We fulfill this mission by identifying criminal activities and eliminating vulnerabilities that pose a threat to our nation's borders, as well as enforcing economic, transportation and infrastructure security.

**Investigations** - enforces federal statutes within the U.S. and coordinates and supports all international ICE investigative activities involving national and visa security, illegal arms exports, financial and smuggling violations, immigration and customs fraud, human trafficking, identity and benefit fraud, child pornography and sex tourism.

**Detention and Removal Operations** - tasked with ensuring that every alien who has been ordered removed departs the U.S. through fair enforcement of the nation's immigration laws and coordination with foreign governments to ensure countries will accept removable aliens.

## **FY 2007 Enhancements (Actual):** (\$ in thousands)

• Custody Management (\$241,000 280 FTE) –An estimated 6,700 additional beds would be brought on line to process an additional 100,000 apprehended aliens. Additional positions are funded to support the entire detention and removal process.

#### Fiscal Year 2007 cont.

- **Transportation and Removal (\$94,100)** Funding would cover costs associated with the expansion of expedited removal procedures.

Other programs seeking enhancements in support of the Secure Border Initiative are:

- Compliance......\$10,017 27 FTE

  Resources support a significant expansion of the Compliance Enforcement Unit (CEU), a
  critical component of ICE investigative support that looks into potential immigration violations.

Other programs seeking enhancements to support effective ICE operations are:

- Procurement.....\$3,600 16 FTE

Each year, ICE procurement acquisition operations total \$1.9 billion. Resources would expand the ability of ICE to effectively manage procurement operations through new positions. Additional positions are consistent with recent recommendations of the General Accountability Office which

found that ICE and other DHS components need to increase procurement management capacity.

## # ICE #

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement was established in March 2003 as the largest investigative arm of the Department of Homeland Security. ICE is comprised of four integrated divisions that form a 21st century law enforcement agency with broad responsibilities for a number of key homeland security priorities.
