EMPLOYMENT COST INDEX—JUNE 2007

Total compensation costs for civilian workers increased 0.9 percent from March to June 2007, seasonally adjusted, the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor reported today. This was about the same as the 0.8 percent increase for the December 2006 to March 2007 period. Wages and salaries rose 0.8 percent from March to June 2007, compared with 1.1 percent for the previous quarter. Benefit costs increased 1.3 percent, up from 0.1 percent during the previous three-month period. The Employment Cost Index (ECI), a component of the National Compensation Survey, measures quarterly changes in compensation costs, which include wages, salaries, and employer costs for employee benefits for civilian workers (nonfarm private industry and state and local government).

Wage and salary costs, which account for 70 percent of total civilian compensation costs, were responsible for 63 percent of the increase in compensation costs for this quarter. In state and local government, wages and salaries make up 67 percent of total compensation but were responsible for only 47 percent of the increase in compensation. Benefit increases in state and local government accounted for a larger portion of the change this quarter due primarily to increases in defined benefit retirement plans and health benefits.

Quarterly changes, seasonally adjusted

For private industry, compensation costs rose 0.9 percent from March to June 2007, compared to 0.6 percent for the prior quarter, while state and local government costs increased 1.1 percent, compared to 1.3 percent for the quarter ended March 2007. (See tables A and 1.)

Wages and salaries for private industry workers increased 0.8 percent, compared with 1.1 percent for the previous quarter. In state and local government, the increase was 0.8 percent, compared with 0.9 percent in the prior quarter. (See tables A and 2.)

Benefit costs for private industry rose sharply by 1.1 percent, compared to a decline of 0.3 percent the previous quarter. For state and local government, benefit costs increased 1.7 percent, compared to 2.1 percent in the previous quarter. (See tables A and 3.)

Over-the-year changes, not seasonally adjusted

Annual compensation costs for civilian workers increased 3.3 percent for the year ended June 2007, compared with a 3.0 percent increase for the year ended June 2006. In private industry, compensation costs rose 3.1 percent in the year ended June 2007. In June 2006, the increase was 2.8 percent. For state and local government, the yearly increase for June 2007 was 4.8 percent, higher than the June 2006 increase of 3.8 percent.

The components of compensation differed in their rate of change. While increases in wages and salaries for civilian workers accelerated, benefit cost increases stayed the same. Wages and salaries rose 3.4 percent for civilian workers for the year ended June 2007, greater than the 2.8 percent gain for June 2006. Despite remaining the same for civilian workers at 3.4 percent, benefit cost increases differed significantly between private industry and state and local government. Private industry benefits increased 2.6 percent, about the same as the 2.7 percent increase in June 2006, while state and local government benefits rose 6.6 percent, up from 5.5 percent. (See tables B, 8, and 12.)

Nonfarm private industry

For the year ended June 2007, compensation costs increased 2.6 percent for goods-producing industries, compared to a 2.3 percent increase in June 2006. Compensation cost increases for manufacturing remained low, at 1.9 percent for the year ended June 2007, the same for the year ended June 2006. Compensation costs for the construction industry rose 3.9 percent, compared to 3.5 percent for the previous year. (See table 5.)

The over-the-year increase for June 2007 in compensation costs for service-providing industries was 3.3 percent. In June 2006, the increase was 2.9 percent. Among the major industries, compensation gains ranged from 2.8 percent in financial activities and the trade, transportation, and utilities industries to 4.6 percent in the leisure and hospitality industry. (See table 5.)

Among private industry occupational groups, over-the-year compensation gains ranged from 2.2 percent for production, transportation, and material moving to 3.6 percent for service occupations. (See table 5.)

Compensation costs for union workers advanced 2.1 percent for the year ended June 2007. This was outpaced by nonunion workers, which increased 3.3 percent for the same 12-month period. Wages and salaries for union workers increased 2.5 percent for the 12-month period ended June 2007, less than that for

nonunion workers, which rose 3.4 percent. Benefit costs for union workers rose 1.4 percent for the 12-month period, which were also less than benefit cost increases for nonunion workers, which rose 2.8 percent. (See tables C, 6, 10, and 12.)

