HISTORICAL TIDBITS

One of the School's primary undertakings during the early years of the 21st Century was the Capital Campaign with the aim of creating a million dollar endowment. Early on during the endeavor, Linda Allmand pledged to match up to \$100,000 in gifts, which was of major importance in creating many gifts and a number of scholarships and other endowed funds. The University set the School's goal at \$1.1, which was more than met with a total of over \$1.4.

Dr. Herman L. Totten, UNT Regents Professor, has accepted a two-year term as SLIS Dean. In making the announcement of the appointment, UNT Provost Howard Johnson said, "Dr. Totten has had a long and distinguished career in higher education as well as here at UNT. We look forward to his leadership of the school and to working with him as we continue to build on a great tradition that has already been established in the School of Library & Information Sciences."

Beginning in fall 2005, Dr. Totten replaced Associate Professor Samantha Hastings who served as interim dean since June 2004. At that time Dr. Philip Turner, who had served simultaneously as dean of the school and associate vice president for academic affairs for distance education, stepped down from the dean's position to assume an increased role in directing the university's online academic programs.

Dr. Totten came to SLIS in 1977 as professor and associate dean. He returned to full-time teaching in 1983 and taught 14 years before resuming his position as associate dean in 1996. For the past three years, he has served as faculty executive assistant to UNT President Norval Pohl.

Dr. Totten, a 30 year member of the Texas Library Association, has served as both chair

and member of many of its committees and as the Association's president in 2000-01. A life member of the American Library Association, he has served as chair of both the ALA Committee on Accreditation and the ALA Committee on Minority Concern, as well as two terms on the ALA Council.

Among his many awards and honors are the 2001 ALA Melvil Dewey Award for creative professional achievement, the 1999 Association for Library and Information Science Education Outstanding Teacher Award, and the 1992 ALA Black Caucus Award for Outstanding Contributions to the Field of Library and Information Science Education.

In 2004, President George W. Bush nominated Dr. Totten to a five-year term on the National Commission on Libraries and Information Science. The U.S. Senate confirmed his appointment in January of this year.

Prior to coming to UNT, Dr. Totten was dean of the library school at the University of Oregon and associate dean of the library school at the University of Kentucky. He earned the bachelor's degree in music at Wiley College in 1961, the master's degree in library science in 1964 and the doctoral degree in library science in 1966, both at the University of Oklahoma.

Dr. Linda Schamber, Associate Professor, was appointed Associate Dean of SLIS effective October 1, 2005. Dr. Schamber, who joined the faculty in 1991, has chaired and participated in many faculty governance committees at the School and University levels. She replaces Dr. Arlita (Hallam) Harris, Associate Dean since 2002, who assumed a position as Senior Marketing Specialist for the UNT Center for Distributed Learning.

"I welcome this opportunity to serve the School and to work closely with faculty and staff in this new capacity," Dr. Schamber said. "As I enter my 15th year on the SLIS faculty, I look forward to continuing to support our fine students from the wider perspective of their full academic experience."

A common theme of education, communication, and information runs throughout Dr. Schamber's career. Her teaching and research interests include information and communication theory, human information behavior, information organization, and information skills development. She has conducted funded research and published on a number of topics, including work on relevance research and on the impact of technology on library education.

She earned her B.S. in education and M.A. in journalism from Ohio State University and her Ph.D. in information science at Syracuse University. She has served on university

faculties for 25 years, including in communications at Ohio State University and Syracuse University before coming to UNT. At UNT, she was among the first faculty to begin teaching in the distributed learning environment. Since 1998, she has designed and taught large and small distance-independent courses and managed teaching teams to deliver instruction via combinations of webbased, video, and face-to-face methods.

Dr. Schamber continues to pursue a lifelong interest in professional editing. She is an editorial board member for the *Journal of the American Society for Information Science and Technology (JASIST)* and past staff editor of the *Annual Review of Information Science and Technology (ARIST)*. She is active in the American Society for Information Science and Technology (ASIS&T), where she served as conference proceedings editor for the ASIS&T 2004 Annual Meeting as well as technical program committee chair. Previously, she worked as a newspaper editor, writer/photographer, and publication designer.

In addition to her ASIS&T activities, Dr. Schamber is a member of the American Library Association (ALA), Association for Library and Information Science Education (ALISE), Special Libraries Association (SLA), and Association for Computing Machinery (ACM).

