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You may remember my last column where I explained how busy and excited we were while in the last stage of our American Library Association (ALA) reaccreditation of the School's Master's Program. Well, on June 26, 2006, we

received the eagerly awaited decision document (in letter form) from ALA's Committee on Accreditation (COA). The rejoicing resounded throughout the second floor of the Information Science Building when I announced the words I read from the COA Chair, Dr. Thomas W. Leonhardt:



"On behalf of the Committee on Accreditation (COA) of the American Library Association, I am

pleased to report that the Committee voted to approve continued accreditation of the program leading to the degree of Master of Science offered by the School of Library and Information Sciences at the University of North Texas. This decision was made during COA's meeting held June 24-26, 2006. Continued accreditation of this program explicitly includes all sites offering courses that are part of the program listed above. The next comprehensive review is scheduled for spring 2013."

All of the hard work of the internal constituents (students, faculty, staff, and University officials), as well as the external constituents (alumni, Board of Advisors, and employers) paid off with the receipt of the decision document—we could not have succeeded without the joint effort of the SLIS family! Associate Dean Linda Schamber deserves special commendation for her diligence and proficiency in gathering and assimilating data into a cogent self-study report.

While SLIS celebrated COA's decision, the University's Internal Auditors were winding up a review of the School's financial administration. Subsequent to my appointment as Dean, I had requested the audit of SLIS's finances for the period September 1, 2005 through July 31, 2006 to determine if the established controls were in compliance with the University's policies. In the meantime, I implemented several procedural changes that I felt would improve the fiscal management process.

On August 23, the University's Internal Auditor sent me the results of the review. You

can imagine my relief when I read the following from the Auditors' report:

Controls related to fiscal management of expenditures (purchasing card, travel, payroll, and employee reimbursement) appear to be effective and in compliance with University policies. Since assuming the position of Dean on September 1, 2005, Dr. Totten has implemented the following procedural changes that enhance the fiscal management process.

- The Dean has sole authority to approve and sign financial items.
- A Budget Director was assigned to evaluate and improve the current financial processes and to assume responsibilities regarding financial transactions.
- An Academic Budget Officer was bired to evaluate and design an improved financial data reporting system and to assume responsibilities regarding financial transactions.
- The Budget Director and Academic Budget officer will confer with the University Budget Director to streamline SLIS accounts to meet University standards for budget allocation and appropriation.

During and immediately following our preparation and completion of our reaccreditation process, we have been working to complete a similar process, another self-study report, the Doctoral Program Assessment Project (DPAP) for SLIS's Interdisciplinary Information Sciences (IIS) Ph.D. Program. The major foci of the assessment are the Program's mission and design, the quality of SLIS faculty (research and scholarship), student demand, the quality of applicants, and student outcomes. The purpose of the assessment is to affirm continuing quality and competitiveness in the doctoral program, as well as to ensure appropriate use of financial and intellectual resources. Having completed the self-study ensures that the programs are equipped to provide accurate and appropriate information to the public and to the University's certifying agency, The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Like the ALA-COA reaccreditation process, the DPAP self-study has increased our understanding of the School as a whole, its strengths and weaknesses, and how our IIS Ph.D. Program fits into the larger picture of all doctoral programs in the State of Texas. The Toulouse School of Graduate Studies (TSGS) distributed the final DPAP reports Friday, October 6, 2006 to external reviewers who will evaluate our report and provide feedback. Another special commendation to **Associate Dean Linda Schamber** for her tireless work to achieve the completion of the DPAP self-study!

