturing is estimated to lose 634 jobs, while a decline in lumber production will likely cause a ripple effect in the Sawmills and Wood Preservation industry, as well as, losses in Construction.

All 10 of the fastest declining industries are predicted to be in Manufacturing with apparel-related industries continuing to show a decline. Fabric Mills is estimated to be the fastest declining industry with a loss of 41.3 percent of its workforce over the two-year period. Seven of the top 10 fastest declining industries are durable



goods manufacturing jobs. Navigational, Measuring, Electromedical, and Control Instruments Manufacturing is projected to lose over a third of its total workforce. Overseas outsourcing and company consolidations tend to be the leading causes of manufacturing declines.

Occupations


Jobs requiring on-the-job training dominate the top 10 growing occupations list. Leading the growth is Retail Salespersons with an estimated increase of 1,731 new jobs, while Truck Drivers, Heavy and Tractor-Trailer is projected to add 1,370 jobs during the 2007-2009 period. The only job in the top 10 list requiring a formal education is Registered Nurses with an anticipated growth of 896 jobs, but 40 percent of the job openings in this occupation will likely be due to turnover.

Jobs related to oil and natural gas dominate the top 10 fastest growing occupations list. Jobs in the Fayetteville Shale Zone are growing astronomically with Wellhead Pumpers topping the list at 109.5 percent. Four occupations related to oil and natural gas extraction are also on the list, with each expected to increase employment by more than 50 percent.

While truck drivers are expected to grow, jobs preparing products for shipment are the reverse. Three jobs related to the moving of materials are among the top 10 declining occupations with Packers and Packers, Hand leading the decline with 352 job losses on the horizon. Six production jobs are on the top 10 declining list with Team Assemblers in second place with 188 anticipated job losses, a notch ahead of Sewing Machine Operators, which could lose 187 jobs.

Half of the top 10 fastest declining occupations, including the top four, are in textiles and apparel production. Extruding and Forming Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Synthetic and Glass Fibers, is predicted to decline the fastest with a 23.8 percent decline. The only non-manufacturing or production job among the top 10 fastest declining is Travel Agents with a projected loss of 12.1 percent of its workforce. Online sales of travel packages will likely increase and lead to a loss of jobs for local travel agencies.


State of Arkansas — Population 2003-2007





ABOUT THE INDEX: The ACCRA Cost of Living Index provides a useful and reasonably accurate measure of living cost differences among urban areas. Items on which the Index is based have been carefully chosen to reflect the different categories of consumer expenditures. Weights assigned to relative costs are based on government survey data on expenditure patterns for professional and executive households. All items are priced in each place at a specified time and according to standardized specifications.

INTERPRETING THE INDEX: The ACCRA Cost of Living Index measures relative price levels for consumer goods and services in participating areas. The average for all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, equals 100, and each participant's index is read as a percentage of the average for all places. The Index does not measure inflation (price change over time). For inflation data, contact the US Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) at www.bls.gov.

2008Q1 - 2007Q1

Based on the ACCRA composite cost of living index in Conway, Arkansas goods and services would be 91.7 percent of the national average of all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, while in Jonesboro, Arkansas the same goods and services would be 86.8 percent. Given a standard set of goods and services cost nationally of \$1,000 these goods and services would cost \$917 in Conway and \$868 in Jonesboro, respectively during the time period 2008Q1 – 2007Q1.


Using this information makes it possible to determine what salary would be required to move from Jonesboro to Conway and maintain the same standard of living. Based upon a yearly salary of \$36,180 in Jonesboro a salary of \$38,225 would be required in Conway (or slightly above a 5.5 percent increase).

2008Q1

Index comparison of a city from one time period to another is possible, however. During the time period of 2008Q1 - 2007Q1 the composite index for Fort Smith, Arkansas was 89.2. During the time period 2008Q1 the composite index changed to 89.9. Since the average for all participating places equals 100 during each rating period it may be interpreted that during the 2008Q1 rating period the cost of living index was higher in Fort Smith, Arkansas relative to the national average for all participating places than it was during the 2008Q1 - 2007Q1 rating period. The same conclusion is reasonable for the sub-categories of Housing, Utilities and Health Care. During the 2008Q1 period the Housing category changed from 70.3 to 72.8. The Utilities category changed from 100.7 to 106.5 and the Health Care category changed from 91.7 to 93.0. Alternatively, during the same time period the Grocery Items, Transportation and Misc. Goods and Services categories was lower. The index for Grocery Items reduced from 94.9 to 94.8, Transportation reduced from 89.5 to 88.8, and Misc. Goods and Services lowered from 100.3 to 98.6.

Again using this information makes it possible to determine what salary would be required to move from Fort Smith to Little Rock and maintain the same standard of living. Based upon a yearly salary of \$40,000 in Fort Smith a salary of \$42,950 would be required in Little Rock (or slightly above a 7.3 percent increase).



Arkansas's Annual Median Family Income grew from \$39,800 in 2002 to \$45,300 in 2006, with no increase from 2004 to 2006. The United States Annual Median Family Income remains above Arkansas's level, growing from \$54,400 in 2002 to \$59,600 in 2006.



Arkansas's Annual Per Capita Personal Income was \$27,935 in 2006 growing by \$4,423 from \$23,512 in 2002. The United States Annual Per Capita Personal Income was \$36,276 in 2006, a 17 percent increase from 2002.