SLIS TAKES OVER DALLAS

Dallas City Manager Mary Todd Subm

A graduate degree in library and information sciences can lead to positions in fields other than traditional libraries and information-type facilities. Mary Todd Suhm, pictured on this issue's cover, is an outstanding example of a successful librarian excelling in another field.

After serving in numerous positions in libraries and in position in Dallas city government, Mary Todd Suhm became Dallas City Manager in Spring 2005. Her first job after completing the MLS at SLIS in 1974, was as director of the Allen (Texas) Public Library. She later joined the staff of the Dallas Public Library as a branch manager and later established and managed the central library's Urban Information Center, a unique service designed to support not only those in city government, but citizens seeking information on organizations and other facets of urban life. It was from this position that she was tapped for city government service.

Mary's first position in city government was as assistant to the mayor, followed by a number of other appointments: assistant to the city manager, municipal court administrator, executive assistant director of the Dallas Police Department (first non-sworn executive in the department), assistant city manager, and first assistant city manager. On June 8, 2004, she was named Interim City Manager before receiving the designation of City Manager a year later. Mary also holds the Master of Public Administration degree from UNT. On October 13, 2005, she was a featured speaker at the 3rd Annual City Manager Round Table, sponsored by the UNT Department of Public Administration and co-sponsored by the NT Chapter of the American Society for Public Administration. She also was speaker at the School's independent graduation convocation in May 2005.

Laurie Lewins Evans, who received the MLS in 1973, calls herself the penny that keeps turning up. She has been with the Dallas Public Library for sixteen years with intervals away while holding other positions. She spent five years running a library consulting business, and from 1990 until 2000, she directed the library at the Baylor University Medical Center and the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation. She returned to Dallas Public as assistant director in 2000, and for the eleven months prior to her new appointment, served as interim director. Laurie's first job after she finished the BA degree at the University of Texas at Austin was in the children's section of the Casa View Branch of Dallas Public. Now, 36 years later, she has been named the system's director.

DR. WILLIAM MOEN RECEIVES AWARD

Dr. William Moen is the 2005 winner of the prestigious Frederick G. Kilgour Award for Research in Library and Information Technology. The award, sponsored by OCLC and the Library and Information Technology Association (LITA), a division of the American Library Association, was established to honor the founder of OCLC who was a seminal figure in library automation. The honor consists of \$2,000, an expense paid trip to the ALA Annual Conference, and a citation of merit.

"The Kilgour Award Committee is pleased to acknowledge the work of William Moen, whose research into protocols and standards for information retrieval, and investigations into interoperability and metadata utilization, are making important contributions to improving the ways library systems communicate," said Heidi Hanson, chair of the award committee. Dr. Moen accepted the award at the ALA Conference in Chicago in June 2005.



DR. ANA D. CLEVELAND **RECEIVES PROJECT FUNDING**

The National Library of Medicine (NLM), through the National Network of Libraries of Medicine South Central Region (NN/LM SCR), awarded Dr. Ana D. Cleveland, professor and Houston program director, \$24,466, with UNT supplying \$20,349 in matching funds, to study Internet health informationseeking behavior of the Chinese population in the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex. A primary goal of the project is to teach Chinese health consumers how to find quality health information on the Internet.

The project is a collaborative initiative between the Health Informatics Program at SLIS and its partner institution, Gibson D. Lewis Library-UNT Health Science Center. In addition, three public libraries are members of the project: Denton Public Library, Fort Worth Public Library, and Richardson Public Library. The research team is composed of Drs. Cleveland and Jiangping Chen, SLIS faculty; Lisa Smith, UNT-HSC; and Ph.D. students Della Pan and Cindy Yu. Each team member brings expertise to the project-Dr. Cleveland in health information-seeking behavior and consumer health, Dr. Chen in cross language and cultural areas, Lisa Smith in outreach services, and Della Pan and Cindy Yu in Chinese language.

The Chinese population is one of the growing populations fastest Dallas/Fort Worth area and is typically underserved in health care because of barriers related to language and culture. Teaching materials in English as well as in Chinese are being developed, and training sessions to teach the Chinese population how to use the health information pathfinders will be conducted throughout the project's geographical area. Information professionals serving Chinese users will be invited to attend the training sessions.

the SLIS faculty in 2002 after serving on the faculties at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and the University of Oklahoma. His research areas include information retrieval systems-feature selection, humancomputer interaction—direct manipulation in IR and visualization, and cognitive issues in distributed networks such as the "digital library."