Submitting the DPAP self-study left us all with a great feeling of accomplishment. Yet, as is the nature of academia, SLIS is still in the midst

of many projects, including planning for the implementation of its Unit Academic Plan. We began the process in 2005 of tying SLIS's initiatives to the University's Academic Plan, and then submitted the final draft of the plan to Academic Affairs earlier this year. Unlike the plans of the past, this year's unit academic plans reflect the underlying themes of the University's Academic Plan, as well as the University's Strategic Plan. By promoting UNT's themes—diversity, partnerships, and interdisciplinarity—SLIS plays its part in a unified strategy to enable the whole University to reach its goals. In fact, the SLIS faculty devoted part of its Fall Retreat to "Planning to Plan," an eight-hour session facilitated by Bonnie Juergens, Executive Director of Amigos Library Services, Inc., to prepare the faculty for SLIS's strategic planning process. The SLIS faculty collaborated to identify desired outcomes, determined a feasible timeline, and identified key strategic issues for SLIS.

Another part of the retreat was spent addressing SLIS's response to COA's five concerns and discussing SLIS's recommendations that were identified during the ALA reaccreditation self-study. The last day of the retreat was spent planning another of SLIS's priorities, a search for four new faculty members. A session entitled "Planning your destiny—imagining your future," facilitated by Greg McQueen, UNT's Senior Vice President for Advancement and President, UNT

SLIS Master's Program reaccredited for full seven years.

Foundation, Inc., reminded the faculty that adding four new faculty members will change the entire culture of the faculty. The process, dubbed "The Perfect Search" by Dr. McQueen, entails identifying the values of a good search, the strengths and weaknesses of the existing faculty, the challenges of change, the implementation of the actual search, and the communication of the plan to all stakeholders. Also, the faculty voted during the session to

designate the School Library program position to the Hazel Harvey Peace Professorship.

As you can tell, as also can be the nature of academia, SLIS has entered into what I affectionately call the "Era of Planning." It probably is most obvious to you as readers that it is with tremendous pride that I report this Era of Planning that includes both joy and successes, as well as concerns and challenges, for SLIS's administrators, faculty, staff, and students. You may have guessed by now what a privilege I feel it is to serve as the Dean of the finest library and information studies program in the nation! And, as always, I anticipate and welcome your valued comments and suggestions as our SLIS continues to move forward.

2005 SLIS GRADUATE MAKES LIBRARY JOURNAL COVER

Shikun "KK" Jiang (MS '05) not only graced the cover of the October 15, 2006 issue of Library Journal, but also was given an interesting write-up by Editor-at-Large John N. Berry III (p. 33). Shikun, nicknamed "KK" by family and friends, represents the Class of 2005 on Library Journal's cover and in this year's Placements & Salaries feature*. The article terms KK, an Oak Ridge Institute for Science Fellow at the Information Center (IC) of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, GA, as "a modern information professional."

KK describes the IC as a crucial resource. "Scholars and researchers come into the IC or consult via the web. My major responsibility is a part of the internal web site for our staff, to make it more accessible, to organize the information so it's easier to consult." She says her position is "more like a postgraduate fellowship, so it is a true learning experience for me."

KK expressed how grateful she is to UNT Professor Ana Cleveland and her informatics classes: "I found out what a wonderful field medical informatics is, with its interactions with people and its connections to public health. It is a field that really helps people. I loved our class studies in the information-seeking behavior of healthcare providers." She also expresses her gratitude to SLIS Assistant Professor Jiangping Chen, with whom she worked for a year as teaching assistant. Under Dr. Chen's guidance, "KK learned to design and develop instructional materials, databases, and class web sites." The article also described other learning experiences such as "participating in a 2004 competition to demonstrate the use of natural-language processing techniques to answer questions." Her participation in the Eaglerad

Database Project, under Dr. Chen, added to her skills in database design and management." During her graduate study, KK served as an assistant in the Digital Project Laboratory of UNT's Willis Library, where "she developed talents in teamwork and indexing and metadata work by participating in the library's digitization and archival projects." For her required practicum, KK served as a volunteer working on the



information & referral (I&R) database of the Denton Family Resource Center that provides services to the poor.

KK earned the bachelors degree in engineering in electronics and information technology at the College of Electronics and Information Engineering at South China University of Technology, one of China's key universities. KK says that her undergraduate degree was "in pure technology. It was too 'cold' and wasn't exactly the field in which I wanted to work." She reports that she found the warmth she sought in the UNT informatics program.