Total Workers by Age for Arkansas 2003-2006 (All Ownerships)







Central Arkansas WIA

Profile

The Central Arkansas Workforce Investment Area has seen a population increase of 31,623, or 7.2 percent, to 468,549 residents from 2003 to 2007. Over the same time period, the labor force increased by 10 percent to a total of 236,425 workers, while employment jumped by 21,600 workers, or 10.6 percent. The 2007 annual unemployment rate for the Area, including the major cities of Jacksonville, North Little Rock, and Conway, was 4.5 percent. For the five-year period from 2003 to 2007, the annual unemployment rate dropped five-tenths of a percentage point.

The Area is home to the Prairie County Museum in Des Arc, which contains artifacts and exhibits that tell the story of the Lower White River's influence on the first settlements in the Arkansas frontier, while Pickles Gap Village in Conway presents a unique variety of shops for those traveling through to the Ozarks. Located in Scott, the Plantation Agricultural Museum, tells of the history of cotton agriculture in the state; and the Toltec Indian Mounds State Park, a national historic landmark, preserves and interprets the state's tallest Native American mounds. Pinnacle Mountain, located near Roland, can be viewed in the western sections of the Little Rock/North Little Rock area and is famous for its cone-shaped peak with hiking trails that lead to the summit. The Little Rock Air Force Base in Jacksonville is the world's largest training ground for C-130 pilots and North Little Rock's Old Mill, an authentic reproduction of a water-powered gristmill, was seen in the opening credits of "Gone with the Wind."

The Central Arkansas WIA consists of six counties, all within commuting distance to the City of Little Rock WIA: Faulkner, Lonoke, Monroe, Prairie, Saline, and the portion of Pulaski County outside of Little Rock. The majority of the Little Rock-North Little Rock-Conway Metropolitan Statistical Area is located in this WIA.

Three four-year colleges and universities are located in Conway: the University of Central Arkansas, home to Arkansas's Public Broadcasting Station, Arkansas Educational Television Network (AETN); Hendrix College; and Central Baptist College. There are satellite campuses of other colleges and universities, including the University of Arkansas at Little Rock-Benton and the Pulaski Technical College-Saline County Career Center in Bauxite. Two two-year colleges, Shorter College and Pulaski Technical College, are located in North Little Rock.

Industry

Food Services and Drinking Places heads up the list of the top 10 growing industries in the Area with an estimated growth of 756 new jobs during the 2007 to 2009 projection period. The Area's continued population growth will likely lead to higher growth in the local schools as 653 new jobs are projected to be added to Educational Services. All 10 of the top growing industries



are forecast to increase employment by more than 190 jobs. Food Manufacturing is estimated to be the fastest growing industry with a growth of 23.8 percent, while Machinery Manufacturing, is a step behind at 23.4 percent. In all, four manufacturing industry groups are on the top 10 fastest growing industry list, all forecast to increase employment by over 12 percent. Furniture and Related Product Manufacturing is predicted to be the top declining industry with a loss of 102 jobs, or a decrease of 6.6 percent, placing them second in percent decline. Although construction is down in every major region of the state, the Central Arkansas WIA is the only Area where employment is affected enough for the Construction of Buildings industry to appear on the top 10 declining industry list with losses of 28 jobs or 1.4 percent. Nonstore Retailers claims the top spot among the fastest declining industries with an estimated loss of 9.3 percent of its workforce.


Occupations

Sales and food service jobs dominate the top 10 growing occupations list with Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Except Technical and Scientific Products leading the list with 303 estimated new jobs between 2007 and 2009. Retail Salespersons is not too far behind with 297 new jobs projected, while Cashiers could add 155. Among food service jobs, Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food, is forecast to add 217. Slaughterers and Meat Packers heads the list of the top 10 fastest growing occupations at 25.9 percent growth, while Meat, Poultry, and Fish Cutters and Trimmers could grow by an additional 23.2 percent. Six of the 10 fastest growing occupations are estimated to grow by at least 10 percent. Despite the housing and credit crisis that has affected parts of the country, Financial Analysts crept into the top 10 at seventh with an anticipated growth of 9 percent. Telemarketers are projected to lose 55 jobs, making it the top declining occupation in the Central Arkansas WIA. Team Assemblers is projected to lose 43 jobs, while Sewing Machine Operators is forecast to lose 28 and have minimal to no replacement openings. Sewing Machine Operators is also projected to be the fastest declining occupation at 14.7 percent.






Central Arkansas WIA Population 2003-2007

Total Workers by Age Central Arkansas Workforce Investment Area 2003-2006 (All Ownerships)







City of Little Rock WIA

Profile

The City of Little Rock Workforce Investment Area saw the state's smallest population increase during the period from 2003 to 2007, with only 2,996 new residents, or 1.6 percent, moving to the capital city. However surrounded by smaller suburbs and a short commute time, the labor force grew by 5,375 workers to 98,300, or 5.8 percent, while employment figures went up 5,500 workers, or by 6.3 percent. The WIA's annual unemployment rate for 2007 was 5.0 percent, seeing a drop of four-tenths of a percentage point over the five-year period.