State and local government

For the year ended June 2007, wages and salaries for state and local government workers rose 3.8 percent compared to 3.1 percent a year ago. For benefits, costs increased 6.6 percent compared to 5.5 percent for the previous year. Hospitals had the largest increase in wages and salaries, rising to 5.0 percent from 2.8 percent a year earlier. Public administration wages and salaries increased 4.1 percent, up from 2.8 percent while education services wages and salaries increased 3.5 percent compared to 3.0 percent the year earlier. (See tables B, 11, and 12.)

Over-the-year changes in wages and salaries, constant dollars, not seasonally adjusted

After adjusting for the changes in the prices of consumer goods and services, wages and salaries for civilian workers increased 0.7 percent for the 12-month period ended June 2007, compared to a decrease of 1.3 percent for the 12-month period ending June 2006. The private industry increase was 0.7 percent compared to a decrease of 1.5 percent for the year ending June 2006. State and local government registered a 1.0 percent increase, compared to a decrease of 1.2 percent for the previous year. (See table D.)

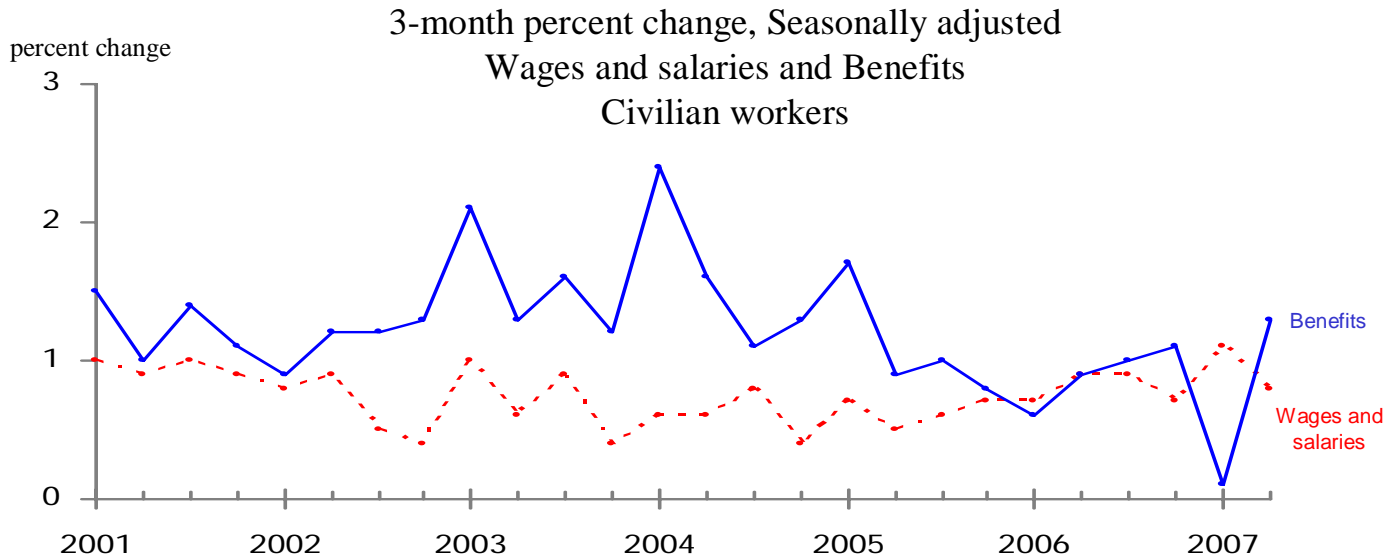

TECHNICAL NOTE

The Employment Cost Index (ECI) is a measure of the change in the cost of labor, free from the influence of employment shifts among occupations and industries. The compensation series includes changes in wages and salaries and employer costs for employee benefits. The wage and salary series and the benefit cost series provide the changes for the two components of compensation.

Wages and salaries are defined as the hourly straight-time wage rate or, for workers not paid on an hourly basis, straight-time earnings divided by the corresponding hours. Straight-time wage and salary rates are total earnings before payroll deductions, excluding premium pay for overtime and for work on weekends and holidays, shift differentials, and nonproduction bonuses such as lump-sum payments provided in lieu of wage increases. Production bonuses, incentive earnings, commission payments, and cost-of-living adjustments are included in straight-time wage and salary rates.

