POPULATION SERVED/RECRUITMENT: This project will serve 200 recently released non-violent exoffenders. Participants will be recruited from the Colorado Department of Corrections and a limited number from the Federal Correctional Institution.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION: This project is collaboration among community-based agency and lead grantee, The Empowerment Program, and six faith-based agencies – DenverWorks, Turnabout, Friends in Transition, Metropolitan Community Church, The Road Called STRATE, and New Foundations. The faith-based agencies, which are also the project's sub-grantees, are located in geographically diverse parts of the Denver metropolitan area to give participants a choice of service provider. The project will offer the following services: educational services/hard skills training; employment services; mentoring; coordination of overall service strategies; housing services; and substance abuse treatment, health and social services.

NON-FEDERAL MATCH: Non-federal resources totaling \$184,450 as follows: Empowerment Program (\$14,200) for hygiene kits for male and female participants and 25 adult volunteers providing 50 hours of tutoring to 15 participants; Turnabout (\$25,250) for bicycles for 50 participants, eye glasses and eye exams for 75 participants, clothing for 200 participants, and driver's license assistance (teaching/practice/testing) for 30 participants; Friends in Transition (\$80,000) for volunteer services; DenverWorks (\$25,000) for clothing and food; Metropolitan Community Church (\$10,000) for food and operating costs; New Foundations (\$10,000) for operating costs; The Road Called STRATE (\$10,000) for volunteers; and Addiction Research Treatment Services (\$10,000) for methadone and other drug treatment services.

SUB-GRANTEES: The budget information sheet indicates \$384,700 in contractual expenses. The following six sub-grantees and services are identified; however, specific dollar amounts were not provided: 1) The Road Called STRATE will provide employment and mentoring services, as well as classes in anger management, substance abuse and HIV prevention, and an on-site clothing and food bank; 2) New Foundations will provide mentoring services, including conflict resolution training; 3) Friends in Transition will provide a mentoring/reintegration program; 4) DenverWorks will provide job preparation, life skills training, and job placement; 5) Turnabout, Inc. will provide career and educational opportunities, job search assistance, and soft skills training; and 6) Metropolitan Community Church will connect participants to its JobStart program and provide housing referrals, clothing, specialized services for participants living with HIV/AIDS, and food for 150 households per week.

PARTNERS: Sub-grantees above, plus the Workforce Investment Board of Denver; Independent Electrical Contractors Association; Materials Handling Equipment Company; Chase Lumber Company; Denver Metro Convention and Visitor's Bureau; Community College of Aurora; Emily Griffith Opportunity School; Community College of Denver; Metro Denver Housing Initiative; Colorado Housing Now!; Colorado Coalition for the Homeless; Colorado Association of Drug and Alcohol Service Providers; Denver Drug Strategy Task Force; U.S. Bank; Federal Bureau of Prisons; and the Department of Corrections.