Dr. Guillermo A. Oyarce

During his first year at SLIS, he received the prestigious UNT Faculty Research Grant, followed by a Junior Faculty Research Grant the year following. As a result, he developed an information retrieval system interface that addresses his interests in the intersection of cognition, information, and technology. The simplicity of this particular software allows it to serve two very different purposes: as a research tool to understand the effects of information in human cognition, and as a retrieval tool to provide access to component information capsules in the documents of a set. His innovative approach has been recognized by UNT's Office of Research, which is processing on his behalf two patents on his unique product. His current research is related to full-text information retrieval and the properties of the statistical distributions of text corpora. Though currently centered in English, his research will include other languages.

Dr. Oyarce's international interests resulted in his attendance at the Conference on Democracy and Global Security in Istanbul, Turkey (see article p.?) where he presented a paper on his information retrieval system interface. Another stage of his international involvement is his work with several UNT faculty members to establish the Center for the Study of Amazonian Ecology and Its Cultural Diversity. During the summer of 2005, he visited the mother waters of the Amazon River, deep in the rain forest of Peru, and returned with initial agreements of collaboration with the regional government, a national university, and the most famous research institute of the Amazon region.

He has published in the Journal of the American Society for Information Sciences and Technology and in the most prestigious scholarly journal in information science of China's Academy of Sciences. He has research collaborators in Europe and Latin America.

Dr. Ana Cleveland has been reappointed as Director of the Houston Program.

At the fall 2005 UNT Faculty Convocation, Dr. Elizabeth Figa received the Outstanding Online Teacher and Course Award. She was one of 15 nominees and the first recipient of this new campus award. Her courses are recog-

nized for their artful design, the extensive use of multimedia, and rigorous and rich course content. Her nomination was supported with numerous letters written by current and past students who spoke highly of her warm and humorous approach to online learning as well as an instructional style that is both professional and intensely personal. Her recognition consisted of an engraved glass and metal trophy and a \$500 cash award. Dr. Figa also has been elected to the UNT Faculty Senate.

Dr. Arlita (Hallum) Harris, former Interim Associate Dean and Visiting Assistant Professor, has assumed a new position as Senior Marketing Specialist for the UNT Center for Distributed Learning. She will be marketing online courseware, implementing and expanding the Course Information Database and Program Information Database, and promoting UNT's e-campus. We wish her well in her new assignment. In her position with SLIS from 2002 until August 2005, her


Act, and copyright legislation that passed as late as April 2005. The work has been adopted as a textbook in many LIS programs and school library certification

Since spring 2005, TxCDK has been coordinating a University-wide, multi-discipline Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) Research Group. The Group is comprised of over 80 faculty experts and graduate students in the multiple engineering and logistic facets of this technology, representing many UNT colleges and schools—Business, Education, Library & Information Sciences, Community Service, Music, and Visual Artsplus other campus experts from transportation and security, the libraries, healthcare facilities, and information technology.

RFID is a technology that uses radio signal or electromagnetic energy to identify objects. The technology has been used for years to identify objects such as airplanes and ships. It is, of course, radar, an acronym for "radio detection and ranging." RFID is in the media spotlight because of new applications—event ticketing; casino chip authentication; wristbands for sporting events; patient, child, and prisoner tracking; and keyless entry, toll tag access, and many other uses.

In 2003, Wal-Mart surprised the business community by announcing that it would adopt RFID technology and mandating that by January 2005 its major suppliers implement its use for shipments bound for its Denton-area distribution center. The U.S. Department of Defense has decreed that in order to provide visibility and flexibility that all supplies bound for combat areas must be tracked with RFID tags. Recently, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration mandated that, in order to guard against theft and counterfeiting, drug manufacturers must place RFID labels on bottles by 2007.

Wal-Mart's selection of the Dallas area to test its deployment of the technology has made the metroplex a hotbed of RFID activity resulting in numerous RFID vendors opening or relocating their offices in the area. Major retailers such as Best Buy, Target, Seven-Eleven, and Albertsons also decided to test RFID in the Dallas area. The global importance of the region's RFID technology was confirmed this year when the third Annual RFID World—one of the premier events for the industry—was held in Dallas in March 2005; it will return in February 2006.


