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Fire Danger Level Rises Even Higher On Public Lands

LAKEVIEW – The Industrial Fire Precaution Level (IFPL) will increase to IFPL 3 on Saturday, July 21. This applies to federal lands protected by the Fremont-Winema National Forests and the Lakeview District of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

Under IFPL 3, individuals with personal and commercial use firewood permits are prohibited from using power saws.

"We've managed to keep a large number of lighting caused fires at bay so far this summer," said Ed Guzman, Interagency Deputy Fire Staff for the Fremont-Winema National Forests and BLM Lakeview District. "This increased fire danger level is necessary to reduce the risk of human caused fires during continued dry conditions. By following these fire precaution requirements, this is just one way people can do their part to help prevent wildfires."