The City of Little Rock WIA has numerous attractions and resources for people to enjoy. There are a number of museums in the area, including the Arkansas Arts Center. Located in the historic MacArthur Park, the Center houses art galleries, a Children's Theater, and other attractions related to the arts. As Arkansas's only major airport, Little Rock National transports over two million passengers in and out of the city each year. Central High School is considered one of Arkansas's most important historical landmarks. The school received national attention in 1957 when it found itself in the center of one of the earliest school desegregation struggles in the modern civil rights movement. And with the addition of the Clinton Presidential Library and the revitalization of the River Market District, the downtown area has become a tourist destination for the state and Area.

The City of Little Rock WIA is a center for government operations, serving as the county seat of Pulaski County as well as the state's capital. The WIA is recognized as part of the Little Rock-North Little Rock-Conway Metropolitan Statistical Area.

Three four-year colleges are located in the City of Little Rock: one public university, the University of Arkansas at Little Rock; and three private colleges, Arkansas Baptist College, Philander Smith College, and Remington College. It is also home to the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences and the UALR William H. Bowen School of Law, one of two law schools in the state. This amounts to a wealth of educational opportunities for the citizens of Arkansas, especially in the central part of the state.

Industry

Food Services and Drinking Places is projected to be the top growing industry in the City of Little Rock WIA with a growth of 608 jobs between 2007 and 2009. Healthcare jobs in the capital city are estimated to increase with the Hospitals industry adding an estimated 595 employees, while Ambulatory Health Care Services adds an additional 369. All 10 of the top 10 growing industries are estimated to increase employment by more than 150 jobs. Motion Picture and Sound Recording Industries is forecast to increase employment by 34.7 percent, making it the fastest growing industry in the area, while Food Manufacturing is estimated to be second



with 9.4 percent. The credit and housing crisis may hit the City of Little Rock WIA harder than other areas of the state as Credit Intermediation and Related Activities is expected to lose 304 jobs between 2007 and 2009. Two other industries are forecast to lose more than 175 jobs with Merchant Wholesalers, Durable Goods losing 189 and Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations losing 179, largely due to the loss of funding for non-profit organizations. Five of the top 10 fastest declining industries are in manufacturing with Electrical Equipment, Appliance, and Component Manufacturing leading with a 13.9 percent anticipated decrease. Machinery Manufacturing are both forecast to lose over 10 percent of the jobs in their respective industries.


Occupations

Registered Nurses leads the list of the top 10 growing occupations with an estimated gain of 311 jobs. Half of the occupations on the top 10 list are projected to add over 135 jobs with Retail Salespersons coming in second with 228 new jobs projected. Grinding, Lapping, Polishing, and Buffing Machine Tool Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic tops the list of the top 10 fastest growing occupations with an estimated growth of 46.8 percent. Aircraft Structure, Surfaces, Rigging, and Systems Assemblers are estimated to increase employment by 26.8 percent. All 10 of the top 10 fastest growing occupations are forecast to increase employment by more than 12.5 percent. Administrative and Support Occupations dominates the list of the top 10 declining occupations list with Tellers heading the list with 57 job losses, while File Clerks are anticipating 35 job losses. At least 15 jobs are forecast to be lost in each of the top 10 declining occupations. Tool and Die Makers tops the list of the top 10 fastest declining occupations with a loss of 11.8 percent. New Account Clerks is second and heads a list of four occupations in the Information and Records Clerks family with an estimated loss of 11.3 percent. Six of the 10 occupations on the list could be contributed to the credit crisis facing every major area in the country.






City of Little Rock WIA 2003-2007 Population







Eastern Arkansas WIA

Profile

The Eastern Arkansas Workforce Investment Area has seen a drop in population of 2.8 percent from 2003 to 2007. Conversely, the labor force and employment have seen an increase of 1.1 percent and 1.3 percent, respectively. The annual unemployment rate for Eastern Arkansas for 2007 was 7.8 percent, a decrease of twotenths of a percentage point since 2003.

The Eastern Arkansas WIA is home to several national historic landmarks and interesting facts. The Parkin Archeological Park, in Parkin, is a former American Indian village that some scholars believe was visited by the expedition of Hernando de Soto in 1541. Also, on the border of Lee and Phillips Counties, a granite monument marks the initial site for the East/West baseline of the 1815 survey of the Louisiana Purchase. Village Creek State Park, located in the Crowley's Ridge Area, is known for its fishing, hiking trails, and lush scenery. The King Biscuit Time radio show, the longest running daily radio show in the nation, has broadcast blues music for over 60 years on KKFA in Helena.

The Eastern Arkansas Workforce Investment Area consists of five counties: Crittenden, Cross, Lee, Phillips, and St. Francis. With Tennessee bordering this area to the east, Crittenden County, makes up a portion of the Memphis Metropolitan Statistical Area, the fifty-fifth largest in the United States.

Although there are no four-year colleges in the Area, there are several two-year institutions that offer a variety of programs. Crowley's Ridge Technical Institute and East Arkansas Community College are in Forrest City, Phillips County Community College of the University of Arkansas System is in Helena, and Mid-South Community College is in West Memphis.

