Dear Congressman Davis:

In accordance with Section 647(b) of Division F of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, fiscal year (FY) 2004, P.L. 108-199, the Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Report to Congress on FY 2007 Competitive Sourcing Efforts is enclosed.

In FY 2007, USDA announced two competitive sourcing studies for 129 full-time equivalent employees (FTE) that are still ongoing. No competitive sourcing studies were completed in FY 2007. Several feasibility studies are also ongoing that may lead to competitions in FY 2008. USDA estimates these competitions will include approximately 69T FTE. See Enclosure A for additional information regarding announced competitions without performance decisions.

USDA continues to use competitive sourcing as a management tool to improve the effectiveness of its workforce. An example is the Forest Service (FS) public-private competition of Information Technology services completed in FY 2005 which is projected to save \$146.7 million over five years. As a result of this competition, FS realized actual savings of \$21.6 million in FY 2007 and \$56.8 million in cumulative savings since FY 2005. USDA continues to implement the Competitive Sourcing Initiative as part of the President's Management Agenda in a fair and equitable manner, focusing on broader, more strategic groupings of related functional areas.

However, to sustain continued progress, we urge the elimination of the restrictive language in the Agriculture Appropriations acts, which prohibits competitive sourcing activity for rural development or farm loan support personnel. In addition, the prohibitor in the Interior Appropriations Act that restricts the amount of resources the FS may spend on competitive sourcing should also be eliminated.

## United States Department of Agriculture Report to Congress on Fiscal Year (FY) 2007 Competitive Sourcing Initiative Activities

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) continues to refine its competitive sourcing process and procedures to maximize the initiative's impact and results. This ensures that functions selected for public-private competition will result in an implemented organization that operates with lower costs and increased efficiencies. In addition, USDA recently developed guidance for post-competition accountability reviews and tracking, including the Office of Management and Budget requirement for the independent validation of a reasonable number of competitions.

In response to the President's Management Agenda (PMA), the USDA is using tools such as performance and budget integration, program reviews, efficiency studies and improved financial management to improve the cost-effectiveness and performance of its programs. Identifying work activities for improvement and determining the appropriate study approach are central to the pursuit of increased program and cost effectiveness. USDA's alignment of the competitive sourcing decision-making process and strategic work plan has enabled the Department and its agencies to be more effective and efficient in the implementation of this initiative.

USDA recognizes that its human capital strategy is an important factor in how well the Department supports its mission. The Department's component agencies and staff offices have historically linked the strategic management of Human Capital (HC) to the competitive sourcing program through the Department's HC planning process. Examples of joint actions taken include: conducting skills gap analyses of the most critical occupational series and implementing workforce planning to address projected deficiencies; and sharing and promoting 'best practices' among component agencies. The HC Plan also includes an action to develop and implement workforce restructuring activities, as needed, that incorporate competitive sourcing solutions.

USDA conducts an annual analysis of the USDA Federal Activities Inventory by functional area for possible future competitive sourcing studies. In FY 2008, USDA plans to conduct feasibility studies covering approximately 691 FTE. These feasibility studies do not include FTE related to rural development or farm loan programs, which are subject to Congressional restrictions. In addition, no feasibility studies for the Forest Service will be conducted due to the spending restriction. If a favorable return on investment is indicated by the results of the feasibility studies and market research indicates that potentially qualified bidders exist, a public – private competition will be conducted.

If results are not favorable, competitions will not be conducted. However, USDA is committed to establishing greater efficiency and effectiveness in all activities, and utilizing other available tools when functions are deemed unsuitable for competition.