Nontraditional Positions and Settings

Although a majority of SLIS graduates serve in public or technical service positions or become administrators in academic, public, school, or the usual special libraries, a surprising number hold nontraditional positions or work in unusual settings. Nontraditional refers to areas such as publishing, bibliographic utility, technical writing, indexing, bookstore ownership/management, digital imaging, preservation, website designing/management, and software designing, or they are museum curators, archivist, library vendors, information brokers, or genealogist. Other graduates carry out traditional functions in nontraditional settings or nontraditional functions in traditional settings. Here are a few examples of our alumni who hold such positions.



Dreanna Belden (MS '03) serves as coordinator of grants and development at the UNT Libraries. Her primary work focuses on the Portal to Texas History, a digital gateway to collections held

in libraries, museums, historical societies, and archives. She manages collaborative partnerships with forty-five partners, recruits new participants, and designs new projects. As an example, she spearheaded the grant-funded project "Lorenzo de Zavala Online." Ten institutions contributed to the project, resulting in a remarkable online resource with materials in English, Spanish and French. She also provides digitization training at professional meetings for organizations such as the TLA. Dreanna serves on the SLIS Alumni Society Board and has been selected by TLA as the Texas representative to the American Library Association's 2007 Emerging Leadership Institute (see p. 20).



David Bigwood (MS '93) is cataloger at the Lunar and Planetary Institute in Houston. The Institute, housed in the USRA Center for Advanced Space Studies, one of the 18 international NASA

Regional Planetary Image Facilities, focuses on academic participation in studies of the current state, evolution, and formation of the solar system. Much of the material David catalogs require original cataloging and is in formats such as images, videos, globes, maps, electronic resources, and models. "The library is scanning important documents and maps from the Apollo era and making them available on our Web site. I add metadata to the PDF files that are publicly accessible," he adds.



Katie Chaumont (MS '04) is a research analyst at Spencer Stuart, a private executive search firm that operates out of 50 offices in 25 coun-

tries. The company conducts executive level searches for senior leadership and board positions across all industries, functions, and company sizes. Katie, who is responsible for providing research support for her local office, extracts information from a variety of sources on biographical and work history and looks for favorable and unfavorable articles available in the public domain.



Sandy Echt's (MLS '74), Associate Editor, H.W. Wilson Co., serves as an indexer for *Business Periodicals Index* (BPI). She reports that although it is not required, H.W. Wilson prefers to hire those with MLS degrees for

indexer positions. BPI indexers are each assigned a list of magazines for which he/she is responsible for selecting and indexing the articles. Each indexer is expected to index about 40 articles a day. Sandy reports, "There's always too much work and the days fly by! I never look at the clock and think the day is dragging—on the contrary, I'll look at the clock and think, how did it get to be so late?"



Judy Gee (MS 97) says "there are plenty of opportunities for information workers." For her company, Herac, located in Houston, she provides technical,

intellectual property, and marketing analysis and reports for industries in the energy section, semiconductor, bioprocesses, petro-

chemical, and nano-technical areas. On one recent assignment, she reorganized a company's intranet and e-commerce sites using information architecture.



Nathan Hall (MS '06) has been named digital projects manager at the Photographic Preservation Society in Fort Worth, a nonprofit organization designed to preserve at-risk histori-

cally significant photographic collections. He oversees the lab operations and is responsible for the care, digitization, and documentation of historical photographic collections for archival and preservation purposes. He also utilizes databases and backups to store the images and metadata for both the collection owner and the Society, as well as maintains the Society's virtual museum online. Nathan says it, "requires a solid grasp of technology and the ability to adapt and change as new technologies emerge." Nathan is a student in the Interdisciplinary Ph.D. program.



Kay Harold (MS '06), Online Instructional Specialist at Ashford University, Clinton, Iowa, is responsible for monitoring and evaluating online instructor training for all new instructors. "Because I earned

my degree as an online student," she says, "I felt that I had real life experience that would assist future students in pursuing their degrees as distant learners."