Industry

Transportation Equipment Manufacturing is forecast to be the top industry in both net and percent growth with an estimated gain of 356 jobs from 2007 to 2009, or an 84.2 percent increase in employment. Four industries on the top 10 growing industries list are estimated to increase employment by more than 100 jobs. Despite a population decline from 2006 to 2007, Educational Services is estimated to add 169 jobs. The top four fastest growing industries in the Area are manufacturing industries, all growing at a rate faster than 13 percent, making the Area a hub for future manufacturing growth



and activity. Credit Intermediation and Related Activities tops the list of the top 10 declining industries with 24 job losses, while Warehousing and Storage could lose 21 jobs. Wood Product Manufacturing is forecast to be the fastest declining industry with a loss of 17.8 percent of its workforce, while Nonstore Retailers could fall by 13.2 percent.


Occupations

Welders, Cutters, Solderers, and Brazers is estimated to rank number one in both net growth and percent growth with an estimated growth of 53 jobs, or an increase of 39.8 percent. On the top 10 growing occupations list are representatives from nine of the 22 occupational major groups, meaning that no occupational major group is expected to dominate the Area in net growth. However, in terms of percent growth, Construction and Production Occupation groups dominate growth with seven of the top 10 fastest growing occupations in these two major groups. Electricians is forecast to increase employment by 20.4 percent, while First-Line Supervisors/Managers of Production and Operating Workers is ranked third with an 11.5 percent rise in employment. Among the top 10 declining occupations, Stock Clerks and Order Fillers is estimated to lead the Area with a loss of 11 jobs, while Tellers could be a step behind with 10 job losses. Most of the fastest declining occupations listed for the Eastern Arkansas WIA have small employment.







Profile

The North Central Arkansas Workforce Investment Area had a population increase of 2.4 percent or 5,388 new residents from 2003 to 2007. The labor force increased 3.8 percent to 101,625 workers over the five-year period while employment increased by 4.2 percent, or 3,800 workers. Annual unemployment rates fell four-tenths of a percentage point over the five-year period, with the annual unemployment rate for 2007 being 6.5 percent.


The North Central Arkansas WIA has numerous tourist attractions within its borders. Near Mountain View, visitors can tour the underground beauty of Blanchard Springs Caverns and listen to traditional American mountain music at the Ozark Folk Center. Created by a dam in 1964, the 40,000-acre Greers Ferry Lake offers outdoor adventurists plenty of fishing, boating, and camping opportunities. Nearby, the Little Red River flows out of the lake's tailwaters, providing excellent trout fishing. In fact, the world-record brown trout, weighing 40.4 pounds, was caught on the river in 1992. And located in the heart of downtown Searcy, Yarnell's ice cream plant continues to produce the homemade delicacy that made them famous throughout the region.

The North Central Arkansas WIA consists of 10 counties: Cleburne, Fulton, Independence, Izard, Jackson, Sharp, Stone, Van Buren, White, and Woodruff, with Missouri bordering the Area to the north.

The Area is home to three public two-year colleges that are part of the Arkansas State University system with campuses located in Beebe, Newport, and Searcy. The Area is also home to two private four-year institutions, Lyon College in Batesville and Harding University in Searcy. Several community, technical and trade schools, including the UA Community College in Batesville and Ozarka College in Melbourne, round out the Area's educational opportunities.

Industry

The North Central Arkansas WIA is a major player in the Fayetteville Shale activity. During the 2007 to 2009 projection period, the top two industries in both net and percent growth are at the center of this economic activity in the region. Oil and Gas Extraction is projected to add 622 jobs, an increase of 485.9 percent, while Support Activities for Mining could increase by 556 new jobs, or 712.8 percent. This large amount of growth will likely have an impact on every major industry sector in the Area economy, both financially and employment-wise. The top 10 growing industries are expected to add over 100 jobs



each, while the top 10 fastest growing industries in this Area are expected to increase employment by more than 11 percent apiece. Three manufacturing industries claim the top three spots in net and percent decline. Electrical Equipment, Appliance, and Component Manufacturing top both lists with an anticipated loss of 65 jobs, or 18.7 percent of its workforce, and Nonmetallic Mineral Product Manufacturing could drop its employment by close to 15 percent.


Occupations

Rotary Drill Operators, Oil and Gas is projected to be the top growing occupation as well as the fastest growing in the Area with an increase of 169 new jobs, or 650 percent. Half of the top 10 growing occupations are estimated to add over 100 jobs, including Wellhead Pumpers, which is forecast to add 114 jobs. The top four fastest growing occupations, all of which are directly related to Fayetteville Shale activity, are likely to grow by at least 475 percent. Service Unit Operators, Oil, Gas, and Mining is second in percent growth with an estimated increase of 610 percent. The top three declining occupations are in production with Cutting, Punching, and Press Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic topping the list with 89 projected job losses and second in percent decline behind Molding, Coremaking, and Casting Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic, which is forecast to lose 38.5 percent of its workforce. Only three occupations among the top 10 declining or fastest declining occupations are estimated to have more than 10 open positions.






Total Workers by Age North Central Arkansas Workforce Investment Area 2003-2006 (All Ownerships)







Northeast Arkansas WIA

Profile

The population in the Northeast Arkansas Workforce Investment Area increased by 5,362, or 2.2 percent, from 2003 to 2007, while the labor force saw an increase of 4.3 percent, to 119,125 workers, over the same five-year period. Employment also saw an increase in the number of people employed in the Area of 5.4 percent, or 5,725 workers. The annual unemployment rate in 2007 was 6.6 percent, a drop of one percentage point since 2003. The Hemingway-Pfeiffer Museum and Educational Center in Piggott, including the home and barn studio where Ernest Hemingway lived and wrote portions of "A Farewell to Arms," is just one of the many attractions located in the Northeast Arkansas WIA. A unique land formation, one of only two in the world, can be found in Crowley's Ridge State Park near Paragould. Lake Charles, in Powhatan, is one of several lakes in this region, offering camping and fishing. Built in 1888 and restored in the 1970s, the historical Powhatan Courthouse is the main attraction at Powhatan Historic State Park.