Benefits covered by the ECI are: Paid leave—vacations, holidays, sick leave, and other leave; supplemental pay—premium pay for work in addition to the regular work schedule (such as overtime, weekends, and holidays), shift differentials, and nonproduction bonuses (such as referral bonuses and attendance bonuses); insurance benefits—life, health, short-term disability, and long-term disability; retirement and savings benefits—defined benefit and defined contribution plans; and legally required benefits—Social Security, Medicare, federal and state unemployment insurance, and workers' compensation.

Additional series on “excluding incentive paid occupations” were introduced with the release of the March 2006 estimates. These series allow users to better understand underlying trends in compensation by removing quarter-to-quarter variability that is related to the way workers are paid. For more information, see the article, “The Role of Incentive Pay in the Volatility of the Employment Cost Index” in the Summer 2001 issue of *Compensation and Working Conditions*.

The ECI provides data for the civilian economy, which includes the total private nonfarm economy excluding private households, and the public sector excluding the federal government. The private industry series and the state and local government series provide data for the two sectors separately.

Sample establishments are classified by industry categories based on the 2002 North American Industry Classification system (NAICS). Within a sample establishment, specific job categories are selected and classified into about 800 occupational classifications according to the 2000 Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system. Individual occupations are combined to represent one of ten intermediate aggregations, such as professional and related occupations, or one of five higher-level aggregations such as management, professional, and related occupations. Both the NAICS and the SOC classification systems are defined by the US Office of Management and Budget. For more detailed information on NAICS and SOC, including background definitions, see the BLS Web sites: www.bls.gov/bls/naics.htm and www.bls.gov/soc/home.htm.

To be included in the ECI, employees in occupations must receive cash payments from the establishment for services performed and the establishment must pay the employer's portion of Medicare taxes on that individual's wages. Major exclusions from the survey are the self-employed, individuals who set their own pay (for example, proprietors, owners, major stockholders, and partners in unincorporated firms), volunteers, unpaid workers, family members being paid token wages, individuals receiving long-term disability compensation, and U.S. citizens working overseas.

Data for the June 2007 quarter were collected from a probability sample of approximately 58,400 occupational observations within about 12,300 sample establishments in private industry and approximately 3,500 occupations within about 800 sample establishments in state and local governments. Data are collected for the pay period including the 12th day of the survey months of March, June, September, and December.

Fixed employment weights are used each quarter to calculate the most aggregate series—civilian, private, and state and local government. These fixed weights are also used to derive all of the industry and occupational series indexes. Beginning with March 2006 estimates, 2002 fixed employment weights from the Bureau's Occupational Employment Statistics survey were introduced. From March 1995 to December 2005, 1990 employment counts were used.

For the series based on bargaining status, census region and division, metropolitan area status, and for series excluding incentive paid occupations, fixed employment data are not available. The employment weights are reallocated within these series each quarter based on the current ECI sample. The nursing care facilities indexes in private industry are estimated using fixed-employment weights derived from staffing patterns estimated from the four-digit industry NAICS group 6231, nursing care facilities, a sub-industry of the larger industry group, nursing and residential care facilities (NAICS 623). The indexes for these series, consequently, are not strictly comparable with those for the aggregate, occupational, and industry series. A fuller explanation

of the calculation of index numbers appears in chapter 8 of the *BLS Handbook of Methods*, at the web site www.bls.gov/opub/hom/pdf/homch8.pdf.

Beginning with the release of the March 2006 data, indexes were rebased to December 2005 = 100 from June 1989 = 100. The percentage changes shown in the current- and constant-dollar historical tables were calculated from the rebased indexes. Thus, changes may differ from those originally published because of rounding.

The ECI sample consists of 151 metropolitan areas and nonmetropolitan areas that represent the Nation's 326 metropolitan statistical areas as defined by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget in 1994 and the remaining portions of the 50 states. Metropolitan areas are defined as Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) or Consolidated Metropolitan Statistical Areas (CMSAs). Nonmetropolitan areas are counties and other geographic designations that do not fit the metropolitan area definition.

