At the beginning of the 21st century our understanding of the human voice is quite

complete. However, practical application of this knowledge to the teaching studio is impossible to glean from the voice science literature. The vast experience of voice teachers of the past several hundred years is available to the modern pedagogue in the treatises and methods which they published - usually after many years of successful teaching. Voice science can help us understand the successful methods of the past and build an effective pedagogical theory that will be successful when properly applied by our students.



CLINICIAN

Dr. Stephen F. Austin is associate professor voice and vocal pedagogy at the University of North Texas. Dr. Austin is recognized as one of the leading experts in vocal pedagogy in the country. He received a masters degree in vocal performance from UNT and then earned the Ph.D. in Voice Science from the University of Iowa under the direction of the renowned voice scientist. Dr. Ingo Titze. Dr. Austin's scientific research has focused on measurement and analysis of the acoustics and physiology of the singing voice. He has published his research in The Journal of Voice. His extensive pedagogical writings have appeared in Australian Voice, Classical Singer, The Choral Journal and The Journal of Singing.

He has been a featured guest at national and international conferences including The National Association of Teachers of Singing, Music Teachers National Association, The Voice Foundation, and the International Conference on Physiology and Acoustics of Singing. He has presented lectures and masterclasses throughout the United States and in England, Australia and Europe.

Dr. Austin is creator and primary contributor of the popular column 'Provenance' which appears in every issue of The Journal of Singing where he explores the historical development of pedagogical thought and practice.

Dr. Austin is editor of a new series of historical reprints of important vocal methods and treatises published by Plural Publishing. The first book "The Art of Singing" by Carlo Bassini (1857) was published in 2007. Other volumes will appear in the near future.