The Northeast Arkansas WIA consists of seven counties: Clay, Craighead, Greene, Lawrence, Mississippi, Poinsett, and Randolph, with Missouri bordering the Area to the north and Tennessee to the east. The Jonesboro Metropolitan Statistical Area is located in this Area.

This Area is home to two four-year colleges, one private and one public: Williams Baptist College in Walnut Ridge and Arkansas State University in Jonesboro. The area is also home to three two-year colleges: Crowley's Ridge College, a private college in Paragould; Arkansas Northeastern College in Blytheville; and Black River Technical College in Pocahontas.

Industry

Manufacturing jobs get top billing in the 2007-2009 projections period in the Northeast Arkansas WIA, as the top two growing industries are in that supersector. Food Manufacturing is expected to be the top growing industry with an anticipated growth of 620 jobs, followed by Transportation Equipment Manufacturing with 496 new jobs projected. In all, four manufacturing industries make the top 10 growing industries list. Chemical Manufacturing heads a list of five manufacturing industries in the top 10 fastest growing industries list, with employment projected to increase by 425 percent over the projection period, while Food Manufacturing employment could move upward by 32.1 percent. Fabricated Metal Product Manufacturing heads a list of five durable goods



manufacturing industries in the top 10 declining industries list. This industry could lose 530 jobs or about one-fourth of its workforce in the projection period, while Machinery Manufacturing is forecast to lose 397 jobs. Manufacturing industries hold seven of the 10 places on the fastest declining industries list, with Apparel Manufacturing being estimated to decline the fastest with a loss of 27.8 percent.


Occupations

Retail Salespersons leads all occupations in the Northeast Arkansas WIA in net growth with an estimated increase of 187 jobs. Four occupations, including Registered Nurses, are forecast to add a least 100 jobs between 2007 and 2009. Six production occupations, including the top five, are among the top 10 fastest growing occupations with Mixing and Blending Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders leading the list with an 81.1 percent projected growth. Each of the occupations among the top 10 fastest growing are forecast to increase employment by more than 10 percent. Seven production occupations are among the top 10 declining in the Area, with Cutting, Punching, and Press Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic topping the list with 49 job losses anticipated. Welding, Soldering, and Brazing Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, third in net decline, heads the list of the top 10 fastest declining occupations with an estimated loss of 13.5 percent of its workforce. Four of the top 10 declining and half of the top 10 fastest declining occupations are in the same occupational family, Metal Workers and Plastic Workers.






Northeast Arkansas WIA 2003-2007 Population

Total Workers by Age Northeast Arkansas Workforce Investment Area 2003-2006 (All Ownerships)







Northwest Arkansas WIA

Profile

The Northwest Arkansas Workforce Investment Area has seen Arkansas's largest increase in population at 12.7 percent over the past five years, jumping from 489,829 to 551,925 residents from 2003 to 2007. In turn, the labor force increased 14.6 percent, or by 35,600 workers to 279,525, since 2003 while employment increased 14.7 percent, or by 34,250 workers. The Northwest Arkansas WIA has the lowest unemployment rate in the state. The annual average unemployment rate for 2007 was 4.1 percent, dropping one-tenth of a percentage point over the past five years, with the lowest annual unemployment rate being in 2005 at 3.6 percent.

The Northwest Arkansas WIA has many tourist attractions. Among these are the Buffalo National River and the Prairie Grove Civil War Battlefield. Nestled in the Ozark Mountains, the Area gives visitors a chance to view Rocky Mountain Elk near Ponca while the picturesque city of Eureka Springs offers shopping and unique architecture. Opening in late 2009, the Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art in Bentonville will house a permanent collection of signature works from American artists along with galleries dedicated to regional art, including American Indian art.

The Northwest Arkansas WIA consists of nine counties: Baxter, Benton, Boone, Carroll, Madison, Marion, Newton, Searcy, and Washington. The Area is bordered by two states, Missouri to the north and Oklahoma to the west. The Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers Metropolitan Statistical Area, the sixth fastest growing MSA in the country according to the 2000 Census, is located within this Area. Several large companies, including Wal-Mart and Tyson, are headquartered here along with many trucking companies.

The University of Arkansas, the state's largest public university, is located in Washington County in the city of Fayetteville. It offers a large variety of educational programs ranging from bachelor's degrees to doctoral programs, leading to a variety of job and career opportunities for its graduates. John Brown University, a private four-year university, is located in Siloam Springs. Offering associate degrees and certificate programs, Arkansas State University-Mountain Home, North Arkansas College, and Northwest Arkansas Community College are two-year colleges located in this Area. Industry

Management of Companies and Enterprises is estimated to add the most new jobs with 1,388 anticipated between 2007 and 2009. Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents



and Brokers, which deals with the wholesale trade of goods through electronic means, is also projected to increase employment by more than 1,300 jobs, or an increase of 70.6 percent, making it the fastest growing industry in the Northwest Arkansas WIA. A rise in construction of hotels in the Area could drive employment in the Accommodation industry up sharply at a rate of 34.8 percent. Electrical Equipment, Appliance, and Component Manufacturing is projected to lose 282 jobs over the two year period, or a loss of 31 percent of its workforce, making it the top industry in both net and percent decline.