Seasonally adjusted data for selected ECI series began with the December 1990 ECI release. Seasonal adjustment removes the effects of events that follow a more or less regular pattern each year. These adjustments make nonseasonal patterns easier to identify. The seasonal adjustment factors are recalculated once per year. The March release contains data reflecting the newly updated seasonal adjustment factors. The historical data for the last five years are then revised based on the newly estimated factors. The seasonal factors for 2007 and revised seasonally adjusted indexes for the past 5 years are available at www.bls.gov/ect or upon request. Several new seasonally adjusted indexes and 3-month percent changes of occupational series were added in March 2007, with historical data available beginning with March 2002. Seasonally adjusted data for the series that were discontinued in March 2007 are no longer available, except for the historical data ending with December 2006.

The ECI private industry sample is rotated over approximately 5 years, which makes the sample more representative of the economy and reduces respondent burden. The sample is replaced on a cross-area, cross-industry basis.

Because the ECI is a sample survey, it is subject to sampling errors. Sampling errors are differences that occur between the results computed from a sample of observations and those computed from all observations in the population. The estimates derived from different samples selected using the same sample design may differ from one other. A measure of the variation among these differing estimates is the standard error. It can be used to measure the precision with which an estimate from a particular sample approximates the expected result of all possible samples. The chances are about 68 out of 100 that an estimate from the survey differs from a complete population figure by less than the standard error. The chances are about 90 out of 100 that this difference would be less than 1.6 times the standard error. The statements of comparisons appearing in this publication are significant at a 1.6 standard error level or better, unless otherwise indicated. This means that for differences cited, the estimated difference is greater than 1.6 times the standard error of the difference.

The ECI uses standard errors to evaluate published series. To assist users in ascertaining the reliability of series, the standard errors for all estimates (excluding seasonally adjusted series) are available on the BLS Web site at www.bls.gov/ect shortly after the publication of the news release.

When determining data to be used in contract negotiations, it is important to note that differences by bargaining status may be due to factors other than union status, such as occupational and industry mix. An important consideration when choosing a series for escalation is the sampling error. For more information, see www.bls.gov/ect/escalator.htm.

Historical ECI data, using industry categories based on the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) System and classifying jobs into occupational classifications according to the Census of Population, are available dating from the first publication of each series to December 2005 at: www.bls.gov/web/echistry.pdf. In addition, constant-dollar ECI series derived from the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) are available. The constant-dollar series are calculated by converting the CPI-U to the same base as the ECI. The ECI for each quarter is then divided by the converted CPI-U for the same reference period. The CPI-U U.S. City Average All Items is used to compute all series except for the regional estimates, which use corresponding CPI regional data. Historical data, using industry categories based on the SIC and classifying

occupations according to the Census of Population, are available dating from the first publication of each series to December 2005 at: www.bls.gov/web/econst.pdf. Data are also available for series based on the 2002 NAICS and the 2000 SOC beginning in March 2001, and using the December 2005 = 100 base period at: www.bls.gov/web/econstnaics.pdf.

Supplemental data from the ECI, providing 12-month percent changes in employer costs for health insurance in private industry, are also available at www.bls.gov/ect/sp/echealth.pdf beginning with June 1982.

Several changes to the ECI were introduced with the March 2006 estimates. First, the industry and occupational classification systems, which impacts comparability between old and new series, were changed. Second, methodological changes to the imputation procedure, which is needed when respondents do not provide all the data needed, were introduced. Third, fixed employment weights were updated. Fourth, the index numbers were rebased to December 2005 = 100. Fifth, improvements to the seasonally adjusted process were introduced. Finally, two benefits—severance pay and supplemental unemployment insurance benefits—were discontinued. The costs per hour worked of compensation components, based on data from the ECI, are published in a separate news release titled "Employer Costs for Employee Compensation." Also available are historical data in a summary document from March 1986 through March 2002 on the BLS Web site at www.bls.gov/ect or upon request. Data on a quarterly basis from June 2002 through March 2007 also are available. Data for September 2007 are scheduled for release at 10:00 AM EDT on Thursday, September 20, 2007. The cost levels are calculated with current employment weights rather than the fixed weights used in computing the ECI. Therefore, year-to-year changes in the cost levels usually differ from those in the ECI.