Jana Hill (MS '03), who specialized in digital image management for her SLIS degree, is Assistant Registrar of Collection Information at the Amon Carter Museum, Fort Worth. She is responsible for administration of the collection management system, the database where all of the

information about the collection and exhibitions is stored. She also monitors data quality and does much of the cataloging. The museum's permanent collection consists of almost 300,000 objects,

becoming a library assistant.

Jerry Hudson (MS '03) listed high tech—avionics, lasers, etc.— as his background. Victoria Lum (MS '06) was an asset manager for both the U.S. and Asia markets as well as a venture capital project

manager in Silicon Valley. **Sharon Boon** ('02) worked 28 years in business, 23 of them for a chemical manufacturing company. **Patricia Alford**, current student, was a clinical veterinarian for great ape colonies for 22 years. Eva Poole, Director of Libraries, City of



CHANGES IN THE SCHOOL LIBRARY MASTERS/CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

A few changes have taken place in the school library program of study. The first change concerns personnel. Dr. Carol Simpson retired at the end of summer, choosing to serve the School as a modified service professor. (See article p. 11) Although she will continue to teach courses part time, she will no longer have other duties with the program. SLIS will conduct a national search for a new senior level faculty member for the school library program.

Another program change is the way in which teachers register for the exam to be certified in Texas for school librarianship. The state Board for Educator Certification now requires that students register with the State at the beginning of their program and take the test recommended by the School they attend. UNT/SLIS recommends that students take the TEXES after completing all certification course work. Under the new guidelines, students will have one year after completion of course work to take or retake the exam as often as necessary.

There also is a change in the mentor requirement of the program resulting from a meeting with area school library leaders. Those experts were invited to campus for a day to review the school library program. They made meaningful suggestions, one of which was put into affect immediately. Students are now required to go through their district library coordinator for mentor placement within the district, so long as the district coordinator is willing to take on the responsibility. In regions where there is no district library coordinator, regional library coordinators are taking on the task. Coordinators who wish to join the group of district and/or regional coordinators who are willing to place UNT/SLIS students with mentors should contact Dr. Barbara Stein Martin at stein@unt.edu. FOUNTAIN OF YOUTH LIBRARY **SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM**

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) has funded the Houston Public Library's Fountain of Youth Project, a scholarship program designed to prepare librarians to provide quality services to young library users. Students chosen for the program will study for a Masters degree through the SLIS online program, beginning in Spring 2007. Benefits include full in-state tuition; a stipend for books and expenses; paid membership to a professional organization such as the Texas Library Association, Public Library Association, and American Library Association for two years; and monthly training workshop opportunities. Bilingual applicants in Spanish, Chinese, or Vietnamese are given special consideration. Among other expectations, Fountain of Youth scholars are required to complete the Youth Librarianship Program of Study and to serve two years at Houston Public Library.

New Resource Description and Access (RDA)", presented findings from Dr. Miksa's Cataloging Tools and Resources in North Texas (CTR-NT) Project, funded by OCLC/ALISE Library and Information Science Research Grant. The project's purpose is to discover the extent and utilization of cataloging tools and resources within technical service departments in the public libraries of the North Texas Regional Library System and the Northeast Texas Library System.

discussing the future of MARC, and the extent to which there is a need for a new data format for bibliographic information. Some of this community discussion is being informed by Dr. Moen's current research (with Dr. Shawne Miksa as co-PI), the MARC Content Designation Utilization (MCDU) Project http://www.mcdu.unt.edu). The Library of Congress invited Dr. Moen to a small invitational meeting to discuss "Streamlining MARC," an indication of the national interest in this project. In addition, his proposal for a program at the 2007 ALA Annual Conference was accepted and is being sponsored by the Association for Library Collections and Technical Services.