Occupations

Retail Salespersons is estimated to be the top growing occupation in Northwest Arkansas with a growth of 481 jobs. Jobs in restaurants, hotels, and retail sales establishments are all found within the top 10 growing occupations. Hotel, Motel, and Resort Desk Clerks are projected to add an additional 35 percent to its workforce due to new hotels locating in the area. Four of the top 10 fastest growing occupations are in management or supervisory positions, with Lodging Managers projected to lead the list at 33.7 percent. All of the fastest growing occupations found in the Northwest Arkansas WIA are estimated to increase by more than 10 percent. Two occupations, Cutting, Punching, and Press Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic; and Industrial Truck and Tractor Operators, lead the top declining occupations list with 45 anticipated job losses each. Overall, seven of the top 10 declining occupations, are in either production/manufacturing or transportation/ material moving industries. Seven of the top 10 fastest declining occupations, including the top five, are in production with Sewing Machine Operators topping the list at 8.5 percent.











Southeast Arkansas WIA

Profile

The Southeast Arkansas Workforce Investment Area had the largest decrease in population for the state from 2003 to 2007, losing 6,870 residents. But both labor force and employment increased by 1.9 percent, or by 1,900 and 1,750 workers, respectively. The annual unemployment rate for 2007 was 7.7 percent, remaining the same for each year of the five-year period except in 2005 when the rate dropped to 7.4 percent.

Several attractions can be found in the Southeast Arkansas WIA. In Gillett, the Arkansas Post Museum, the first capital of the Arkansas Territory, explores the history of and life on the Grand Prairie and the Delta. Lake Chicot, near Lake Village, is Arkansas's largest natural lake and the largest natural oxbow lake in the nation, offering excellent fishing opportunities. The Arkansas River flows into the Mississippi River near Arkansas City, while Stuttgart is home to the World Championship Duck Calling Contest each fall.

The Southeast Arkansas WIA consists of 10 counties: Arkansas, Ashley, Bradley, Chicot, Cleveland, Desha, Drew, Grant, Jefferson, and Lincoln. Two states border the Southeast Arkansas WIA, with Louisiana to the south and Mississippi to the east; and the Pine Bluff Metropolitan Statistical Area is located in this Area.

Two campuses of the University of Arkansas system are in the Area; one in Pine Bluff, and the other in Monticello. Southeast Arkansas College, a two-year institution, is also located in Pine Bluff. Also, two campuses of Phillips County Community College, affiliated with the University of Arkansas System, are located in the Arkansas County cities of DeWitt and Stuttgart. This gives students a variety of choices for their academic studies.

Industry

During the 2007 to 2009 projection period, eight of the top 10 growing industries are forecast to grow by more than 100 jobs. Educational Services is estimated to be the top growing industry in the Area with a gain of 367 new jobs. The second top growing industry, Ambulatory Health Care Services, could increase staff by 185. The state and local government sectors are both predicted to increase with a combined total of 174 new jobs. Chemical Manufacturing heads the list of the top 10 fastest growing industries with an estimated increase of 17.1 percent, while Warehousing and Storage is following close behind with a gain of 10 percent. Wood Product Manufacturing is projected to lose the most jobs in the Southeast Arkansas WIA with a loss of 372 jobs. Two other industries, Paper



Manufacturing and Apparel Manufacturing, are forecast to lose more than 135 jobs each, but losses of 20.2 percent would put Apparel Manufacturing as the fastest declining industry in the Area.


Occupations

Correctional Officers and Jailers is forecast to add the most jobs in the Southeast Arkansas WIA with 93 jobs to be added over the 2007 to 2009 projection period, while Registered Nurses is projected to be second with 61 new jobs on the horizon. The Southeast Arkansas WIA is the only Area in the state where Licensed Practical and Licensed Vocational Nurses made the top 10 list, increasing employment by 30. Even with the Area having the largest decrease in population from 2006 to 2007, healthcare jobs continue to be among the fastest growing occupations. Personal and Home Care Aides top the fastest growing occupations list with an estimated increase of 7.9 percent, while Emergency Medical Technicians and Paramedics could add an additional 7.7 percent to its workforce. All 10 of the top declining occupations, expected to lose at least 24 jobs each, are involved in production or material moving, with Helpers-Production Workers leading the list with 83 job losses during the period. Following close behind, is Laborers and Freight, Stock, and Material Movers, Hand with a forecast of 81 job losses. Tool Grinders, Filers, and Sharpeners is forecast to be the fastest declining occupation with a decrease of 20 percent of its workforce. Seven of the 10 occupations on the list are estimated to decrease at a rate of more than 10.5 percent. Six of the top 10 declining occupations are in production and all should have minimal openings available.











Southwest Arkansas WIA

Profile

The Southwest Arkansas Workforce Investment Area decreased in population by 3,313, or lost 1.4 percent of its residents from 2003 to 2007. The labor force still increased by 1.8 percent to 108,175 workers, while employment increased by 2.2 percent or by 2,150 workers over the five-year period. The annual unemployment rate for the Southwest Arkansas WIA in 2007 was 6.0 percent, decreasing three-tenths of a percentage point over the five-year period.


