## Consumer Price Index for Food and Energy Boston-Brockton-Nashua, MA-NH-ME-CT June 2009

Energy costs in the Boston metropolitan area rose 8.1 percent in June 2009, according to the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics. The June increase was largely attributable to higher gasoline prices, up 15.5 percent over the month, the largest one-month increase in Boston since April 2006. Regional Commissioner Denis M. McSweeney noted that, despite the monthly advance, consumers in the Boston area faced energy prices in June 2009 that were 32.9 percent lower than those the year before.

Over the month, the index for gasoline (all types) rose 15.5 percent, the sixth consecutive monthly advance. Before increasing by 2.8 percent in January, gas prices in Boston fell 57.8 percent between the peak level in June and December 2008. The price of a gallon of gasoline in Boston increased 35 cents to \$2.617 in June. Despite the monthly increase, Boston area drivers have seen prices at the pump fall by 35.7 percent over the year.

In the other energy categories, electricity prices rose 1.1 percent over the month and utility (piped) gas service edged down 0.3 percent. Over the year, electricity prices were slightly higher, up 0.5 percent from last June while utility (piped) gas prices fell sharply, down 52.9 percent, the largest drop recorded since data became available in 1971. In June, the Boston energy index on the 1982-84 base was 195.182, meaning that Boston area consumers would have to spend \$19.52 for selected energy items that cost \$10.00 in 1982-84.

The cost of groceries, as measured by the food at home index, fell 0.8 percent over the month. Grocery prices in Boston have decreased in five of the last six months, but were still 2.4 percent higher than they were last June.

NOTE: Local area CPI indexes are the by-products of the national CPI program. Since each local area index is a small subset of the national index, it has a smaller sample size and is therefore subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than that for the national index. In addition, local indexes are not adjusted for seasonal factors. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility compared with the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar.
