Course Description

This course introduces principles and techniques for data visualization for creating meaningful displays of quantitative and qualitative data to facilitate decision-making. Emphasis is placed on the identification of patterns, trends, and differences among data sets.

Course Prerequisites

None.

Learning Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- Develop an understanding of the fundamentals of communication and alignment around concepts required for effective data visualization
- Understand the grammar of graphics and select appropriate visualization
- Develop proficiency in creating static and interactive visualizations for a variety of disciplines
- Use visualization to support decision-making and critical thinking
- Critique various visualization representations

Course Format

This course will be delivered through a web-based format with 10 learning modules. There will be several online sessions via GoToTraining; see the "Online Sessions" section of our course site. Students' attendance is not required but highly recommended.

Textbooks

There is no required textbook.

However, each module has required readings that are listed in the "Reading" section of the modules. Use of the UNT library electronic resources may be necessary as some readings can be retrieved electronically.

Software

Various visualization software tools will be used for class exercises and assignments; some are open-source and others are proprietary software. A fully licensed version of proprietary software (e.g., Tableau) is made available to each student for the duration of the class.

Assignments

1. Module Exercises (70 points)

Each module has a single deadline for completion of its required exercise. The module exercises are designed to reinforce the concepts taught in the modules and to give students hands-on experience with visualizing data.

2. Mid-semester quiz (5 points)

The mid-semester quiz consists of 10 multiple choice questions.

3. Final Project (25 points)

Students will define testable questions to be addressed and identify/select data sources to be aggregated, analyzed, and visualized. Then they will create visualizations using one of the tools practiced in class. The final project paper should include your project description, data source, data preparation and design, visualization, and discussion.

Course Policy

APA Style

When doing the assignment, it is important to provide details of all the sources of information that you have used to prepare your work. All written assignments should follow APA style to ensure that all sources are cited completely, correctly, and with consistency. The purpose of APA style is to 1) give credit to the author whose ideas or research you have used, 2) provide the exact location for sources of information used in the text of your paper, and 3) enable your reader to verify information you have provided or to explore your topic in greater depth. Consult the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association, 6th edition.

Late Assignments

All students are expected to submit their module discussions and other assignments by the due date. The due dates are listed on the schedule section of the course syllabus and also marked on the calendar of the course site so that students can work around any planned events that would interfere with their completing the assignments on time. This prevents students from getting too far behind in the course and allows the instructor to assign grades in a consistent manner.

All students who do not post all their assignments by 11:59 PM Central Time on Sunday will be penalized a point for each date late unless there are extenuating circumstances. The instructor will consider extenuating circumstances, which may cause an assignment to be late.

Incompletes

A grade of incomplete (I) will be given only for a justifiable reason (such as a serious illness or military service) and only if you are passing the course. It is your responsibility to contact the instructor to request an incomplete and discuss requirements for completing the course. If you do not remove the incomplete within the timeframe agreed upon with the instructor or within one calendar year, you will receive a grade of an F.