The Southwest Arkansas WIA contains some of the finest attractions in Arkansas. The Arkansas Museum of Natural Resources in Smackover revisits the industrial and social history associated with the oil boom of the 1920s. The South Arkansas Arboretum State Park in El Dorado preserves exotic plants and flowering species native to the West Gulf Coastal Plain region of the United States. And the City of Hope, the center for watermelon production in Arkansas, was ranked 16th in the nation in total poundage in 2005. The area is known for producing large watermelons, with a 268.8-pound watermelon recorded in 2005 and certified by the Guinness Book of World Records in 2006.

The Southwest Arkansas WIA is the largest workforce area in the state in terms of the number of counties represented. Twelve counties are located within this region: Calhoun, Columbia, Dallas, Hempstead, Howard, Lafayette, Little River, Miller, Nevada, Ouachita, Sevier, and Union. Three states border the Area: Oklahoma to the west, Texas to the southwest, and Louisiana to the south. Miller County is part of the Texarkana AR/TX Metropolitan Statistical Area.

Several educational opportunities are available in the Southwest Arkansas WIA. Southern Arkansas University in Magnolia is the only four-year college, while Cossatot Community College, University of Arkansas Community College at Hope, South Arkansas Community College, and Southern Arkansas University-Tech are all two-year colleges located in this Area.

Industry

Truck Transportation is forecast to lead the Area in net growth with a gain of 522 jobs between 2007 and 2009. Educational Services is estimated to increase jobs by 331, while Fabricated Metal Product Manufacturing is predicted to add 314 to its workforce. Every industry on the top 10 growing industries list is projected to add more than 110 jobs. A continued presence of the Mining Industry in Southwest Arkansas is predicted with the top two fastest growing industries of Oil and Gas Extraction and Support Activities for Mining, to grow at an estimated rate of 46.5 and 38.6 percent, respectively. Six of the



10 fastest growing industries are forecast to do so at a rate greater than 10 percent. Transportation Equipment Manufacturing is projected to lead the Area in both net and percent decline with a loss of 252 jobs, or 29.6 percent of its workforce. Three other industries, all in manufacturing, are estimated to decrease employment by more than 60 jobs. Hospital staffing is forecast to decline by 54 jobs, corresponding to an Area population loss between 2006 and 2007. Besides Transportation Equipment Manufacturing, five other manufacturing industries are among the fastest declining in the Southwest Arkansas WIA, including Nonmetallic Mineral Product Manufacturing, which anticipates a loss of 11.7 percent.

Occupations

Truck Drivers, Heavy and Tractor Trailer is projected to top the list of the top 10 growing occupations with a gain of 433 jobs. A distant second is Bookkeeping, Accounting, and Auditing Clerks with an increase of 76 jobs. Although not a part of the Fayetteville Shale, the Area has a strong oil and gas presence as the top four fastest growing occupations are related to oil and natural gas with Derrick Operators, Oil and Gas leading at 40 percent. Eight of the 10 fastest growing occupations are predicted to do so at a rate faster than 12 percent, but the four oil and gas occupations are projected to grow at rates faster than 25 percent. Seven of the top 10 declining occupations are in either production or material moving with Machine Feeders and Offbearers leading the list with 35 job losses. All 10 of the top declining occupations are forecast to lose more than 10 jobs. Cutting, Punching, and Press Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic is forecast to be the fastest declining occupation in the Southwest Arkansas WIA with a loss of 11 percent of its workforce. Four of the occupations are in the office and administrative support family with File Clerks losing an estimated 8.3 percent.

Population 2003-2007











West Central Arkansas WIA

Profile -

The West Central Arkansas Workforce Investment Area has seen a population increase of 4.2 percent, or 12,375 residents, from 2003 to 2007. During the same time period, the labor force saw an increase of 11,250 workers to 146,375, or 8.3 percent, while employment saw an increase of 11,775 workers, or 9.3 percent. The average unemployment rate for 2007 was 5.2 percent, with the rate dropping eight-tenths of a percentage point over the fiveyear period.

The West Central Arkansas WIA contains unbelievable natural resources for recreational use, including multiple lakes and mountains. Petit Jean State Park, located near Morrilton, is home to Cedar Falls, the tallest continuous flowing waterfall in the state. The Crater of Diamonds State Park, located in Murfreesboro, is recognized as the only public diamond mine in the world where you keep what you find. Visitors found 252.73 total carats in 2007. Hot Springs is also a center for tourism with its famous Bathhouse Row, a theme park, and other historic attractions.

The West Central Arkansas WIA consists of 10 counties: Clark, Conway, Garland, Hot Spring, Johnson, Montgomery, Perry, Pike, Pope, and Yell; with the Hot Springs Metropolitan Statistical Area located within the WIA.

The Area has several four-year colleges: Arkansas Tech University in Russellville; Henderson State University and Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia; and the University of the Ozarks in Clarksville. There are also a number of two-year community and technical colleges in the Area: National Park Community College in Hot Springs; a campus of the University of Arkansas Community College System in Morrilton; and Ouachita Technical College in Malvern.