Dr. Moen's recent presentations include: a peerreviewed paper, "Learning from Artifacts: Metadata Utilization Analysis," at the 2006 Joint Conference on Digital Libraries; "Catalogers' Use of MARC: Learning from Artifacts through Metadata Utilization Analysis" at the Research Libraries Group Member Forum; "21st Century Cataloging... Catalogers' Use of MARC... Challenges and Opportunities," at the Nevada Library Association Annual Conference; "Examining MARC Records as Artifacts Reflecting Metadata Utilization Decisions" at the IMLS 2006 WebWise Conference (see summary in First Monday http:www.first-

đ org/issues11_8/moen/index.html>); a half-day workshop, "Catalogers' Use of MARC and 21st Century Cataloging: Challenges and Opportunities" at the Montana Library Association Annual Conference, and a lecture, "Metadata in the Networked Information Environment: Transformation, Reuse, Aggregation, Interoperability" as part of the Research & Teaching Talk series at the College of Information Science and Technology, Drexel University. He recently completed a 12-month project under contract with the State of Wisconsin, Department of Public Instruction, to examine the costs of operation of Wisconsin's public library system's shared integrated library systems. With students in SLIS 5223 and a group of interested masters and Ph.D. students, Dr. Moen has worked on two pilot applications for digital repositories. In the spring and summer, students in SLIS 5223 developed a pilot application called Metadata Education and Research Information Center (MERIC) that is intended to provide access to learning materials related to cataloging and metadata education. The other pilot project is for an institutional repository application at UNT. The intention is for these pilot projects to gain the necessary support to become production-level systems.

RIO GRANDE INITIATIVE



Dennis Daily, a student in the Rio Grande Initiative, will receive the Masters degree in December 2006. While studying for his undergraduate degree in photojournalism at New Mexico State University and working for the University as a

photographer for its publications and news service, he accepted a job in the library's Archives and Special Collections Department to work on a project microfilming materials from an historical archive in Durango, Mexico. The project involved microfilming notary records that were part of the Historical Archives of the State of Durango, dating from as early as 1603, but mostly covering the colonial era (up through 1821) and including the records from the Mexican period (post 1821). The project later included the Historical Archive of the Archbishopric of Durango, an important collection of church records, dating from 1600-1900, that includes valuable information on the early history of New Mexico.

When he moved to Durango in 1997, Dennis's Spanish was very basic. Despite having had four semesters of Spanish in college, he found it difficult to speak or understand the language. Since

everyone he met spoke only Spanish, he was forced to learn the language quickly. While in Durango, he met his wife Veronica Lerma Salas; they were married in a colonial-era church there in 1999. Their daughter Ana Sofia, born in 2004, holds dual Mexican/U.S. citizenship and is learning both Spanish and English at home.

Dennis wears many hats in the Archives and Special Collections Department. He is primarily responsible for the photography collection (some 500,000 images) and other audiovisual formats, but he also processes archival collections, both paper and photographic. He is in charge of all reformatting of materials for preservation and for publication. He spends a great deal of time assisting researchers and providing access to the materials. The collection has been used for several doctoral dissertations, books, and articles from scholars in the United States, Mexico, and Spain.

twelve, crammed into a canopied pick up truck called a Songthaeo, literally "two rows", for a 20-minute ride from the hotel to the school and then back again. Over a two week period, the students installed Mandarin M3, an online catalog, a bar coding system for inventory and circulation, and classified, cataloged, and reorganized the 4000+ items in the library's collection and training the school librarian and faculty in its use.

On July 27, 2006, Dr. Carol Simpson, Ph.D. Student Barbara Schultz-Jones and ten graduate students traveled to Chiang Mai, Thailand to organize and catalog the contents of the Lanna International School Library. The school was founded in 1993 to serve the Chiang Mai community by providing quality education in a coeducational, nonsectarian, English-medium, international school setting. Lana's 257 students in kindergarten through grade 12 represent twenty-four nationalities and seventeen languages. Chiang Mai, in northwestern Thailand, is the country's second largest city with a population of 1,500,000.