TxCDK co-sponsored an RFID Institute with the National Information Standards Organization in October 2005, that addressed standards coding and privacy concerns in the information industry involving publishers, booksellers, corporate knowledge centers, and libraries. The Institute brought together industry leaders from RFID companies, software and hardware giants, the Electronic Freedom Foundation, and many others. Other projects of the UNT RFID Research Group include web-based services and business seminars, as well as specific projects with RFID suppliers and software producers.

Several of the TxCDK Fellows are RFID experts and leaders of the research efforts. The UNT team meets monthly to exchange information about current projects and to discuss new ideas with industry leaders. NEWS FROM LIBRARY EDUCATION @ DESKTOP (LE@D)

LE@D Comes to Denton Public Library

LE@D'S new home is adjacent to the foyer of Denton Public Library North Branch. Since 2003, the project has provided desktop education to over 10,000 librarians and library staff nationwide. Distance learning has been praised for its potential to nourish end-user education, and LE@D is playing a major role in assisting this effort. Evolved from an IMLS grant that funded a collaborative partnership between the SLIS and the Northeast Texas Library System, LE@D maintains a 90%+ success rate.

In a recent Sloan-C survey, over 2.6 million higher education students studied online in 2004, noting a tremendous shift in online learning (The Quality and Extend of Online Education in the United States, Retrieved August 20, 2005 from http://www.sloanc.org/resources/survey.asp). For librarians and library staff, online user education has not only become relevant to career development, but provides a convenient alternative to traditional educational formats.

With the current success rate and the development of several new training modules, the question might be asked, "What lies in store for the project?" Program/Project Coordinator Gary Werchan notes that," LE@D has provided a welcome service to public library users and is now seeking to cross over to academic and school library user markets, supported by a second IMLS grant. In addition to pursuing other markets," Werchan adds, "LE@D has plans to expand its course offerings to include series in technology, management, and reference." In order to assist this effort and to broaden the instructional focus and scope of the service offerings, LE@D is interested in courseware developers. LE@D Grant to Train School Librarians

IMLS has awarded SLIS a \$159,578 grant to extend its highly successful online continuing education program (LE@D) to school librarians. SLIS will partner with the El Paso and Ysleta independent school districts to produce at least five online tutorials targeting topics identified by school librarians/media specialists as important to their continuing education needs. "The project is an excellent example of partnership between a university and public schools to bring together expertise that will deliver quality training to school library staffs," said Dr. Philip Turner, UNT Vice Provost for Learning Enhancement and principal investigator on the grant.

The original IMLS grant that created LE@D was aimed at public libraries. "Our contacts with public library staff over the last two years made it clear that school librarians had unique continuing education topics that LE@D could address quite well," Dr. Turner added. The initial five tutorial topics will be developed based on a recently completed needs assessment survey of El Paso librarians. Librarians in the two districts will test the new tutorials, which will then be made available nationally in early 2006.

Two members of this eminent group, Bonnie Juergens and Dana Rooks, are highlighted below.

Bonnie Juergens has served as Executive Director of Amigos Library Services,

Inc., a non-profit member-based resource-sharing cooperative 800+ libraries in greater Southwestern United States since 1988. She administers \$22 million revenue/expense

budget each year and directs a staff of some 50. Her many accomplishments include chairing the committee that developed the highly successful Texas Library Association's Leadership Development Program (TALL Texans), and working with library leaders throughout Texas to plan and implement TexShare, a statewide library resource-sharing program that serves over 750 libraries across the State. In 2004, Bonnie was presented the Distinguished Service Award, the Texas Library Association's highest honor.

After serving in several administrative positions since joining the staff in 1983, Dana Rooks became Dean of Libraries at the University of Houston in 1997. The

UH library, consisting of million volumes and a staff of over 200, supports 13 schools and colleges, 35,000 students and 1,200 faculty members, with annual expenditures totaling \$16.5

million. After securing \$25 million from the University to expand the library, Ms. Rooks was responsible for conducting an external fund raising project that raised \$25 million over a 3-year period. The expansion project, now nearing completion, adds 170,000 square feet to the central library. TLA named Dana Rooks Librarian of the Year in 1997. She served as president of the Association in 2004-05.

RIO GRANDE INITIATIVE UPDATE

tions and served as president of the Texas Library Association in 2002-03. The Texas Municipal League Library Director's Association named her the 1998 Municipal Librarian of the Year.