Industry

Educational Services is expected to be the top growing industry in the Area with 472 new jobs projected to be added between 2007 and 2009. Every industry on the Area's top 10 growing industries list is projected to add over 120 new jobs. Support Activities for Transportation is projected to lead the list of the top 10 fastest growing industries at an estimated rate of 44.3 percent. A distant second and one of only two Goods-Producing industries on the list, Beverage and Tobacco Product Manufacturing should gain 14.7 percent. The Hospital industry has seen a




staffing decline since the summer of 2005 and could continue that trend during the projection period with 262 job losses, making it the top declining industry in the Area. Primary Metal Manufacturing and Machinery Manufacturing are estimated to lose 172 and 129 jobs, respectively. Chemical Manufacturing, although small, is likely to lose an estimated 20 percent of its workforce, making it the fastest declining industry. Four industries, all Goodsproducing, are anticipating losses of more than 10 percent.

Occupations

Retail Salespersons is forecast to be the top growing occupation in the Area, with 159 jobs anticipated, but the occupation also has an extremely high turnover rate. Four occupations are expected to add over 100 jobs over the next two years. Transportation-related occupations are among the top 10 fastest growing with Aircraft Mechanics and Service Technicians leading the list with an anticipated growth rate of 35.6 percent, while Cargo and Freight Agents could increase by 34 percent. Half of the top 10 fastest growing occupations are projected to increase employment by more than 10 percent. Tellers is projected to increase by 6.8 percent but is forecast to have the highest turnover among the top 10 fastest growth occupations. Packers and Packagers, Hand, is forecast to lose 45 jobs over the 2007 to 2009 projection period, making it the top declining occupation in the area and eighth in fastest decline at 5.5 percent. Electrical and Electronic Equipment Assemblers leads the top 10 fastest declining occupations list with an estimated loss of 10.8 percent.


Population 2003-2007









Profile

The Western Arkansas Workforce Investment Area had a population increase of 3.7 percent, or 8,922 residents, from 2003 to 2007. Over the same five-year period, the labor force increased by 9.9 percent to 123,400 workers in 2007, while employment increased by 10 percent, or by 10,675 workers. The annual unemployment rate for 2007 was 5.1 percent with annual averages fluctuating over the five-year period with a rate of 5.2 percent in 2003 to 4.3 percent in 2005.

The Western Arkansas WIA is home to the two highest mountain peaks in Arkansas; Mount Magazine near Paris and Rich Mountain at the Queen Wilhelmina State Park near Mena. The Cossatot River, an American Indian word for "skull crusher," provides some of the most challenging whitewater rafting in the state. Settled by Swiss and German immigrants in the 1880s, Altus has become the wine capital of Arkansas, producing several award-winning wines from grapes grown in the Boston Mountains. Area visitors can also see an eight-foot tall statue of Popeye in Alma, the self-proclaimed "spinach capital of the world."

The Western Arkansas WIA consists of six counties: Crawford, Franklin, Logan, Polk, Scott, and Sebastian; and is bordered to the west by Oklahoma. The Arkansas portion of the Fort Smith Metropolitan Statistical Area is located in the Western Arkansas WIA.

The Area is home to the University of Arkansas at Fort Smith, a four-year public university located in Sebastian County. Offering associate degrees and certificates, Rich Mountain Community College in Mena and Arkansas Tech-Ozark are two-year colleges located in this Area, providing residents with a range of educational options.

Industry

Mining in the Western Arkansas WIA is projected to see strong growth over the 2007 to 2009 projection period. Support Activities for Mining leads the top 10 growing industries with a projected growth of 590 new jobs, and is second in percent growth with a 38.6 percent growth rate. Transportation Equipment Manufacturing is second in net job growth with an estimated 437 new jobs due in large part to an emerging presence of the manufacturing of boats, ships, and other water-based transportation products. All three mining industries are among the top 10 fastest growing industries in the region. Oil and Gas Extraction is forecast to top this list at 50.9 percent, while Mining (except Oil and Gas) is predicted to increase




workers by 16.2 percent. Six manufacturing industries are among the top 10 declining industries in the region with Food Manufacturing at the top of this list with a projected loss of 818 jobs. Electrical Equipment, Appliance, and Component Manufacturing is second in net decline with an anticipated loss of 548 jobs, or a 9.9 percent decline, making it the fastest declining industry in the Western Arkansas WIA.

Occupations

Rotary Drill Operators, Oil and Gas, is projected to be the top growing occupation in the Area with an estimated growth of 206 jobs. Retail Salespersons and Truck Drivers, Heavy and Tractor-Trailer are forecast to add over 150 jobs each. Activity related to oil and gas extraction dominates the top 10 fastest growing occupations list. Wellhead Pumpers tops the list at 51.6 percent, while Service Unit Operators, Oil, Gas, and Mining is predicted to increase employment by 39.3 percent. Meat, Poultry, and Fish Cutters and Trimmers is forecast to lead the list of declining occupations with a loss of 164 jobs. In all, the top three declining occupations are estimated to lose at least 120 jobs each. Weighers, Measurers, Checkers, and Samplers, Recordkeeping is projected to be the fastest declining occupation in the Western Arkansas WIA with an 11.8 percent loss in employment with Electrical and Electronic Equipment Assemblers following close behind with an 11 percent decline. Eight of the top 10 fastest declining occupations are in either production or office and administrative support jobs.

Western Arkansas WIA Population 2003-2007