SLIS ALUMNI SOCIETY

When the SLIS Alumni Society Executive Board met on July 14, 2005, several important matters were discussed, including the Medders scholarship fund. It was decided that money collected from the Society's life membership fees since 2000, totaling \$14,610, as well as \$15 collected from each of the \$25 annual memberships, totaling \$1,350, be moved to the Lady Kate Medders Scholarship account. Since the fund is supported by membership dues, the Board also decided that the name of the fund be changed to the Lady Kate Medders Alumni Scholarship.

It is appropriate that a fund to support future library and information scientists bear the name Lady Kate Medders. She began teaching courses in library science in 1935/36 in order to meet the requests for training teacher-librarians for school library positions. She was one of only three faculty members when the Department of Library Service was established in the College of Arts and Sciences in 1939. Until her retirement in 1953, she was the guiding spirit of both students and faculty.

SLIS Advancement Associate Margaret Yates recently visited with Ruthie Brock to learn more about her motivations for establishing the Ruth Brock and Allan Saxe SLIS Endowed Scholarship. Below are excerpts from that conversation.

What prompted you to create an endowment for SLIS students?

It was the kind of thing Allan had done at other universities for years—on a professor's salary—as his way of giving back. This was something I was not exposed to in my upbringing and I greatly admired that in him. I thought it would be great if I could do something in my own small way and decided to use my proceeds from a house sale to crate the endowment. Being a librarian and a fan of libraries, helping others who wanted to become librarians was my way of giving back to my world. I had planned to do the scholarship on my own, but Allan decided to show his support by helping me establish it. That made it even better.

How does it make you feel to know that 17 years later you are still helping SLIS students complete their degree?

Really good. The scholarship is more important today than before. We need to support those students who have good skills, are smart, energetic and understand the information world. I am glad others are interested in librarianship and keep the profession relevant.

What kind of difference do you think scholarships make to the SLIS program? Scholarships show students currently enrolled in the program that those giving back believe in the program and are willing to support the program and students. It is a way for students to understand they are not alone. They know there are people who care. It makes me feel good to see others value the program as much as I do and to express it by establishing endowments.

If you had it to do it all over again, would you still create this endowment? Ob, definitely. I'm very proud of it.

Ruthie Brock currently serves as Business Librarian at University of Texas at Arlington libraries. She also serves on the board of the Arlington Public Library Foundation and was recently asked to serve on their Long Range Strategic Planning Committee. Allan Saxe is an Associate Professor of Political Science at University of Texas at Arlington and serves as DFW's favorite political analyst on local television and WBAP 820 AM Radio. A SLIS alumna from the Class of 1945 recently visited campus and brought her college scrapbooks for viewing. There was a piece of yellowed paper on one page that struck me more than anything else. It was her registration receipt from February 1943. Total due? \$36.00.

She did remind me that her job at the bookbindery paying \$.50 an hour was a good job to have in those days. Fair enough. Then I wondered, how many hours a week over the course of a semester did she have to work to pay that \$36.00? And how many hours a week does a student today have to work to pay their tuition?

Let's see, \$36.00 divided by \$.50 is 72 hours worth of work. Today, the cost for 12 hours at the graduate level is about \$3,000. Let's assume that the average student enrolled in the SLIS program makes \$15.00 an hour. To pay a \$3,000 tuition bill, they must work 215 hours!

My comparison is not exact, but you see the point. When we hear nightly news reports about the legislature once again cutting funding to public higher education, how many of us stop to think about how that affects UNT and SLIS? I imagine very few. UNT, like all other public universities in Texas and most across the nation, is no longer a "state-funded"

school or even a "state-supported" school. It is now classified as a "state-assisted" school. Thirty years ago about 80% of UNT's budget came from state funding. Now, that percentage has dropped to below 25%. This is the major reason why tuition continues to rise. Decreased state funding must be compensated for in some way.

This trend is not likely to change as more pressure is put on state revenue from other areas the state funds. As a consequence, students must work more and study less. They must borrow more money and take fewer hours every semester. More than ever students make the decision on where to attend school not on who has the best program for them, but who can offer them the most financial assistance. So, what can be done to help future librarians and make sure SLIS continues to attract the best and brightest students?

That is where you, our loyal alumni come in. The need for scholarships in SLIS is great. In the past, you have done a tremendous job in helping support students and that is greatly appreciated by all. We need that support more than ever now. When you were a student you were part of a supportive environment. Students today need your support.
